# Support is not strong for Alberta opting out of the CPP and RCMP

National survey released January, 2020 Project 2019-1553

#### **SUMMARY**

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At least one in two residents of the Prairies oppose or somewhat oppose opting out of the CPP and RCMP, respectively Although support is weak for both propositions by Alberta Premier Kenney of the province exiting federal initiatives such as the RCMP and CPP (Canada Pension Plan), there is less intensity of opposition both among Canadians and residents of the Prairies to Alberta replacing the RCMP than to Alberta replacing the CPP. Residents of the Prairies are more likely to oppose than to support both Alberta opting out of the CPP and Alberta opting out of the RCMP.

- Just over half of Canadians oppose or somewhat oppose Alberta opting out of the CPP Just over one in two Canadians oppose (42%) or somewhat oppose (10%) having the Alberta
  Government set up its own pension plan and withdrawing from the Canada Pension Plan, while 19 per cent support and 14 per cent somewhat support this. Fifteen per cent are unsure. Intensity of opposition is stronger among residents of the Atlantic (61% oppose and lower in Quebec (22% oppose). Residents of the Prairies are more likely to oppose (46% oppose, nine per cent somewhat oppose) than to support (22% support, 15% somewhat support).
- **Canadians are split over Alberta opting out of the RCMP** Over two in five Canadians support (24%) or somewhat support (22%) having the Alberta Government replace the RCMP with a provincial police force, while 29 per cent oppose and 10 per cent somewhat oppose this. Sixteen per cent are unsure. Intensity of opposition is lower in Quebec (16% oppose). Residents of the Prairies are more likely to oppose (39% oppose, 11 per cent somewhat oppose) than to support (20% support, 19% somewhat support).

These observations are based on an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,010 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between December 22<sup>nd</sup> to 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for this survey is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

#### **METHODOLOGY**





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Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,010 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between December 22<sup>nd</sup> to 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 3.1$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by the Globe and Mail and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.
