

Importance of improving quality of life for First Nations on reserves continues its rise since 2012.

Key Findings



IMPORTANCE SCORE CHANGES

The importance scores for social issues have remained relatively steady since 2020, except for improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves, which has continually been on the rise since 2012 having an increase in mean score of +1.3 from 2012 (mean of 6.8) to 2021 (mean of 8.1), with +0.4 from 2020 (mean of 7.7) to 2021(mean of 8.1).



LEVEL OF IMPORTANCE

Consistent with the previous wave from 2020, Canadians have the highest importance in terms of Canada's future to keeping our healthcare system strong (mean of 9.3), followed by responding to public health threats like a pandemic (mean of 9.0), while giving the lowest level of importance to encouraging Canadian culture (mean of 7.4)

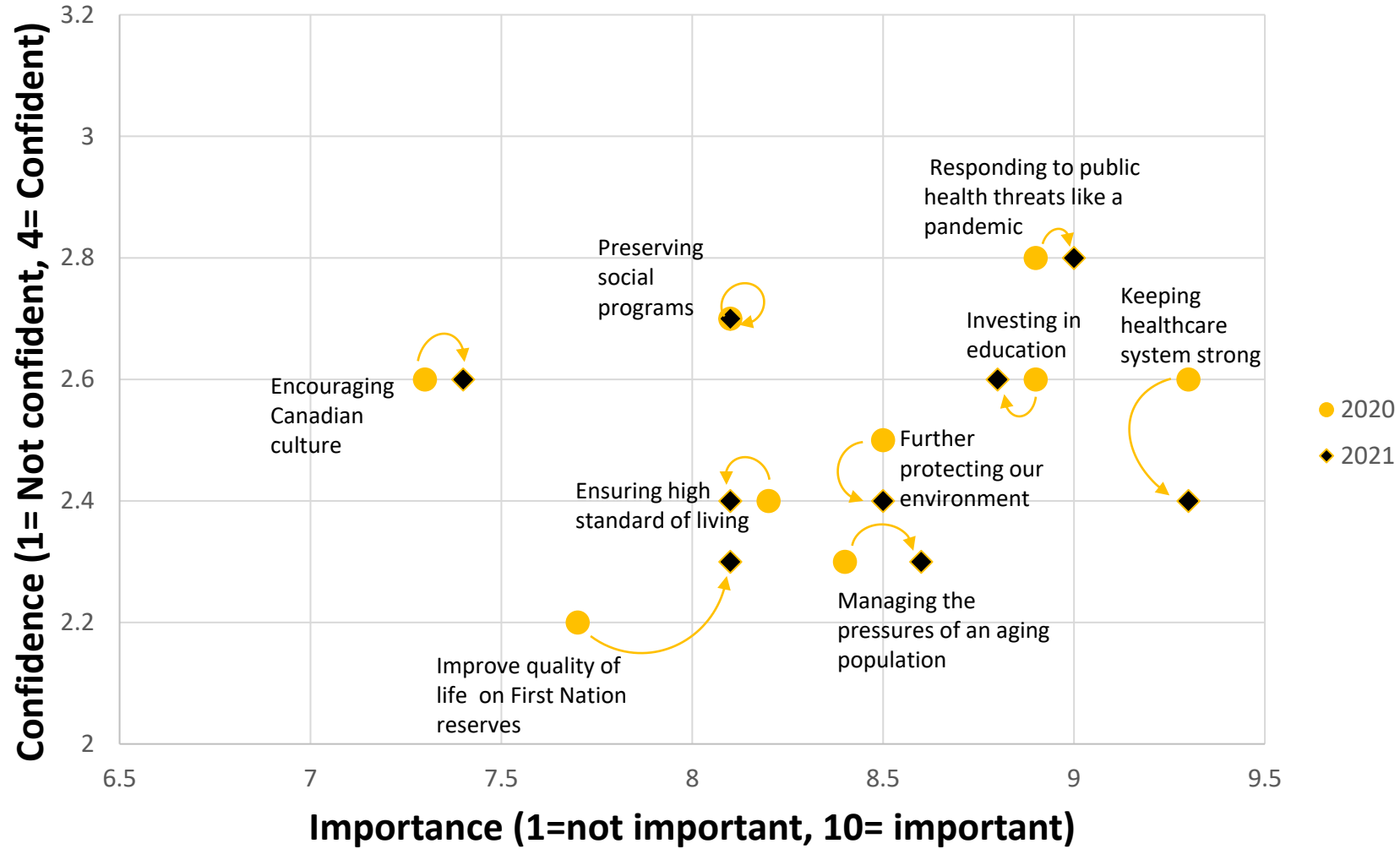


LEVEL OF CONFIDENCE

Canadians have the highest confidence level in the government's ability to find solutions to responding to public health threats like a pandemic, with 19 per cent confident and 50 per cent somewhat confident, while giving the lowest confidence level to finding solutions on improving the quality of life for First Nations living on reserves (seven per cent confident, 33% somewhat confident)

