



Canadians support government programs to keep the elderly healthy, independent, and social.

Key Findings

1

POSITIVE ASPECTS OF AGING IN CANADA

Canadians most often answer that high quality healthcare/good doctors (21%) as a positive thing that comes to mind when thinking of getting old in Canada, followed by retiring (18%) and pension/social security (15%).

2

NEGATIVE ASPECTS OF AGING IN CANADA

When asked about negative things that come to mind when thinking of getting old in Canada, Canadians most often answer that the cost of living/lack of retirement funds/CPP is not enough (22%), followed by declining health/disease (16%).

3

HELPING PEOPLE OVER 65 STAY HEALTHY

Over nine in ten (91%) Canadians believe that it is important that Canada do a better job at helping people over 65 remain healthy and independent as they age.

4

FRAIL FAMILY MEMBERS OR FRIENDS

Two in five Canadians (44%) have either family members or friends who they would consider frail (32% family; 6% friend; 6% both).

CONCERN WITH FAMILY MEMBERS OR FRIENDS BECOMING FRAIL

Of the 34 per cent of Canadians who said that they are concerned about friends and family getting frail, 18 per cent said they are concerned because they are getting older/ it can happen without warning/ have to be concerned/prepared /it is part of aging.

WORRY FOR FRAILITY OF FRIENDS AND FAMILY

More than half (55%) of Canadians said that they occasionally worry about the frailty of family members/friends who are over 65, 23 per cent said that they regularly worry and 15 per cent said that they never worry.

7

SATISFACTION WITH LIVING AT HOME

Over four in five (83%) Canadians said that they would be satisfied (56%) or somewhat satisfied (27%) to live in their home as long as possible even if they became frail.

8

SUPPORT FOR HOME BASED HEALTHCARE

Over nine in ten (94%) Canadians said that they support (71%) or somewhat support (23%) having a government program where people over 65 living at home can access home-based healthcare support as long as it is required.

