Politics in Canada does not score well on ethics – The economy trumps SNC Lavalin as an election issue according to Canadians

SUMMARY





Although Canadians tend to give low scores to their confidence in politicians behaving ethically, the economy still trumps SNC Lavalin as an issue that influences votes. Canadians are split on whether a government led by Justin Trudeau Liberals or the Andrew Scheer Conservatives would generally be more ethical.

- Canadians nearly three times as likely to say they have very low rather than very high confidence that politicians behave ethically, although most are neutral on the question Although nearly six in ten (59%) Canadians give a neutral score (four to seven out of ten) to their confidence in politicians behaving ethically, they are nearly three times as likely to say they have very low confidence (29%, score of one to three out of ten) that politicians behave ethically, compared to very high confidence (11%, score of eight to ten out of ten). One per cent are unsure. The average confidence score is 4.8 nationally, while the highest average was recorded in Quebec (5.6) and the lowest in the Prairies (4.1).
- Canadians most frequently score May as most ethical, followed by Sheer Nearly a quarter of Canadians (23%) believe May is the most ethical leader, followed by Sheer (21%), Trudeau (17%), Singh (six per cent), Bernier and Blanchet (three per cent, respectively). Sixteen per cent are unsure and 11 per cent say none are ethical. May is most frequently considered most ethical in British Columbia and Atlantic (36% respectively), Sheer is most frequently considered most ethical in the Prairies (32%) and Trudeau most frequently considered most ethical in Ontario (25%). Men (28%) are twice as likely as women (15%) to consider Sheer ethical.
- Canadians most frequently score Green Party as most ethical, followed by Conservatives Nearly a quarter of Canadians (23%) believe the Green Party is the most ethical party, followed by the Conservatives (21%), the Liberals (14%), the NDP (12%), the Bloc Quebecois (three per cent) and People's Party (two per cent). Twelve per cent are unsure and 13 per cent say none are ethical. The Green Party is most frequently considered most ethical in the Atlantic (33%) and British Columbia (30%), and the Conservatives are most frequently considered most ethical in the Prairies (40%).


- Canadians are split on whether a Liberal or Conservative led government would be more ethical Nearly two in five Canadians (39%) say a government led by the Justin Trudeau Liberals would be more ethical, while just over a third (34%, higher in the Prairies 52% and among men 42%) say a government led by the Andrew Sheer Conservatives would be more ethical. Over a quarter (27%) are unsure.
- The economy trumps SNC Lavalin as election issue Nearly three quarters (73%) of Canadians say the economy will influence their vote, compared to under one in five (17%) who say SNC Lavalin will influence their vote in the next federal election. Ten per cent are unsure.

These observations are based on a Nanos RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, conducted between February 23^{rd} and 26^{th} , 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.



Most ethical federal party leader






QUESTION – Which one of the following federal party leaders do you believe is the most ethical? [RANDOMIZED]

Most ethical federal political party






QUESTION – Which one of the following federal political parties do you believe is the most ethical? [RANDOMIZED]

Ethical government showdown






QUESTION – Do you think a government led by [ROTATE] the Justin Trudeau Liberals or the Andrew Scheer Conservatives would be more ethical?



Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 23rd and 26th, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
