Canadians see China and Russia as top security threats; support for trade with China up

A significant majority of Canadians oppose the sale of Canadian companies with military customers to Chinese investors. Almost two fifths say that purchases of Canadian companies by Chinese ones should be the top priority for national security reviews. Most Canadians think the relationship between the Canadian and Chinese governments is about right in term of friendliness, and more than half of Canadians support or somewhat support a free trade deal with China.

- Two fifths of Canadians say purchases of Canadian companies by Chinese companies should be a top priority for national security reviews Asked which companies should be a top priority for national security reviews to protect Canada's security interests, 39 per cent say companies from China, followed by 26 per cent who say companies from Russia, nine per cent say companies from the United States, five per cent say companies from the United Kingdom, three per cent say German companies and one per cent say Japanese companies. Seventeen per cent are unsure.
- More than half of Canadians think the level of friendliness between the Canadian and Chinese governments is about right Over half of Canadians (54%) say the level of friendliness between the Canadian and Chinese governments is about right, while a quarter (25%) say too friendly and six per cent say not friendly enough. Fifteen per cent are unsure.
- More than half of Canadians support or somewhat support a free trade deal with China Just over half of Canadians support (17%) or somewhat support (37%) a free trade deal with China, while just under two fifths say they somewhat oppose (21%) or oppose (16%) such a deal. Nine per cent are unsure. There is a marginally positive shift in opinion compared to the 2016 numbers (11% support, 30% somewhat support); however Canadians are still divided on support for a free trade deal with China.
- Almost four fifths of Canadians oppose or somewhat oppose allowing a Chinese firm to buy a Montreal laser company Asked about their support for allowing a Chinese firm partially owned by the Chinese Government to buy a Montreal laser technology company even though some have warned that it will give China the same technology that our military uses, almost half (49%) of Canadians oppose this decision, while 29 per cent somewhat oppose, 13 per cent somewhat support, four per cent support and seven per cent are unsure.
- Almost four fifths of Canadians oppose or somewhat oppose allowing a Chinese investor to buy a Vancouver satellite company Nearly four fifths of Canadians oppose (48%) or somewhat oppose (28%) the decision to approve the purchase of a Vancouver satellite tech company with major military customers in Canada and the U.S. to a Chinese investor, while 14 per cent support and four per cent somewhat support this decision. Seven per cent are unsure.

These observations are based on a Nanos RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, conducted between June 24th to 27th, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.








QUESTION – Do you support, somewhat support, somewhat oppose or oppose the federal government pursuing a free trade deal with China?




The decision to allow a Chinese firm that is partially owned by the Government of China to buy a Montreal laser technology company even though some have warned that it will give China the same technology that our military uses

Methodology

Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between June 24th to 27th, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
