

Views on the healthcare system in Canada

SUMMARY

Canadians are more likely to support or somewhat support being allowed to spend their own money for health care they want at a private clinic in Canada

Canadians are more likely to support or somewhat support being allowed to spend their own money for health care they want at a private clinic in Canada, and a majority support or somewhat support provincial governments being required to disclose publicly the number of patients that die each year while on a waiting list. Canadians believe the average adult pays an average of \$3,459 to the government each year to financially support Canada's public health care system and are more likely to say Canada's health care system needs to do a better job with the money it receives right now rather than receive more money.

Canadians who are not satisfied with the health care system are more likely to support or somewhat support Canadians being allowed to spend their own money on private health care and requiring provincial governments to publicly disclose how many patients die on waiting lists than Canadians who are satisfied. Canadians who are satisfied with the system are more likely to say Canada's health care system needs more money to improve health outcomes than those who are not satisfied, who are more likely to say Canada's health care system needs to do a better job with the money it receives right now.

- **Two in ten Canadians are outright satisfied with Canada's public health care system; 46 per cent are somewhat satisfied** – A majority of Canadians say they are satisfied (20%) or somewhat satisfied (46%) with Canada's public health care system, while one in three are somewhat not satisfied (19%) or not satisfied (14%). One per cent are unsure. Residents of British Columbia are more likely to say they are satisfied (31%) or somewhat satisfied (41%) than Quebec residents (11% satisfied; 47% somewhat satisfied).
- **A majority of Canadians report having visited a family doctor in the past three years** – Asked how they have used the public health care system in the last three years, nearly nine in ten Canadians report having visited a family doctor (87%), followed by visiting a hospital (67%), and visited a walk in clinic (55%). Three per cent report they have not accessed the public health care system in the past three years. Residents of Atlantic Canada and Ontario are most likely to report having visited a family doctor (91% each), while Quebec residents are the least likely to report doing this (77%). Atlantic Canadians are also most likely to report visiting a hospital (78%). Older Canadians (55 plus) are more likely to report visiting a family doctor (92%) compared to younger Canadians (18-34) (80%), while younger Canadians are more likely to report visiting a walk in clinic (69%; 41% of Canadians 55 plus).

More than eight in ten Canadians support or somewhat support provincial governments being required to disclose publicly the number of patients that die each year while on a waiting list

- **Canadians think the average adult pays an average of \$3,459 to the government each year to financially support Canada's public health care system** – Asked how much they think the average adult pays to the government each year to financially support Canada's public health care system, Canadians most often say \$1,000 (13%), followed by \$5,000 (11%), \$2,000 (nine per cent), \$500 (seven per cent), \$3,000 and \$10,000 (five per cent each). Six per cent are unsure. Canadians think the average adult pays an average of \$3,459 and a median of \$2,000. Residents of the Prairies think Canadians pay a higher average amount of money to the government (mean of \$4,957), compared to residents of British Columbia (mean of \$2,634). Canadians who say they are not satisfied with the public health care system think Canadians pay a higher amount of money on average (\$4,461) than Canadians overall (\$3,459).
- **Canadians are more likely to support or somewhat support being allowed to spend their own money for health care they want at a private clinic in Canada** – Canadians most often support (23%) or somewhat support (28%) Canadians being allowed to spend their own money for health care they want at a private clinic in Canada, while over four in ten oppose (28%) or somewhat oppose this (16%). Five per cent are unsure. Canadians who are not satisfied with the public health care system report a higher intensity of support for this (36% support; 22% somewhat support) than those who are satisfied with the system (17% support; 23% somewhat support).
- **More than eight in ten Canadians support or somewhat support provincial governments being required to disclose publicly the number of patients that die each year while on a waiting list** – A majority of Canadians support (57%) or somewhat support (24%) provincial governments being required to disclose publicly the number of patients that die each year while on a waiting list, while under two in ten oppose (six per cent) or somewhat oppose (eight per cent) this. Six per cent are unsure. Canadians who are not satisfied with the public health care system report a higher intensity of support for this (80% support; 12% somewhat support) than those who are satisfied with the system (43% support; 25% somewhat support).