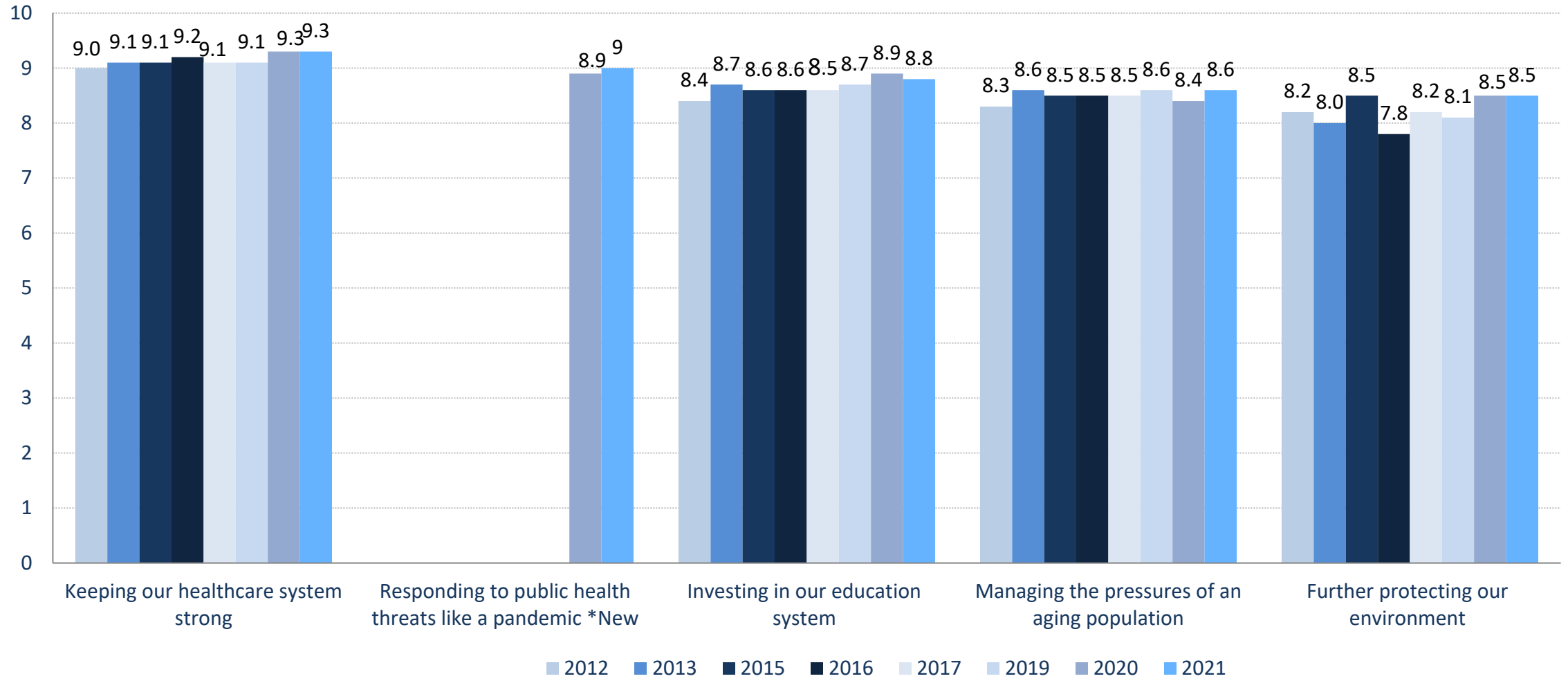

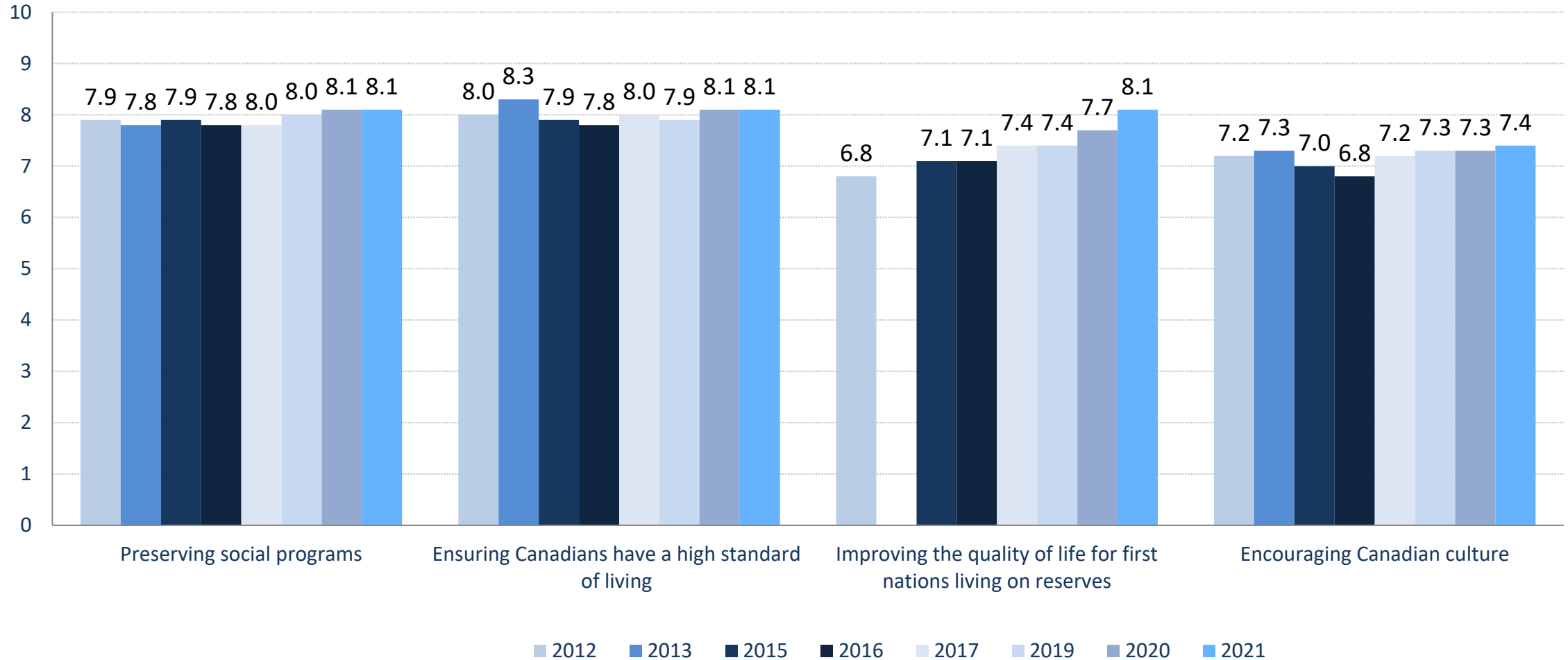