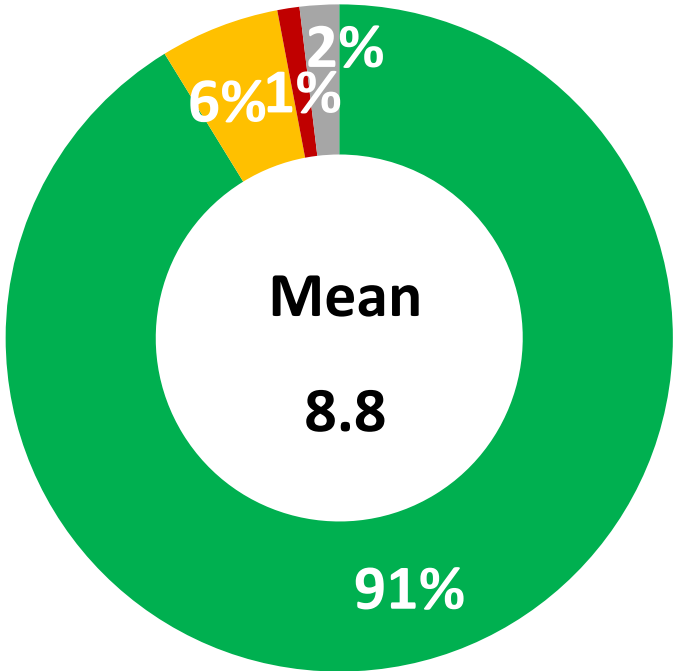

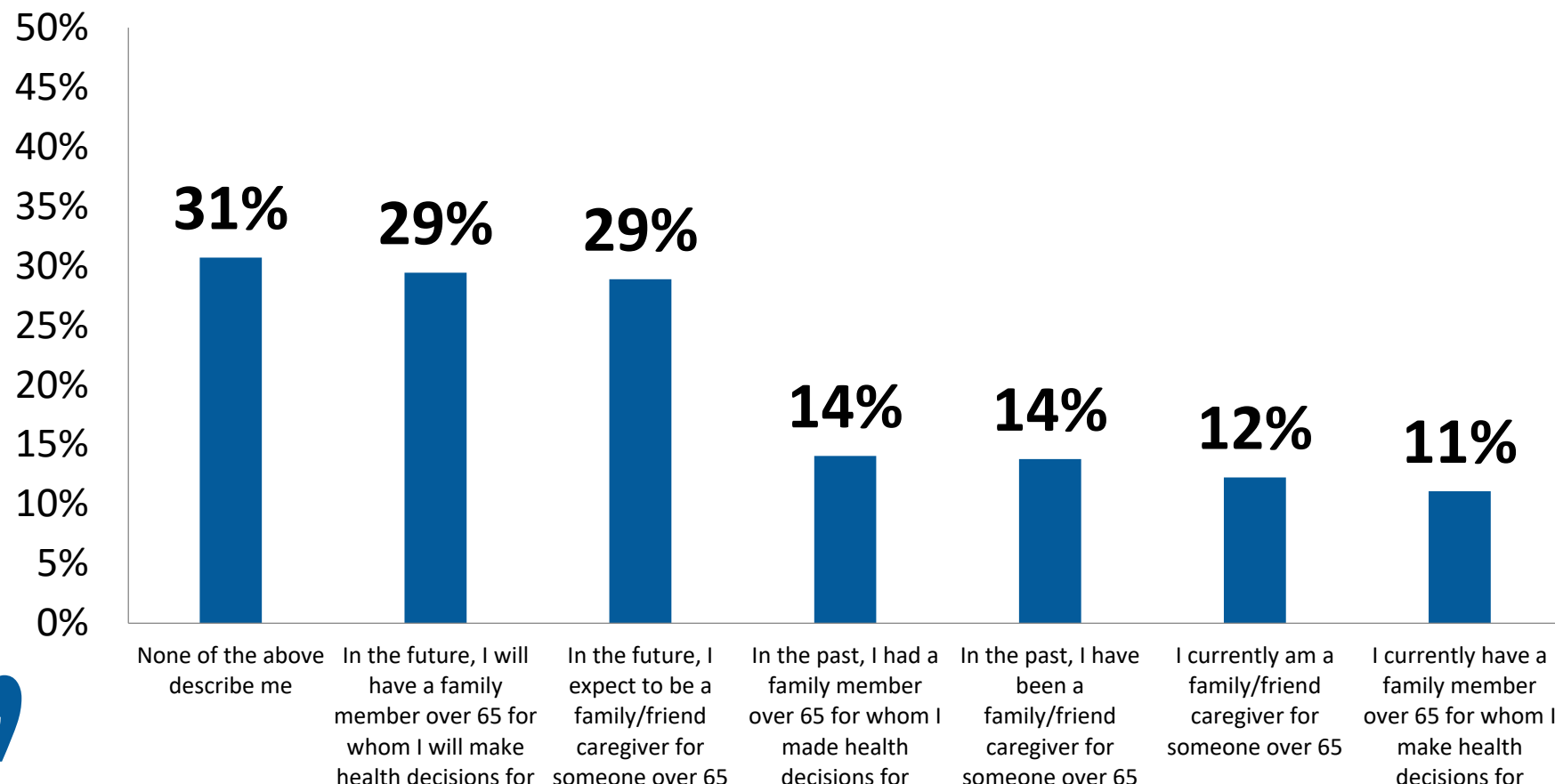

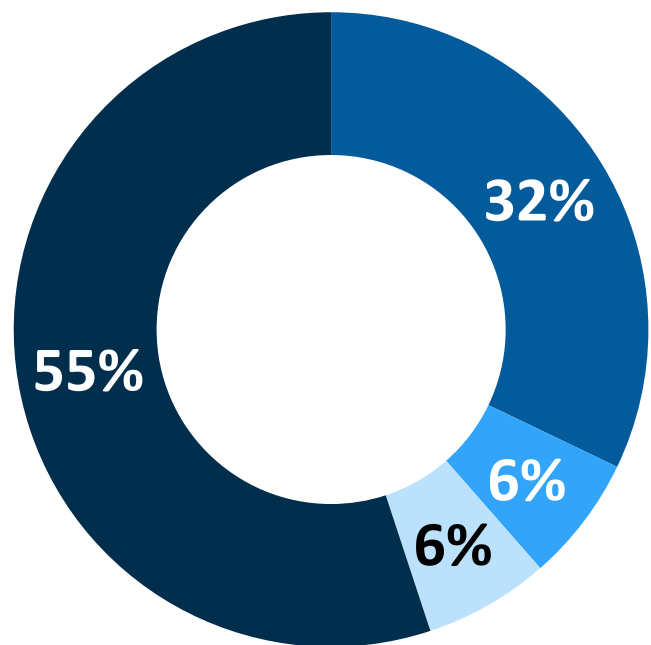

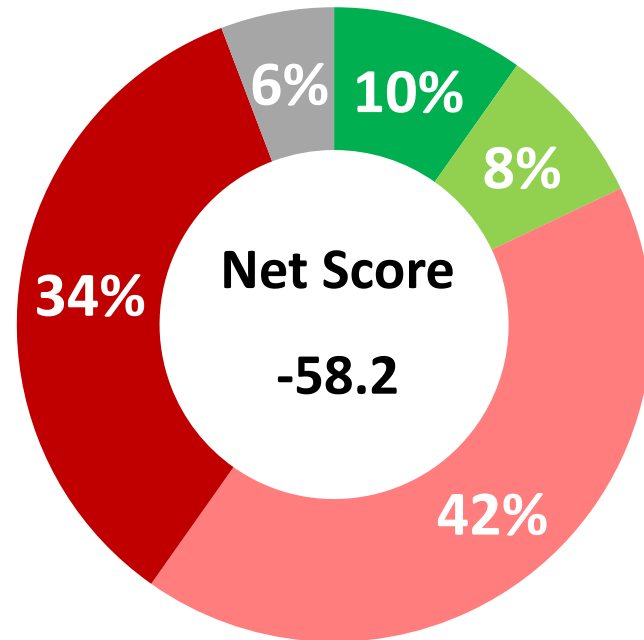

