
Executive Summary



- Importance of Live Theatre Overall, live theatre is seen to play an important role in community development for a majority of Canadians. The role that live theatre plays in making Canadian communities vibrant places to live is seen as important for over eight in ten Canadians (49.2% important, 35.0% somewhat important). Live theatre is perceived to be similarly important for attracting visitors to communities (42.3% important, 37.2% somewhat important). The role of live theatre in helping to attract businesses to communities is perceived to be slightly less important (32.4% important, 34.2% somewhat important).
- Perceptions of Federal Funding A majority of Canadians are in favour of federal investment in additional funding for live theatre programming nationwide for Canada's 150th anniversary. Forty-six (45.8) percent support and 31.4 percent somewhat support this type of investment.


QUESTION – Would you say that live theatre plays an important, somewhat important, somewhat unimportant or unimportant role in the following [ROTATE]


The role that live theatre plays in making Canadian communities vibrant places to live is seen as very important to respondents (49.2% important, 35.0% somewhat important). Similarly high importance levels are ascribed to its role in attracting visitors to communities.

QUESTION – Do you support, somewhat support, somewhat oppose or oppose the federal government investing new funds for live theatre programming in communities across Canada for Canada's 150th anniversary?

A majority of Canadians are in favour of federal investment in additional funding for live theatre programming nationwide for Canada's 150th anniversary (45.8% support, 31.4% somewhat support).

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Methodology

Nanos conducted a national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians between March 6th and 12th, 2014 as part of an omnibus survey. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

The research was commissioned by the Professional Association of Canadian Theatres.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling and were called five times.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
