Canadians say they would like the federal government to spend more money on the environment and healthcare in 2020

### **SUMMARY**

Just over one in four Canadians say they would like the federal government to spend more money on the environment in 2020 Canadians say the environment and healthcare is where they would like the government to spend more money in 2020. Canadians are split when it comes to whether or not they support reducing personal taxes if it means increasing the size of the deficit and debt. Nearly half say they believe their personal finances in 2020 will be the same as they were in 2019.

- Canadians most frequently say the environment and healthcare should be where the government spends more money in 2020 – Asked where they would like the federal government to spend more money in 2020 among a series of possible spending areas, just over one in four Canadians say the environment (26%), while just under one in four (24%) say healthcare. Under two in ten say job creation (16%), while twelve per cent say poverty, eight per cent say Pharmacare and four per cent say Indigenous issues. One in ten (10%) say none of these. Canadians from the Prairies were most likely to say the federal government should spend more money on job creation (31%).
- Canadians are split on whether or not they support reducing personal taxes if it means increasing the deficit and debt Canada owes Just under one in two Canadians say they oppose (26%) or somewhat oppose (23%) reducing personal taxes if it means increasing the size of the annual deficit and long-term debt Canada owes, while just under one in two support (21%) or somewhat support it (27%). Four per cent are unsure.
- Canadians are most likely to say they believe their personal finances will be the same in 2020 as they were in 2019 Just under one in two Canadians (47%) say they think their personal finances in 2020 will be the same as 2019, while just over one in four (26%) believe they will be worse off in 2020 than 2019, and under one in four (22%) believe they will be better off in 2020 than 2019. Quebecers were more likely to say they believe their personal finances will be the same (61%), while those living in the Prairies were more likely to say they will be worse off in 2020 than 2019 (36%). Younger Canadians (18 to 34) were more likely to say they believe they believe they will be better off in 2020 than 2019 (35%) than older Canadians (26% for those 35 to 54; 10% for those 55 plus).

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#### **SUMMARY**





These observations are based on a hybrid survey of 1,010 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between December 22<sup>nd</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for this survey is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.




**QUESTION** – Thinking of your personal finances, do you think next year in 2020 your personal finances will be better off, worse off or the same as 2019?

### **METHODOLOGY**

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Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,010 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between December 22<sup>nd</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
