## **Opinions on the preservation of Indigenous languages**

### **AFN Survey Summary**

# Majority of Canadians support or somewhat support the proposed Indigenous Languages Act

While a majority of Canadians had not previously heard of the proposed Indigenous Languages Act, nearly three quarters of Canadians support or somewhat support the initiative. The most often cited reason for supporting or somewhat supporting the initiative was that language is important to culture and identity.

- Top cited priority for action when it comes to issues related to Canada's Indigenous Peoples is access to education/job training When asked to name what they think should be the top priority for action when it comes to issues related to Canada's Indigenous Peoples, Canadians most often said access to education/job training (13%), followed by safe homes and accommodations/improve living conditions (13%), increase transparency and accountability with funding/government needs to better manage money allocation (10%), and clean water (10%).
- Majority of Canadians have not heard of the Government of Canada proposing an Indigenous Languages Act – Slightly over three in five Canadians have not heard (63%) of the Government of Canada proposing an Indigenous Languages Act with the goal of ensuring the preservation, protection and revitalization of First Nations, Métis and Inuit languages prior to the survey, while 37 per cent have heard of it.
- Almost three quarters of Canadians support or somewhat support this initiative to preserve, protect and revitalize First Nations, Métis and Inuit languages A majority of Canadians support (49%) or somewhat support (25%) this initiative to preserve, protect and revitalize First Nations, Métis and Inuit languages, while slightly over one in five Canadians are opposed (13%) or somewhat opposed (eight per cent). Five per cent are unsure.

• Canadians most often say the reason for their support of the Indigenous Languages Act is because they feel that language is important to culture and identity – When asked why they had that opinion regarding the proposed Indigenous Languages Act initiative, the most common reason given was that language is important to culture and identity (27%), followed by preserving heritage and history/founding people (18%), thinking that it's not the government's job/responsibility (11%), and reparation for past wrongs (seven per cent).Fourteen per cent are unsure.

These observations are based on an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 25<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.




## Awareness of proposed Indigenous Languages Act

# Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 25<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>, 2017 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by the Assembly of First Nations.