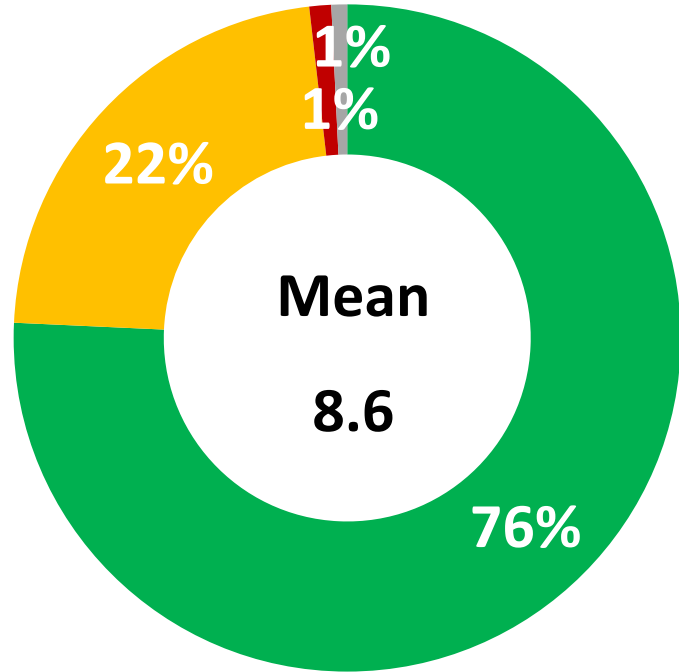

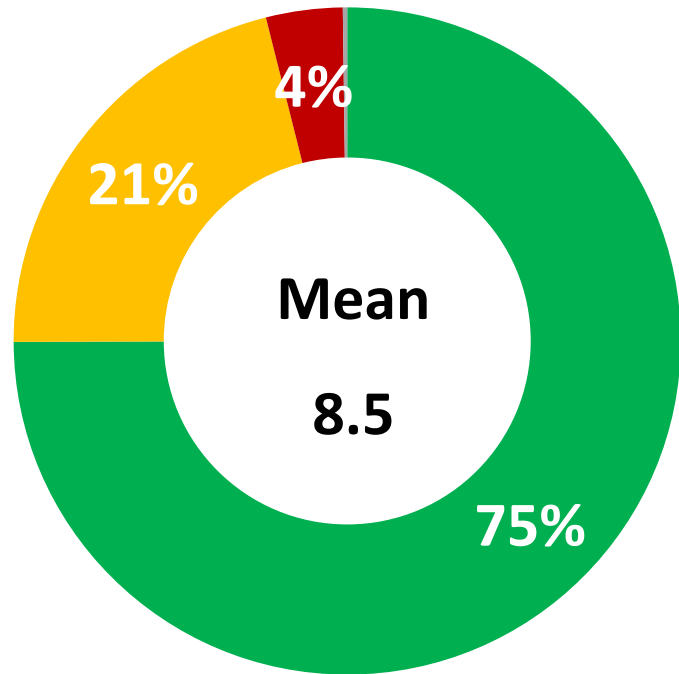