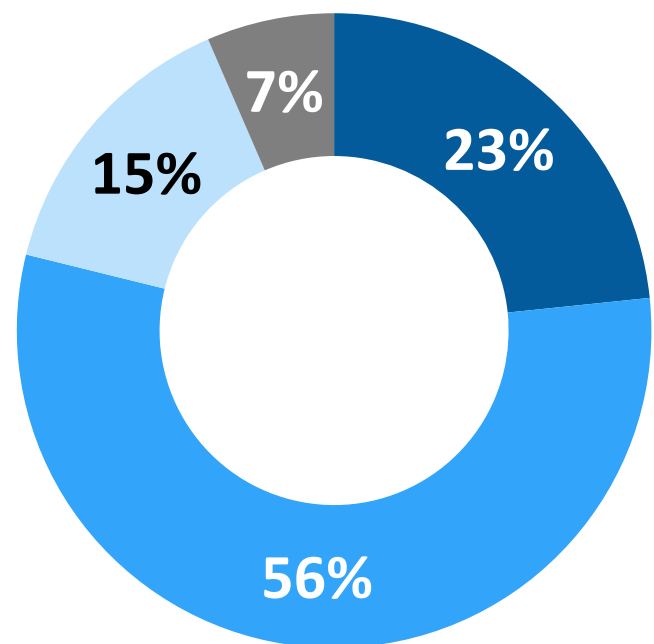

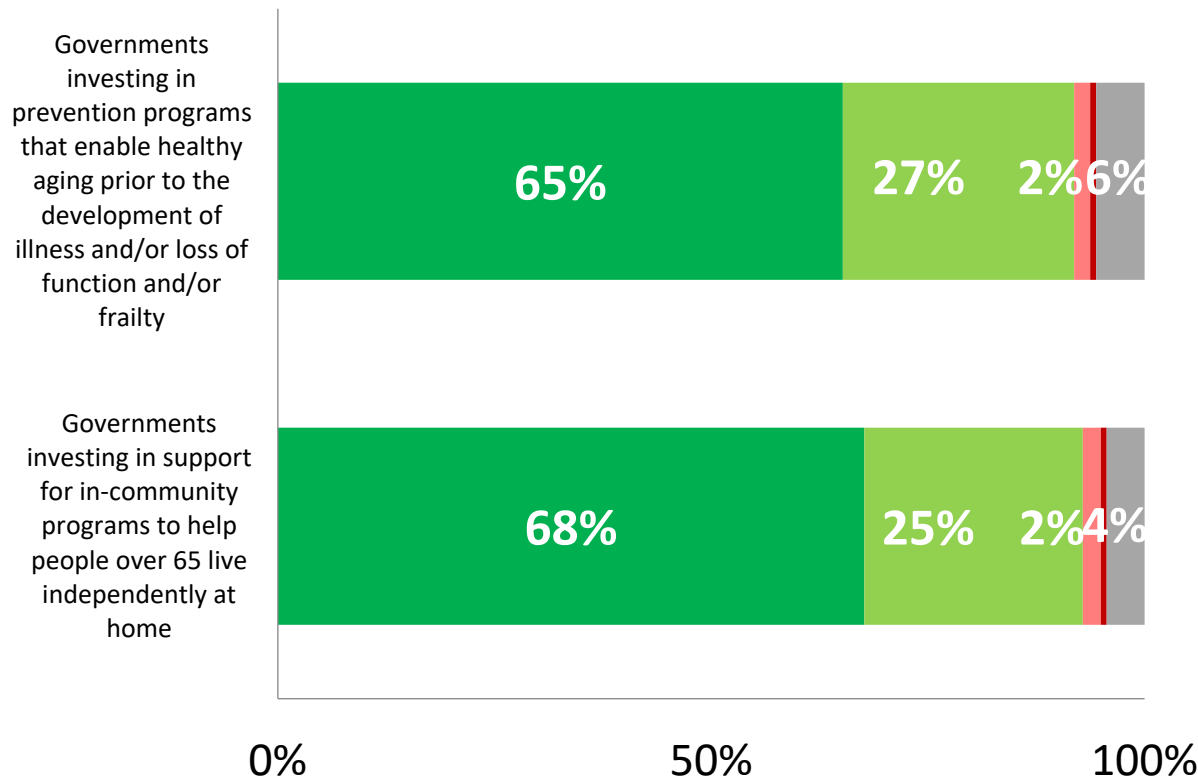

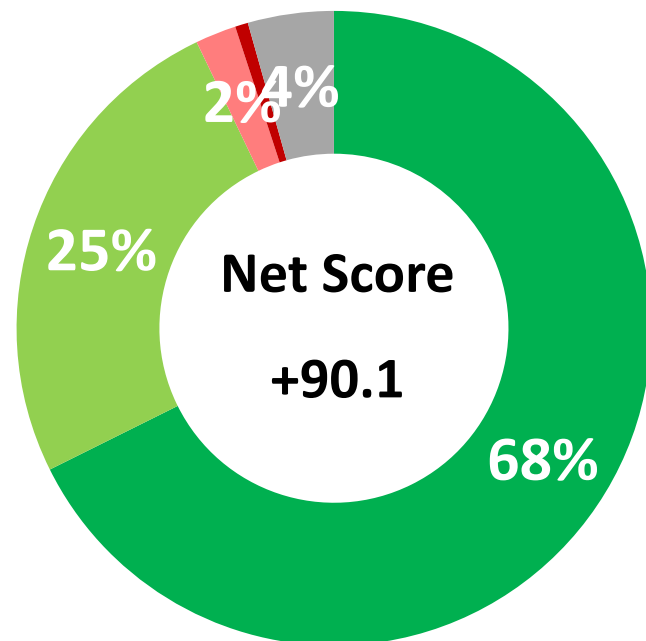

