Canadians are uncomfortable allowing Chinese stateowned enterprises new access to Canadian economy; feel free trade with China should be linked to human rights

A significant majority of Canadians say they are uncomfortable or somewhat uncomfortable with allowing Chinese state-owned enterprises new access to the Canadian economy, and feel that these enterprises should be subjected to national security tests when taking over Canadian firms. Two thirds of Canadians say that human rights in China should be linked to free trade negotiations between Canada and China.

- Nearly nine in ten Canadians say they are uncomfortable or somewhat uncomfortable with allowing Chinese state-owned enterprises new access to the Canadian economy When asked their comfort level with allowing Chinese state-owned enterprises new access to the Canadian economy, including allowing Chinese state-owned enterprises to buy high tech Canadian firms and ending restrictions barring these enterprises from investing in the oil sands, nine in ten Canadians say they are uncomfortable (59%) or somewhat uncomfortable (29%), followed by Canadians who say they are somewhat comfortable (nine per cent) or comfortable (two per cent). Two per cent of Canadians are unsure.
- Four in five Canadians oppose or somewhat oppose allowing Chinese state-owned enterprises to takeover Canadian firms without national security tests When asked whether their level of support for allowing Chinese state-owned enterprises to takeover Canadian firms without national security tests in a future trade deal, eight in ten Canadians say they oppose (71%) or somewhat oppose (10%) this, compared to less than one in five who support (12%) or somewhat support (five per cent) this change. One per cent of Canadians are unsure.
- Two in three Canadians believe that Canada should link human rights in China to free trade negotiations with China When asked which view was closer to their own regarding the linking of free trade negotiations and human rights in China, two in three Canadians say that Canada should link human rights in China to free trade negotiations with China (66%), followed by those (21%) who say that human rights in China should not be linked to free trade negotiations with China. Fourteen per cent of Canadians are unsure.

These observations are based on an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between April 1st and 4th, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.









Methodology

Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between April 1st and 4th, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The data presented in this research is part of a joint project by The Globe and Mail and Nanos Research.
