
Importance of protecting our border and ensuring safe communities has increased since 2019; importance of fighting terrorism has decreased

Nanos Policy Map Summary

Summary

Nanos tracking on security issues shows an increase in the importance of ensuring safe communities and the continued importance of protecting our border, while there is a decrease in the importance of fighting terrorism. Confidence in our ability as a nation to find solutions to the various security measures remains consistent with the 2019 wave.

- Confidence in fighting terrorism remains consistent with 2019 Canadians rated fighting terrorism a mean score of 7.3 on a ten point scale in terms of importance, compared to 7.6 in 2019, 7.4 in 2017, 7.1 in 2016 and 6.4 in 2015. Six in ten Canadians are confident (13%) or somewhat confident (43%) in Canada's ability to find solutions to terrorism. This is consistent with the 2019 wave of research.
- Consistent with 2019, asserting Canada's role in international affairs scores the lowest in importance Rating the importance of asserting Canada's role in international affairs, Canadians gave a mean score of 7.0 out of 10, similar to 7.1 in 2019 and 2017. This measure registered as the lowest in terms of importance. Confidence in finding solutions also remains consistent, with half of Canadians saying they are either confident (10%) or somewhat confident (40%) in finding solutions to this security issue.
- Ensuring safe communities continues to be the most important security issue When rating the importance of various security issues using a ten point scale, ensuring safe communities was deemed the most important by Canadians (mean score of 8.5; 8.2 in 2019). Close to two thirds of Canadians say they are either confident (14%) or somewhat confident (49%) in finding solutions to ensure safer communities, consistent with the previous wave (12% confident and 53% somewhat confident in 2019).
- Importance of protecting borders sees a slight increase in 2020, while confidence remains consistent Canadians rated the importance of protecting our borders as 8.1 out of 10 in 2020, compared to 7.6 in 2019 and 7.9 in 2017. Confidence on this measure is consistent with the 2019 wave. In 2020, 19 per cent say they are confident and 43 per cent somewhat confident in our ability to find solutions to protect our borders, while 17 per cent said confident and 42 per cent said somewhat confident in 2019.
- **Fighting terrorism sees a decrease in importance** Canadians rate the importance of fighting terrorism a score of 7.3, down from 7.6 in 2019, but still higher than the low of 6.4 in 2015. Confidence in this measure remains consistent with recent waves.

These observations are based on a hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,003 Canadians between September 30th and October 4th, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,003 Canadians is ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.



Canada Policy - Confidence vs. Importance Map 2019 vs 2020







Importance of Canada's role in international affairs





Importance of border protection





Importance of fighting terrorism






Confidence in nation's ability to find solutions

Confidence in ensuring safe communities



Confidence in Canada's role in international affairs





Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,003 Canadians between September 30th and October 4th, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,003 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians between February 2^{nd} and 5^{th} , 2019, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians between July 23^{rd} to 26^{th} , 2017, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

A representative online random survey of 1,000 Canadians, conducted from July 5th to 9th, 2012, accurate 3.1 percentage points plus or minus, 19 times out of 20;

A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell- lines) random telephone survey of 1,013 Canadians conducted between April 6th and 9th, 2013 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,013 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20; and,

A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians conducted between May 24^{th} and May 28^{th} , 2015 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians conducted between July 28^{th} and August 1^{st} , 2016, as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