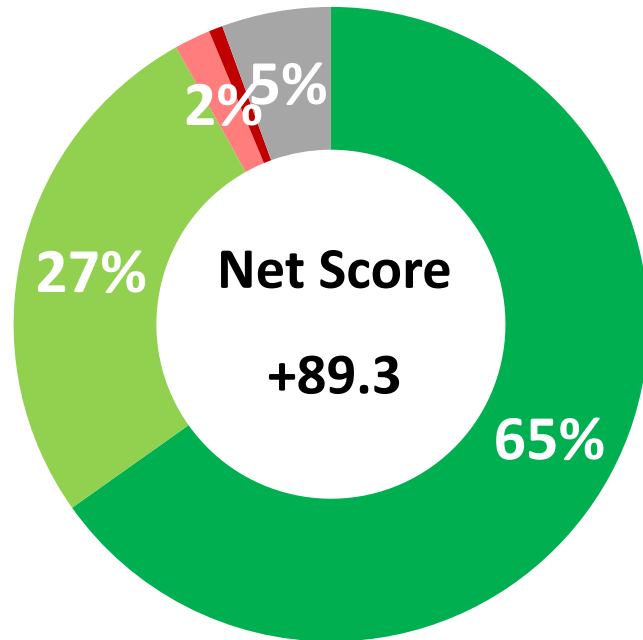

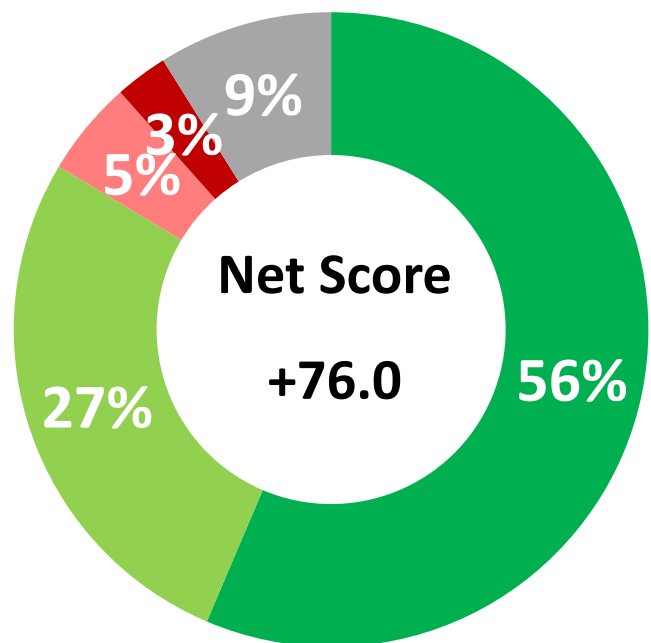

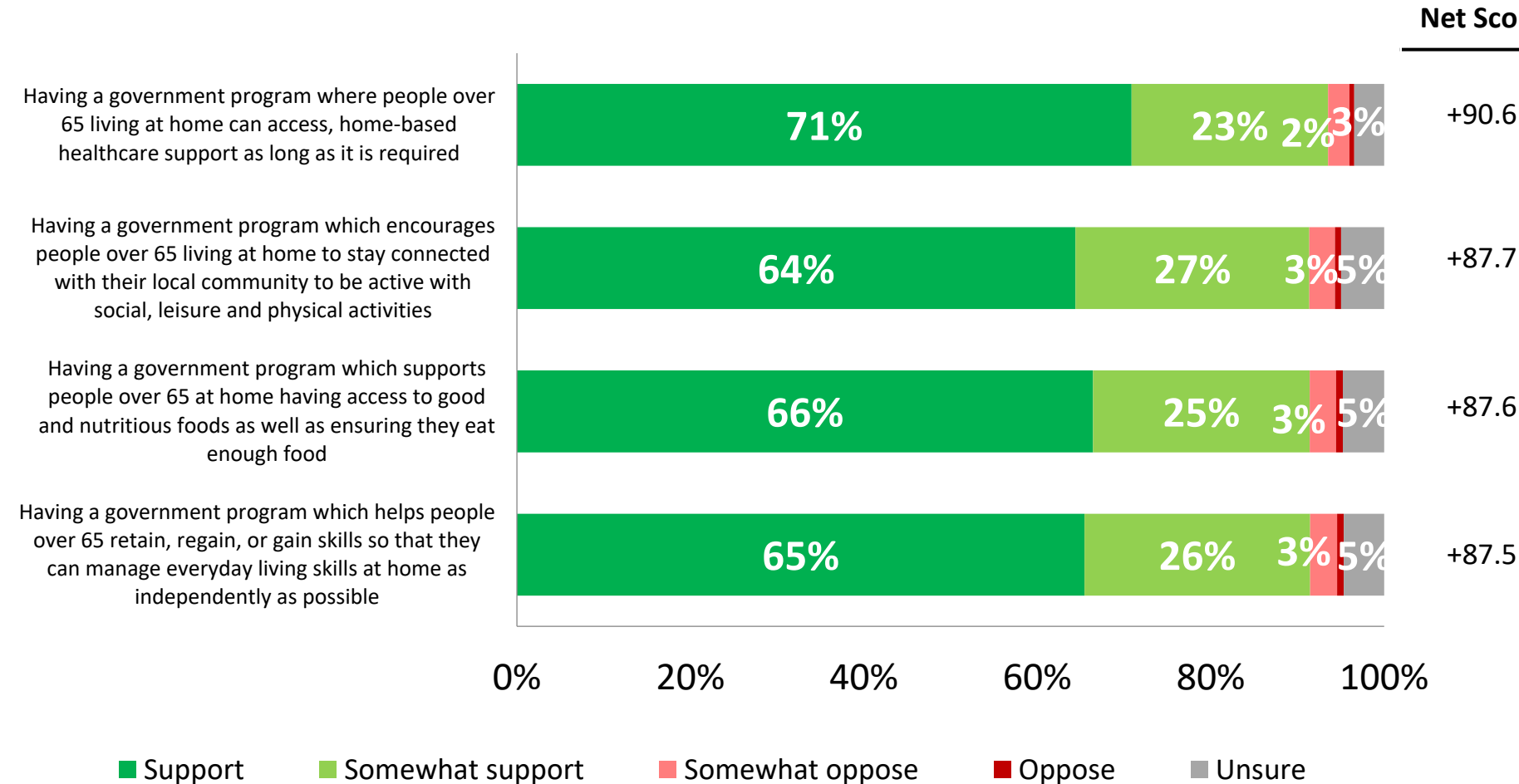

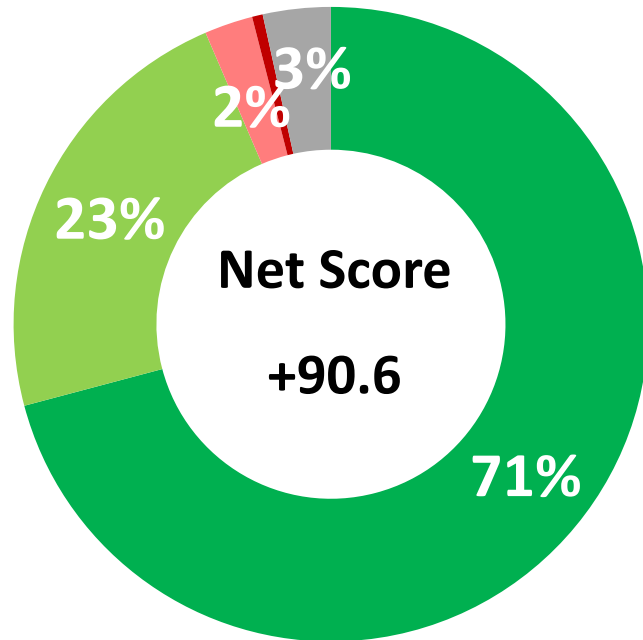

