
On ethics, Trudeau a distant third and drops five points in four days – May up – Sheer and Singh flat

The following research was conducted in two waves, one wave was completed on the Monday prior to the testimony of Former Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada Jody Wilson-Raybould with regards to SNC Lavalin, and the second wave was completed on the Friday following the testimony. On ethics, Trudeau loses five points while May gains six points in four days. Confidence in politicians behaving in an ethical manner is down from Monday, and while the importance of an issue like the economy is down over the last four days, it continues to trump an issue like SNC Lavalin.

- **Confidence in politicians behaving in an ethical manner is down from Monday** Although over five in ten (53%, down from 59% on Monday) Canadians give a neutral score (four to seven out of ten) to their confidence in politicians behaving ethically, they are more than three times as likely to say they have very low confidence (36%, up from 29% over the four day period), score of one to three out of ten) that politicians behave ethically, compared to very high confidence (10%, 11% four days ago, score of eight to ten out of ten). One per cent are unsure. The average confidence score is 4.5 nationally, down from 4.8, while the highest average was recorded in Quebec (5.3, 5.6 four days ago) and the lowest in the Prairies (4.0, 4.1 four days ago).
 - May sees a six point increase as the most ethical leader, Trudeau is down by five points in four days Close to three in ten Canadians (30%, up from 23%) believe May is the most ethical leader, followed by Sheer (21% both Monday and Friday), Trudeau (12%, down from 17% four days ago), Singh (seven per cent, six per cent on Monday), Bernier and Blanchet (three and two per cent, respectively). Fifteen per cent are unsure and 12 per cent say none are ethical. May is most frequently considered most ethical in British Columbia and Atlantic (44% and 38% respectively, up from 36% each four days ago), Sheer is most frequently considered most ethical in the Prairies (34%, 32% on Monday). Men (27%) are more likely than women (15%) to consider Sheer ethical.

- **Canadians most frequently score Green Party as most ethical, followed by Conservatives** Over a quarter of Canadians (28%, up from 23% on Monday) believe the Green Party is the most ethical party, followed by the Conservatives (21%, consistent with Monday's findings), the NDP (11%, 12% on Monday), the Liberals (10%, down from 14% in four days), the People's Party (three per cent, two per cent on Monday), and the Bloc Quebecois (two per cent, three per cent four days ago). Friday, 11 per cent are unsure and 14 per cent say none are ethical. The Green Party is most frequently considered most ethical in British Columbia (38%, 30% according to Monday's findings), and the Conservatives are most frequently considered most ethical in the Prairies (39%, 40% on Monday).
- **Canadians are now split on whether a Liberal or Conservative led government would be more ethical** – Just over a third of Canadians (34%, 39% on Monday) say a government led by the Justin Trudeau Liberals would be more ethical, while also approximately a third (34%, consistent with Monday's findings; higher in the Prairies – 49% and among men – 40%) say a government led by the Andrew Sheer Conservatives would be more ethical. Nearly a third (32%) are unsure.
- Importance of an issue like the economy compared to an issue like the SNC Lavalin controversy is strong but down over the last four days Two thirds (67%, down from 73% four days ago) of Canadians say the economy will influence their vote, compared to a quarter (26%, up from 17% on Monday) who say SNC Lavalin will influence their vote in the next federal election. Eight per cent are unsure.


Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 23rd and 26th, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey, and a second RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 750 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 28th and March 1st, 2019. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, and the margin of error for a random survey of 750 Canadians is ±3.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Readers should note that the sample for the second wave of research was drawn from the same 1,000 participants of the first wave to allow for a direct comparability on the impact of the testimony.











METHODOLOGY



Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 23rd and 26th, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey, and a second RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 750 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 28th and March 1st, 2019. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, and the margin of error for a random survey of 750 Canadians is ±3.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Readers should note that the sample for the second wave of research was drawn from the same 1,000 participants of the first wave to allow for a direct comparability on the impact of the testimony.

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
