Canadians almost twice as likely to think the government should not allow rather than allow Canadian citizens who are alleged terrorists to return to Canada

SUMMARY

More than half of Canadians think the Government of Canada should not allow Canadian citizens who are alleged terrorists to return home to Canada Canadians are nearly twice as likely to think that if a Canadian citizen is an alleged terrorist they should not be allowed rather than be allowed to return home to Canada. Canadians between 18 to 34 years of age are less likely to think the alleged terrorists should not be allowed home than Canadians over the age of 35.

- Nearly twice as many Canadians say that the Canadians citizens who are alleged terrorists should not be allowed to return home to Canada than those who say they should be allowed Asked what the Government of Canada should do if a Canadian citizen is an alleged terrorist, 55 per cent of Canadians say the government should not allow the alleged terrorist to return home to Canada, while 29 per cent say the government should allow them to return to Canada. Sixteen per cent are unsure.
- Younger Canadians are less likely to say the Government should not allow Canadian citizens alleged of terrorism to return home Canadians 18 to 34 years of age are less likely to think the Government of Canada should not allow a Canadian citizen who is an alleged terrorist to return home (47%), compared to Canadians 35 to 54 years of age (58%) and 55 plus (59%).





Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between August 29th to September 4th, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