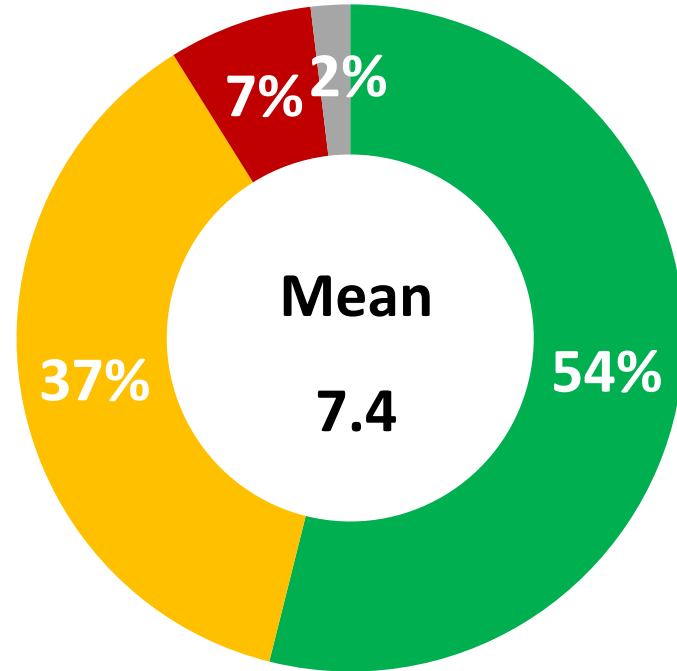

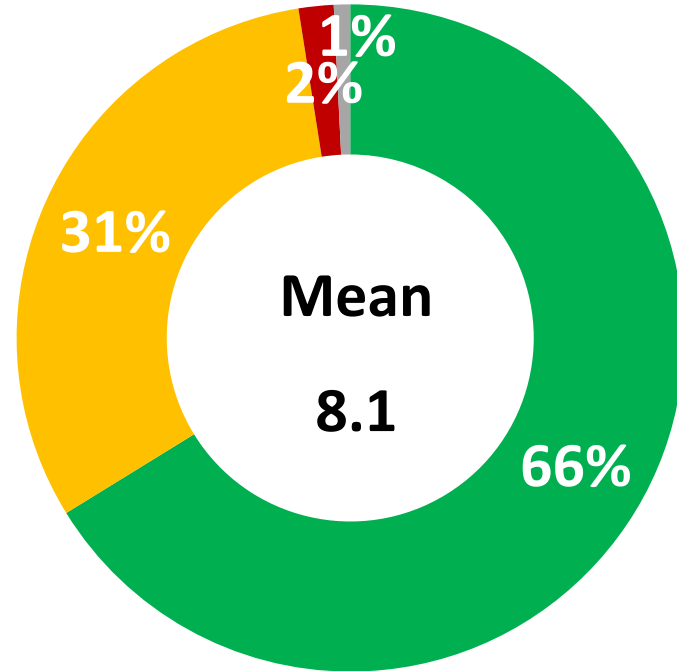

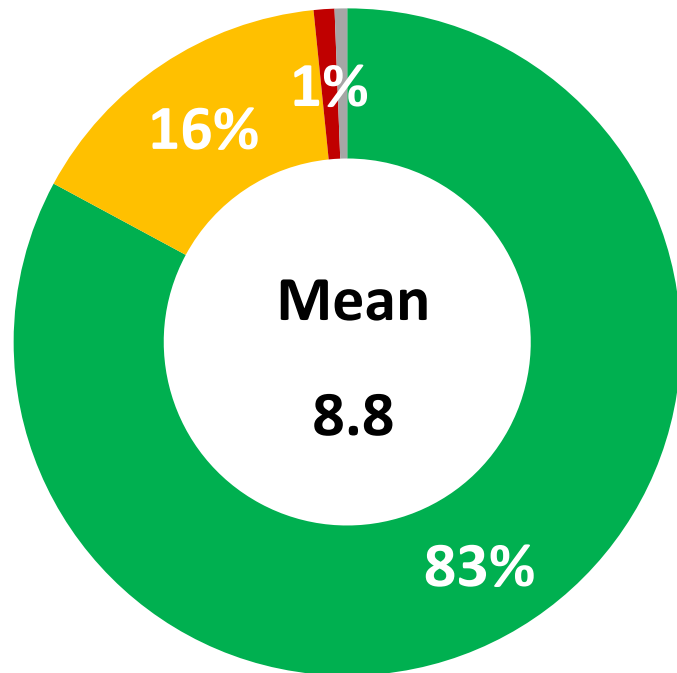

