## Three way split on the approach the federal government should take to borrowing during the pandemic

Men are more likely than women to think that the federal government should show restraint when it comes to borrowing money given the size of the deficit and the demands of the pandemic

There is a three-way split on the approach Canadians think the federal government should take in terms of borrowing money to fight the pandemic.

- Canadians are split on their preferred approach for the government in terms of borrowing money to fight the pandemic More than one third (36%) of Canadians think that the federal government should borrow what it needs to fight the pandemic plus borrow more to invest in the social and economic priorities of Canadians beyond the requirements of the pandemic, while 30 per cent think the federal government should show restraint given the size of the deficit and the demands of the pandemic, and 29 per cent think the government should only borrow what it needs to fight the pandemic. Six per cent are unsure.
- Canadians from the Atlantic region and British Columbia are more likely to say they think that the federal government should borrow what it needs to fight the pandemic plus borrow more to invest in the social and economic priorities Around four in ten residents of British Columbia (42%) and the Atlantic region (40%) think that the federal government should borrow what it needs to fight the pandemic plus borrow more to invest in the social and economic priorities of Canadians beyond the requirements of the pandemic, compared to 29 per cent of Quebec residents. Men (36%) are more likely than women (24%) to think that the federal government should show restraint given the size of the deficit and the demands of the pandemic.


These observations are based on a hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,003 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between September  $30^{th}$  and October  $4^{th}$ , 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 3.1$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,003 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between September 30<sup>th</sup> and October 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 3.1$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
