### Canadians more likely to want to continue with large deficits rather than returning to pre-pandemic deficit levels

Two in five Canadians say the best path forward is having the government continue to have large deficits in order to continue to support Canadians, while under three in ten say the best path forward is having the government return the deficit to pre-pandemic levels, even if it means reducing support for Canadians.

- Two in five Canadians say the best path forward is having the government continue to have large deficits in order to continue to support Canadians When asked what the best path forward, forty-one per cent of Canadians say that the best path forward is having the government continue to have large deficits in order to continue to support Canadians, while twenty-nine per cent say the best path forward is having the government return the deficit to pre-pandemic levels, even if it means reducing support for Canadians and fourteen per cent say the best path forward is having the government try to balance the books by reducing the deficit to zero, even if it means significantly reducing support for Canadians. Sixteen per cent are unsure.
- Canadians from British Columbia are more likely to say they prefer having the government continue to have large deficits in order to continue to support Canadians than those from the Prairies or Quebec When asked what the best path forward to address the deficit, over one in two residents of British Columbia (52%) say the best path forward would be having the government continue to have large deficits in order to continue to support Canadians, while over three in ten Canadians from the Prairies (31%) and Quebec (35%) say the same.

### **SUMMARY**



Men are more likely than women to say that the best path forward is having the government try to balance the books by reducing the deficit to zero

• Men are more likely than women to say that the best path forward is having the government try to balance the books by reducing the deficit to zero, even if it means significantly reducing support for Canadians — When asked what the best path forward to addressing the annual federal deficit of about \$30 billion, men (22%)more often said having the government try to balance the books by reducing the deficit to zero, even if it means significantly reducing support for Canadians than women (7%). Just under one in two women say the best path forward is having the government continue to have large deficits in order to continue to support Canadians (47%) while just over one in three men say the same (34%).


These observations are based on an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,039 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between August 31<sup>st</sup> to September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for this survey is ±3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

### **METHODOLOGY**



Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,039 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between August 31<sup>st</sup> and September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ±3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

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