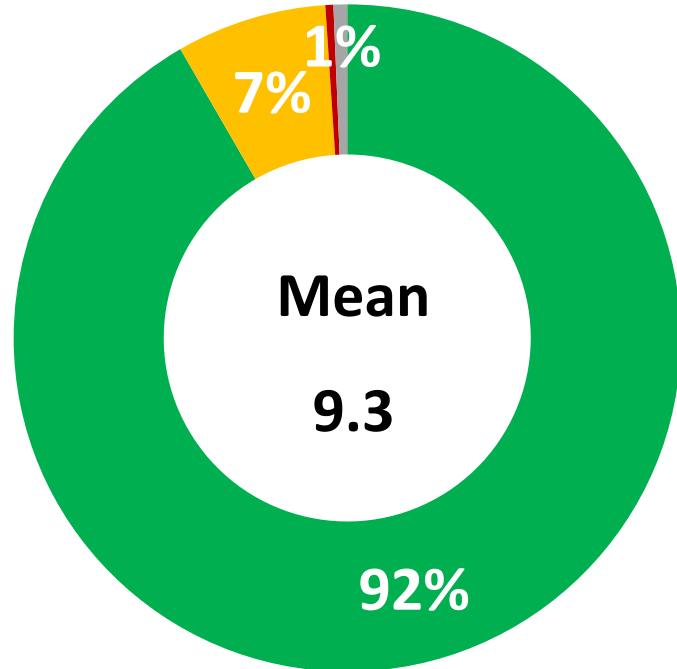

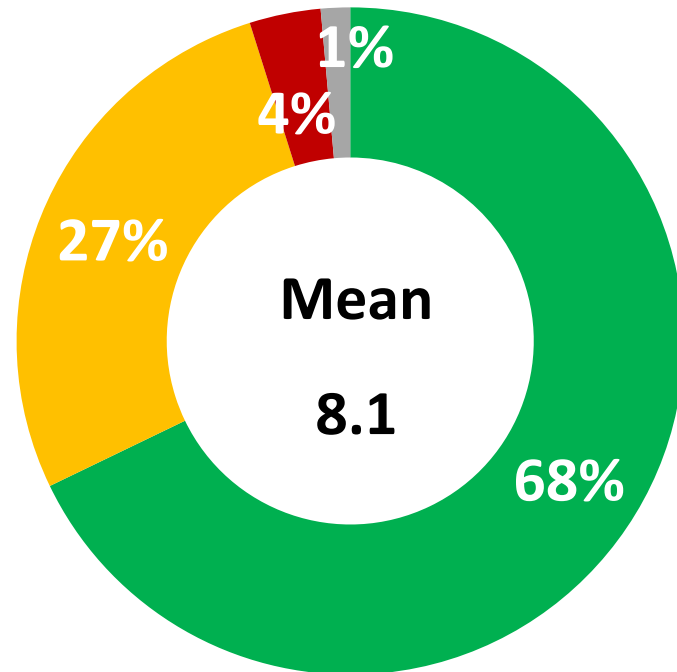