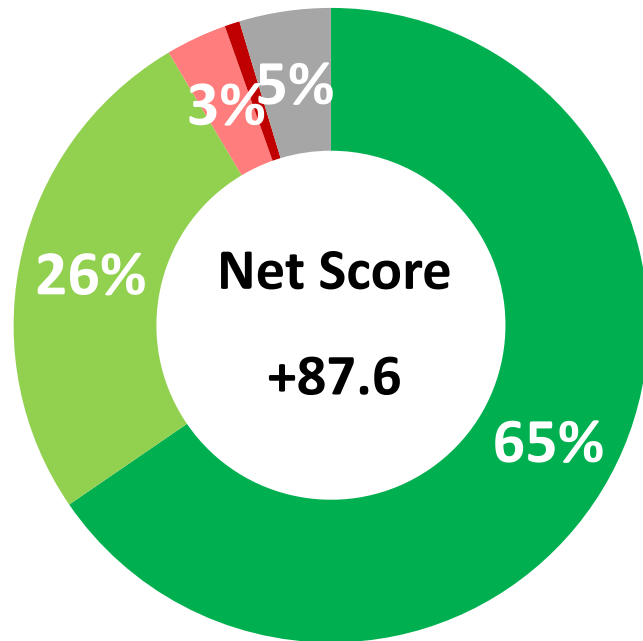

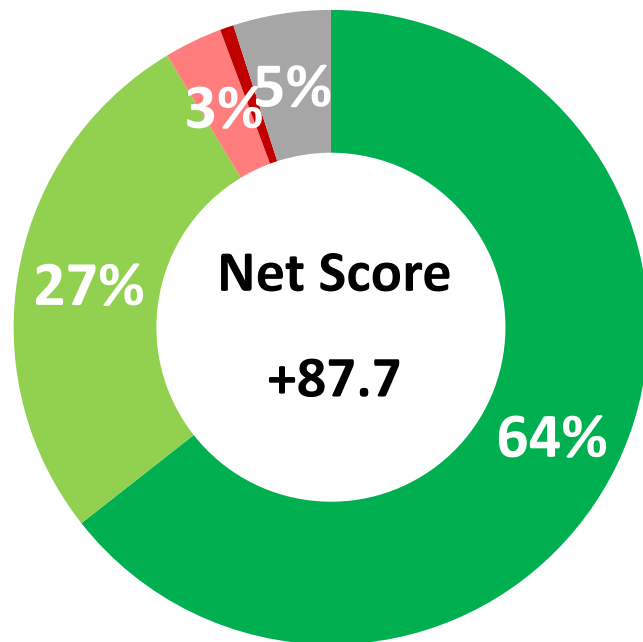

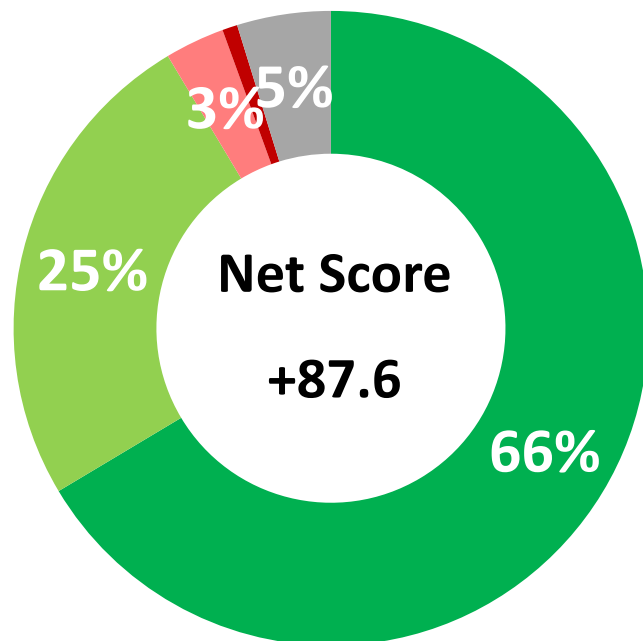

METHODOLOGY

Nanos conducted a representative online survey of 1,504 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between May 26th and 27th, 2021 as part of an online survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

The research was commissioned by Canadian Frailty Network and was conducted by Nanos Research.
