

Since 2015, confidence in the nation's ability to preserve social programs is up and confidence in managing the pressures of an aging population and ensuring Canadians have a high standard of living is lower

Summary

The tracking of several social issues for the last four years shows an increase in confidence in the nation's ability to preserve social programs while confidence in the nation's ability to manage the pressures of an aging population and ensure Canadians have a high standard of living have declined. With regards to the importance of these issues, protecting the environment has received a lower importance score since 2015 while improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves and encouraging Canadian culture have both received a higher importance score.

- **Since 2015, Canadians have higher confidence in preserving social programs and improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves** – Close to six in ten Canadians are either somewhat confident (49%; 42% in 2015) or confident (10%; 10% in 2015) in the nation's ability to preserve social programs and four in ten Canadians are either somewhat confident (29%; 23% in 2015), or confident (7%; 9% in 2015) in the nation's ability to improve the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves.
- **Since 2015, Canadians have lower confidence in managing the pressures of an aging population and ensuring Canadians have a high standard of living** – More than six in ten Canadians are either somewhat not confident (42%; 39% in 2015) or not confident (20%; 17% in 2015) in the nation's ability to manage the pressures of an aging population and close to five in ten Canadians are either somewhat not confident (34%; 32% in 2015), or not confident (15%; 11% in 2015) in the nation's ability to ensure Canadians have a high standard of living.
- **Canadians give a higher importance score to keeping healthcare system strong and investing in education** – When scoring the importance of various social issues using a ten point scale, keeping our healthcare system strong has scored higher (mean score of 9.1; 9.1 in 2015) in terms of importance than other social issues, followed by investing in our education system (mean score of 8.7; 8.6 in 2015), managing the pressures of an aging population (mean score of 8.6; 8.5 in 2015), further protecting our environment (mean score of 8.1; 8.5 in 2015), preserving social programs (mean score of 8.0; 7.9 in 2015), ensuring Canadians have a high standard of living (mean score of 7.9; 7.9 in 2015), improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves (mean score of 7.4; 7.1 in 2015), and encouraging Canadian culture (mean score of 7.3; 7.0 in 2015).

Summary


- **Since 2015, Canadians give a lower importance score to protecting the environment and a higher importance score to improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves and encouraging Canadian culture** – In general, the importance scores for social issues have remained relatively steady since 2015, except for improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves and encouraging Canadian culture, which have both seen an increase of +0.3 from 2015 to 2019, and for further protecting the environment, which has seen a decrease of -0.4 from 2015 to 2019.

These observations are based on a hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians between February 2nd to 5th, 2019, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.







Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians between February 2nd to 5th, 2019, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

- A representative online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, conducted from July 5th to 9th, 2012, accurate 3.1 percentage points plus or minus, 19 times out of 20;
- A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell- lines) random telephone survey of 1,013 Canadians conducted between April 6th and 9th, 2013 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,013 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20; and,
- A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians conducted between May 24th and May 28th, 2015 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
- A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians conducted between July 28th and August 1st, 2016, as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
