## Views of Ontarians on policy issues and the Ford government

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A majority of Ontarians say the current Ontario government led by Doug Ford is moving in the wrong direction. About six in ten or more Ontarians disagree or somewhat disagree that Doug Ford represents average Ontarians and that the deficit is a crisis that demands big cuts to public services. Likewise, close to six in ten Ontarians say the PC Party of Ontario is not responsive or somewhat not responsive to women's issues.

A majority of Ontarians oppose or somewhat oppose removing gender identity references from the sexual education curriculum in Ontario schools. Over six in ten Ontarians say that abolishing Ontario's Child Advocate and the Environmental Commissioner will have a negative or somewhat negative impact on child safety and the environment, respectively. A majority of Ontarians agree or somewhat agree that they are worried about cuts to public services and disagree or somewhat disagree that the deficit is a crisis that demands big cuts to public services.

Over half of Ontarians say that raising minimum wage again from $\$ 14$ to $\$ 15$ would have a positive or somewhat positive impact on the Ontarian economy and say that slowing down minimum wage increases and new benefits is a poor or very poor idea. A majority of Ontarians say cuts to public services would have an impact on them but are split on whether it would have a minor or major impact. Close to three in four Ontarians say healthcare is the public service that matters the most to them.

A majority of Ontarians say controlling cannabis sales is more important than the convenience for consumer when it comes to selling cannabis but Ontarians are split on which is more important, convenience or control, when it comes to selling alcohol.

## On the Ontario Government

- Ontarians most frequently mention the deficit/debt and Doug Ford/the new PC government as the biggest problem facing Ontario today - Asked what is the biggest problem facing Ontario today, Ontarians most frequently mention the deficit/debt and Doug Ford/ the new PC government ( $15 \%$ each), followed by climate change and the environment (six per cent), wages and jobs (five per cent), the economy (four per cent) and healthcare (three per cent). Thirty-two per cent are unsure.


## SUMMARY

. Six in ten Ontarians say the current Ontario government led by Doug Ford is moving in the wrong direction - Asked if they would say that the current Ontario government led by Premier Doug Ford is moving in the right direction or wrong direction, a majority of Ontarians (60\%) say it is moving in the wrong direction, while close to three in ten say it is moving in the right direction (28\%). Twelve per cent are unsure. Women were more likely to say it is moving in the wrong direction than men ( $69 \%$ of women say it is moving in the wrong direction compared to $50 \%$ of men).

- Ontarians more often say pessimistic is the feeling that best describes their feelings about living in Ontario with Doug Ford as Premier - Asked which feeling best describes their feelings about living in Ontario with Doug Ford as a Premier, Ontarians more frequently said pessimistic (33\%), followed by angry (26\%), optimistic (21\%), satisfaction (nine per cent) and indifferent (seven per cent). Five per cent are unsure.
- A majority of Ontarians say they dislike or somewhat dislike it when Premier Doug Ford says he is "for the people" - Two in three Ontarians say they dislike it (55\%) or somewhat dislike it (13\%) when Premier Doug Ford says he is "for the people", while close to three in ten say they like it (15\%) or somewhat like it (14\%). Three per cent are unsure. Women were more likely to say they dislike it when Premier Doug Ford says he is "for the people" than men ( $60 \%$ of women say they dislike or somewhat dislike it compared to $49 \%$ of men).
- Over one in two Ontarians say the current provincial government is doing a poor or very poor job at being transparent and accountable - Close to six in ten Ontarians say the current provincial government is doing a poor (20\%) or very poor job (38\%) at being transparent and accountable, while just over two in ten say it is doing a very good (eight per cent) or good job $(14 \%)$ at being transparent and accountable. Less than two in ten (18\%) say it is doing an average job at being transparent and accountable and two per cent are unsure.


## SUMMARY

- Over half of Ontarians say the current provincial government is doing a poor or very poor job at looking out for the interests of the average Ontarian - Close to six in ten Ontarians say the current provincial government is doing a poor (22\%) or very poor job (37\%) at looking out for the interests of the average Ontarian, while over one in four say it is doing a good (15\%) or very good job (11\%) at this. Fourteen per cent say it is doing an average job and one per cent are unsure.

Ontarians are split on whether the current provincial government is doing a good or poor job at keeping campaign promises Women were more likely to say the current provincial government is doing very poor job at looking out for the interests of the average Ontarian than men (42\% of women compared to $31 \%$ of men).