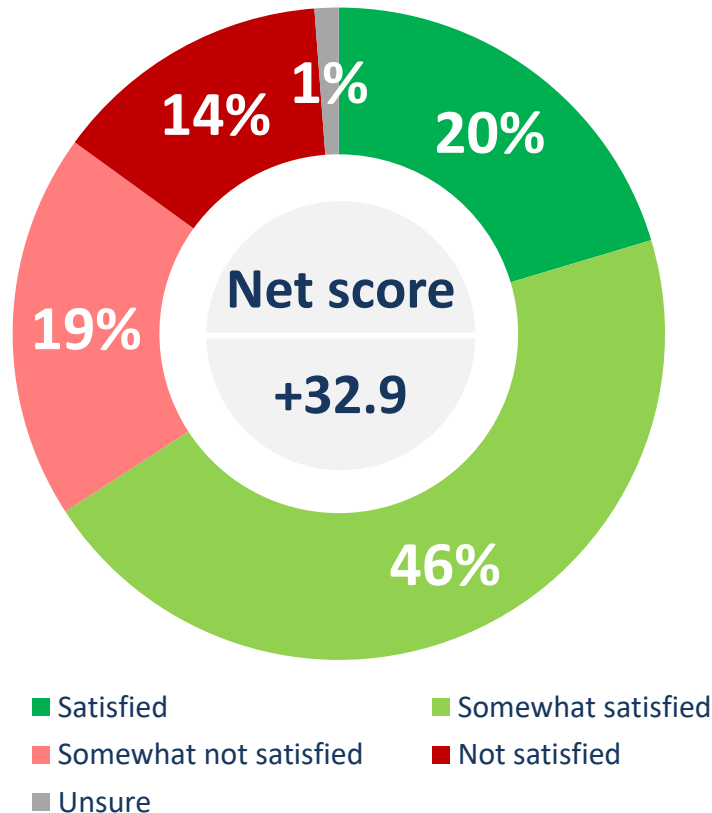
Canadians who are satisfied with the public health care system are more likely to say Canada's health care system needs more money than those who are not satisfied with the system

- **Canadians are more likely to say Canada's health care system needs to do a better job with the money it receives right now rather than receive more money** – Asked which statement about funding for Canada's health care system best reflects their review, 50 per cent of Canadians say Canada's health care system needs to do a better job with the money it receives right now, while just over four in ten (41%) say Canada's health care system needs more money to improve health outcomes. Nine per cent are unsure. Residents of British Columbia (48%) are more likely to say Canada's healthcare system needs more money than residents of Quebec (33%), while Quebec residents most often say Canada's healthcare system needs to do a better job with the money it receives now (60%, compared to 37% of British Columbia residents). Canadians who are satisfied with the public health care system are more likely to say Canada's health care system needs more money (49%) than those who are not satisfied with the system (36%).

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,008 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 29th to March 3rd, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Satisfaction with Canada's healthcare system



