Election Snapshot as of September 20

One in ten voters report they are likely to change their vote in the provincial election

With days left in the New Brunswick provincial election campaign, to follow are the results going into the last weekend. This should be considered an estimate of opinion for the last week of the election. In the experience of Nanos, election preferences may change in the closing weekend of the election factoring the momentum of the campaigns and the events of the closing weekend. Likewise, this survey estimates popular support within the margin of error and not the number of seats which could be won by the respective provincial parties.

- Issue The top five unprompted issues reported by voters were healthcare (16%), education (12%), the deficit (11%), the economy (11%) and jobs (8%).
- Accessible Voters Voters were asked, for each provincial political party a series of independent questions as to whether they would consider or not consider voting for that party (to estimate accessible voters independently for each party). The Liberals and PCs have equivalent levels of accessible voters (50% each) while 39 per cent would consider voting Green, 31 per cent would consider voting NDP and 27 per cent would consider voting for the People's Alliance.
- Fluidity of Vote Preference Of note, on the ballot question, 13 per cent of voters said they were unsure. Asked separately their likelihood to change their vote for the election 10 per cent said they were likely to change their vote and another 11 per cent said they were somewhat likely to change their vote.
- Reported Vote Preference Ballot support before the closing weekend stands at 37 per cent for the Liberals, 30 percent for the PCs, 12 per cent for the People's Alliance, 11 per cent for the Greens and 10 per cent for the NDP.
- **Preferred Premier** Asked who they prefer as Premier, 25 per cent said Gallant, 22 per cent said Higgs, 12 per cent Coon, seven percent said Austin, seven percent said McKenzie, five percent said they preferred none and 23 per cent were unsure who they preferred.

These observations are based on a Nanos RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 500 New Brunswick voters, 18 years of age or older, conducted between September 17 and 20, 2018. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey in either English or French. The margin of error for a random survey of 500 New Brunswick voters is ±4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error for the subset of 431 decided voters is ±4.8 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.









Likelihood to change vote



Methodology

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 500 New Brunswick voters, 18 years of age or older, between September 17 and 20, 2018. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across New Brunswick. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of New Brunswick.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 500 New Brunswick voters is ±4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The margin of error for the random survey of 431 decided voters is ±4.8 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