- Ontarians are split on whether the current provincial government is doing a good or poor job at keeping campaign promises - One in three Ontarians say the current provincial government is doing a good (20\%) or very good (13\%) job at keeping campaign promises, while one in three say the current provincial government is doing a poor (18\%) or very poor (15\%) job at this. Close to three in ten say it is doing an average job at keeping campaign promises and six per cent are unsure.
- Close to six in ten Ontarians say slowing down minimum wage increases and new benefits is a poor or very poor idea - Just under six in ten Canadians say slowing down minimum wage increases and new benefits is a poor (18\%) or very poor idea (40\%), while three in ten say it is a very good (16\%) or good idea (15\%). Just over one in ten say it is an average idea (12\%). One per cent are unsure.
- Over half of Ontarians say raising the minimum wage again from $\$ 14$ to $\$ 15$ would have a positive or somewhat positive impact on the economy in Ontario - Over one in two Ontarians say raising the minimum wage again from $\$ 14$ to $\$ 15$ would have a positive $(28 \%)$ or somewhat positive impact ( $27 \%$ ) on the economy in Ontario, while one in three say it would have a negative (15\%) or somewhat negative (17\%) impact. Nine per cent say it would have no impact on the economy in Ontario. Four per cent are unsure.


## SUMMARY

A majority of Ontarians disagree or somewhat disagree that Doug Ford represents average Ontarians

- A majority of Ontarians say they would oppose or somewhat oppose removing gender identity references from the sexual education curriculum in Ontario schools - Two in three Ontarians say they would oppose (55\%) or somewhat oppose (12\%) removing gender identity references such as LGTBQ or Lesbian, Gay, Transgender, Queer references from the sexual education curriculum in Ontario schools, while over one in four say they would support (17\%) or somewhat support this (11\%). Six per cent are unsure.


## Public services

- A majority of Ontarians agree or somewhat agree that they are worried about cuts to public services - Seven in ten Ontarians say they agree (47\%) or somewhat agree (23\%) that they are worried about cuts to public services, while close to three in ten say they disagree (16\%) or somewhat disagree (12\%). One per cent are unsure. Women are more likely to say they agree that they are worried about cuts to public services than men ( $57 \%$ of women agree compared to $37 \%$ of men).
- Close to six in ten Ontarians disagree or somewhat disagree that the deficit is a crisis that demands big cuts to public services - Close to six in ten Ontarians Ontarians disagree (35\%) or somewhat disagree (23\%) that the deficit is a crisis that demands big cuts to public services, while four in ten say they agree (17\%) or somewhat agree (23\%) with this. Two per cent are unsure.
- Over half of Ontarians agree that public servants have too many benefits that other workers do not have - Over one in two Ontarians agree (30\%) or somewhat agree ( $23 \%$ ) that public servants have too many benefits that other workers do not have, while over four in ten disagree (29\%) or somewhat disagree (14\%). Four per cent are unsure.
- A majority of Ontarians disagree or somewhat disagree that Doug Ford represents average Ontarians - Close to seven in ten Ontarians disagree (55\%) or somewhat disagree (14\%) that Doug Ford represents average Ontarians, while three in ten agree (13\%) or somewhat agree (17\%). Two per cent are unsure.


## SUMMARY

- A majority of Ontarians say the impact on child safety of abolishing the Child Advocate will be negative or somewhat negative - Over six in ten Ontarians say abolishing the Child Advocate will have a negative (49\%) or somewhat negative (13\%) impact on child safety, while close to one in four (23\%) say it will make no difference. Less than one in ten say it have a positive or somewhat positive impact (three per cent each). Nine per cent are unsure.
Ontarians more frequently say the Ontario government has done a poor or very poor job at managing the retail sales of cannabis in Ontario so far compared to a good or very good job
- A majority of Ontarians say abolishing the Environmental Commissioner will have a negative or somewhat negative impact on the environment - Over six in ten Ontarians say the impact on the environment of abolishing the Environmental Commissioner will be negative (53\%) or somewhat negative (11\%), while over two in ten (22\%) say it will make no difference. One in ten say it will have a positive or somewhat positive (five per cent each) impact on the environment. Four per cent are unsure.


## Cannabis and Alcohol Sales

- Ontarians more frequently say the Ontario government has done a poor or very poor job at managing the retail sales of cannabis in Ontario so far - Over four in ten Ontarians say the Ontario government has done a poor (23\%) or very poor job (20\%) at managing the retail sales of cannabis in Ontario so far, while one in four say it has done an average job (25\%). Under two in ten say it has done a very good (four per cent) or good job (13\%) at this. Sixteen per cent are unsure.
- A majority of Ontarians say they support or somewhat support allowing cannabis stores to be located 150 meters from a school - Just over six in ten Ontarians say they support (40\%) or somewhat support ( $21 \%$ ) allowing cannabis stores to be located 150 meters from a school, while just over three in ten say they oppose (20\%) or somewhat oppose (11\%) this. Eight per cent are unsure.