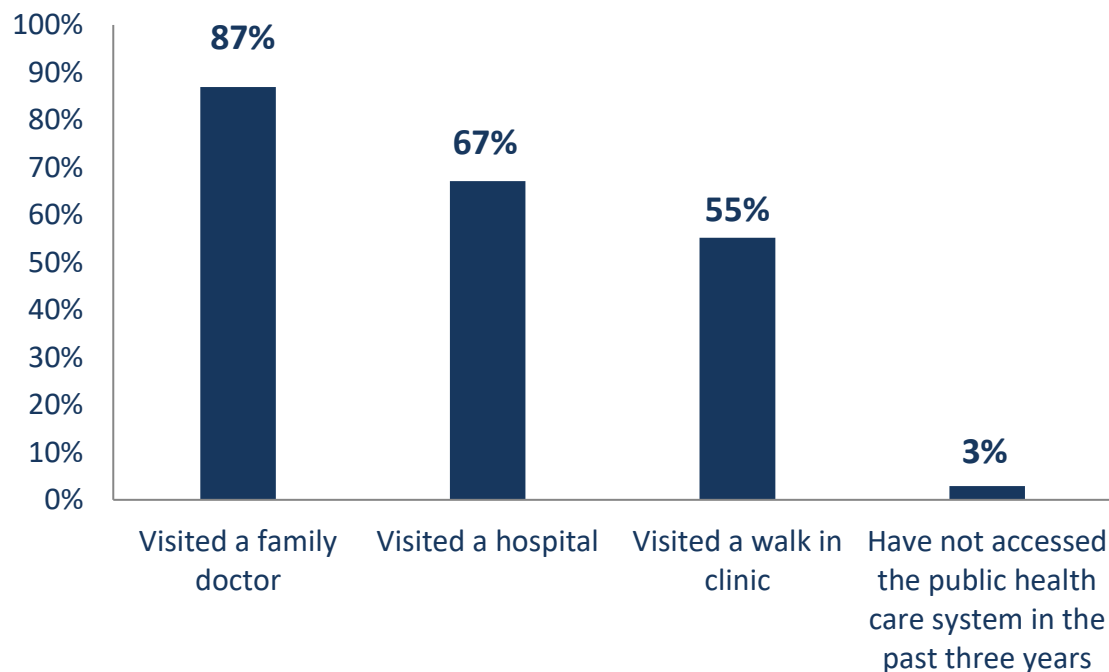

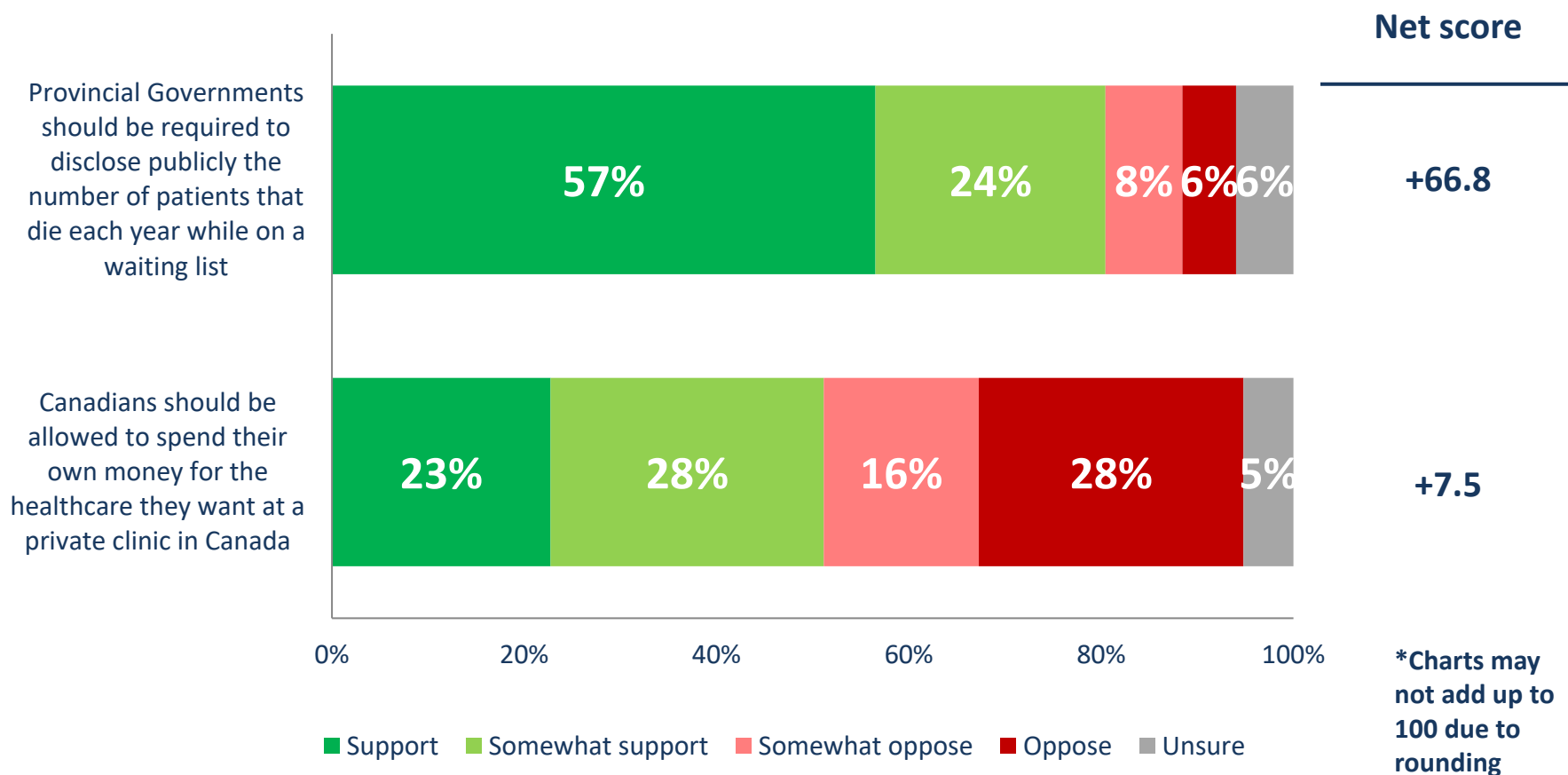

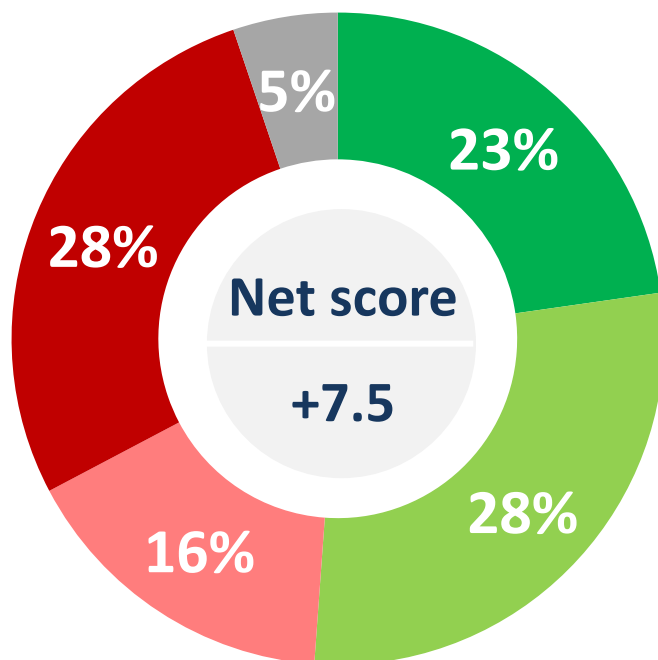
QUESTION – How much do you think the average adult pays to the government each year to financially support Canada's public health care system? [OPEN]

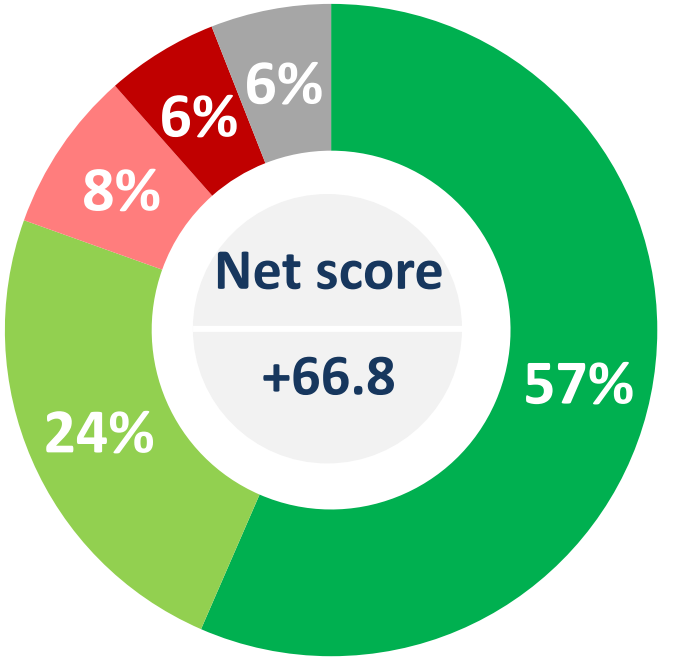

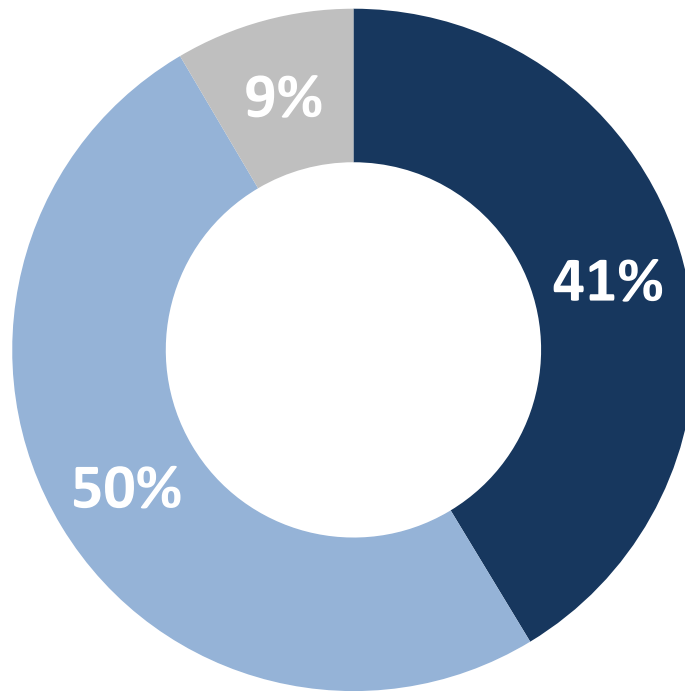

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,008 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 29th to March 3rd, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by SecondStreet.org and was conducted by Nanos Research.

Screening	Screening ensured potential respondents did not work in the market research industry, in the advertising industry, in the media or a political party prior* to administering the survey to ensure the integrity of the data. *Confirm if applicable
Excluded Demographics	Individuals younger than 18 years old; individuals without land or cell lines, and individuals without internet access could not participate.
Stratification	By age and gender using the latest Census information (2016) and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. Smaller areas such as Atlantic Canada were marginally oversampled to allow for a minimum regional sample.
