## Impression of Canadians on the legalization of marijuana

National survey released May, 2017 Project 2017-1015



### A comfortable majority of Canadians support or somewhat support pardoning individuals with criminal records for marijuana possession

A comfortable majority support or somewhat support pardoning individuals with criminal records for marijuana possession once it is legal, and more then half oppose or somewhat oppose allowing police to demand a breath sample without reasonable suspicion. A majority of Canadians say they do not use marijuana, nor do they plan to once it is legalized.

- More than half of Canadians oppose or somewhat oppose allowing police to demand a breath sample without reasonable suspicion – Over half of Canadians oppose (38%) or somewhat oppose (17%) the federal government's plan to allow police to demand a breath sample even without reasonable suspicion. Twenty per cent of Canadians somewhat support this, while 24 per cent support the plan. Two per cent are unsure.
- Six in ten Canadians support or somewhat support pardoning individuals with criminal records for marijuana possession Asked if they support giving a pardon to every person with a criminal record for marijuana possession in light of the government's plan for legalization, a comfortable majority of Canadians support (34%) or somewhat support (28%) pardoning these individuals. Twelve per cent somewhat oppose this, and 23 per cent oppose it. Four per cent are unsure.
- A majority of Canadians report they do not and will not use marijuana when it is legalized Just over seven in ten Canadians say they do not use marijuana, and will not use it when legalized (73%), followed by 12 per cent who say they use it now and will use the same amount when it is legalized. Eight per cent say they do not use it, but will when it is legalized, while one per cent say they use it now and will use it more often when it is legalized. Six per cent are unsure.



Just over six in ten Canadians are confident or somewhat confident in Health Canada's ability to test the strength and safety of marijuana – A little over six in ten Canadians are confident (24%) or somewhat confident (37%) in the ability of Health Canada to test the safety and strength of marijuana, while 15 per cent are somewhat not confident and 20 per cent are not confident in Health Canada's ability to do this. Four per cent are unsure.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between April 29<sup>th</sup> and May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

## Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between April 29<sup>th</sup> and May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