## SUMMARY

- Over one in two Ontarians say they support or somewhat support LCBO stores being open 14 hours a day, 7 days a week - Close to six in ten Ontarians say they support (35\%) or somewhat support ( $23 \%$ ) LCBO stores being open 14 hours a day, 7 days a week, while over three in ten say they oppose (18\%) or somewhat oppose (17\%) this. Eight per cent are unsure.
- Ontarians are split on whether or not they support cannabis stores being open 14 hours a day, 7 days a week - Close to half of Ontarians say they oppose (31\%) or somewhat oppose (16\%) cannabis stores being open 14 hours a day, 7 days a week, while over four in ten say they support (25\%) or somewhat support (19\%) this. Ten per cent are unsure.
- Ontarians are split on whether convenience or control is more important as a priority when thinking about selling alcohol - Asked what is more important as a priority, the convenience for consumers to buy alcohol or controlling alcohol sales when thinking about selling alcohol, 48 per cent or Ontarians say controlling sales is more important, while 47 per cent say the convenience for consumers is more important. Five per cent are unsure.
- A majority of Ontarians say controlling cannabis sales is more important than the convenience for consumers when they think about selling cannabis - Asked what is more important as a priority, the convenience for consumers to buy cannabis or controlling cannabis sales when thinking about selling cannabis, over six in ten Ontarians (62\%) say controlling cannabis sales is more important, while three in ten (31\%) say the convenience for consumers is more important. Eight per cent are unsure.


## Budget Deficit

- Ontarians are split on which is the best way to reduce deficit in Ontario - Asked which is the best way to reduce the budget deficit in Ontario, Ontarians most frequently mention raising taxes (28\%), followed by cutting jobs in the public services (26\%), reducing public services (13\%) and increasing user fees for health care, roads and other public services (11\%). Twenty-two per cent are unsure.


## SUMMARY

- A majority of Ontarians say cuts to public services would have an impact on them personally but are split on whether it would be a major or minor impact - Asked if cuts to public services such as healthcare, education, social assistance and infrastructure maintenance, would have a major, minor or no impact on them personally, close to half of Ontarians say it would have a major impact (46\%), and over four in ten say it would have a minor impact (43\%). Nine per cent say it would have no impact on them personally and three per cent are unsure.
Close to three in four Ontarians say healthcare is the public service that matters most to them
- A majority of Ontarians say healthcare is the public service that matters most to them - Asked what public services matter most to them, just over seven in ten say healthcare (71\%), followed by education (12\%), road infrastructure (seven per cent), public transit (six per cent), and university education (one per cent).


## PC Party of Ontario

- Ontarians are split on whether the PC Party of Ontario puts too much emphasis on urban or rural issues - Asked if the PC Party of Ontario puts too much emphasis on urban issues, too much emphasis on rural issues or it balances rural and urban issues, close to three in ten (29\%) say it puts too much emphasis on urban issues, while 26 per cent say it balances emphasis. Over one in ten say it puts too much emphasis on rural issues (11\%). Thirty-four per cent are unsure.
- Over one in two Ontarians say that the PC Party of Ontario is not responsive or somewhat not responsive to women's issues - Close to six in ten Ontarians say the PC Party of Ontario is not responsive (41\%) or somewhat not responsive (18\%) to women's issues, while over one in four say it is responsive (10\%) or somewhat not responsive (16\%); Fifteen per cent are unsure. Women were more likely to say the PC Party of Ontario is not responsive or somewhat not responsive to women's issues than men ( $67 \%$ of women say it is not responsive or somewhat not responsive compared to $49 \%$ of men).

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Ontarians, 19 years of age or older, between December $10^{\text {th }}$ to $17^{\text {th }}, 2018$. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Ontarians is $\pm 3.1$ percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by Ontario Public Service employees union and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.

## METHODOLOGY

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Ontarians, 19 years of age or older, between December $10^{\text {th }}$ and $17^{\text {th }}, 2018$. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Ontario.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Ontarians is $\pm 3.1$ percentage points, 19 times out of 20 .

The research was commissioned by the Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU) and was conducted by Nanos Research.