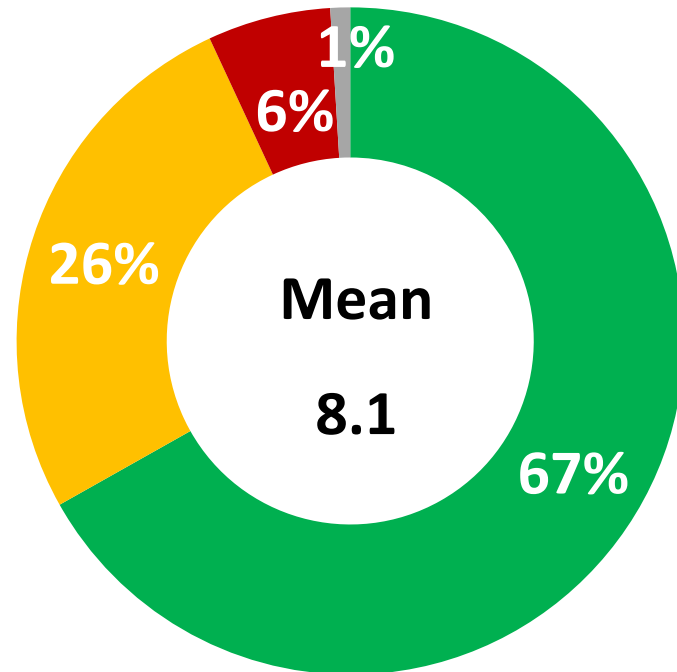

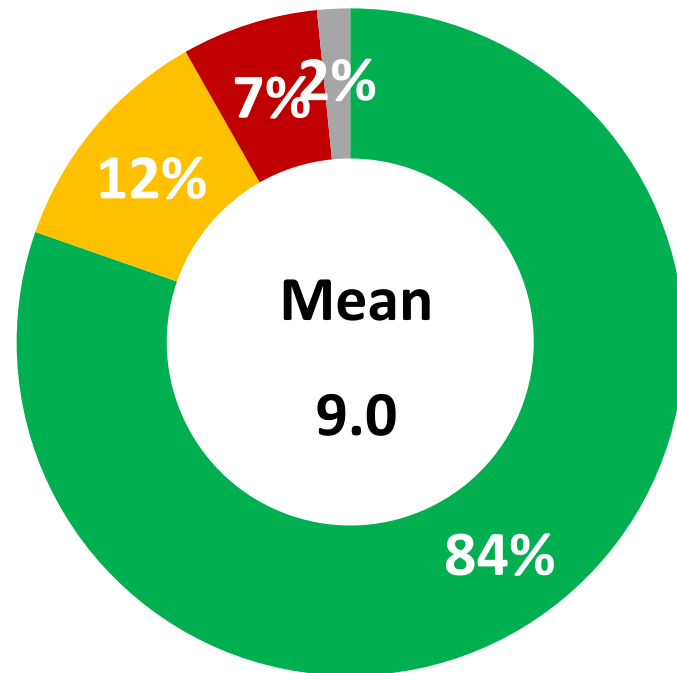

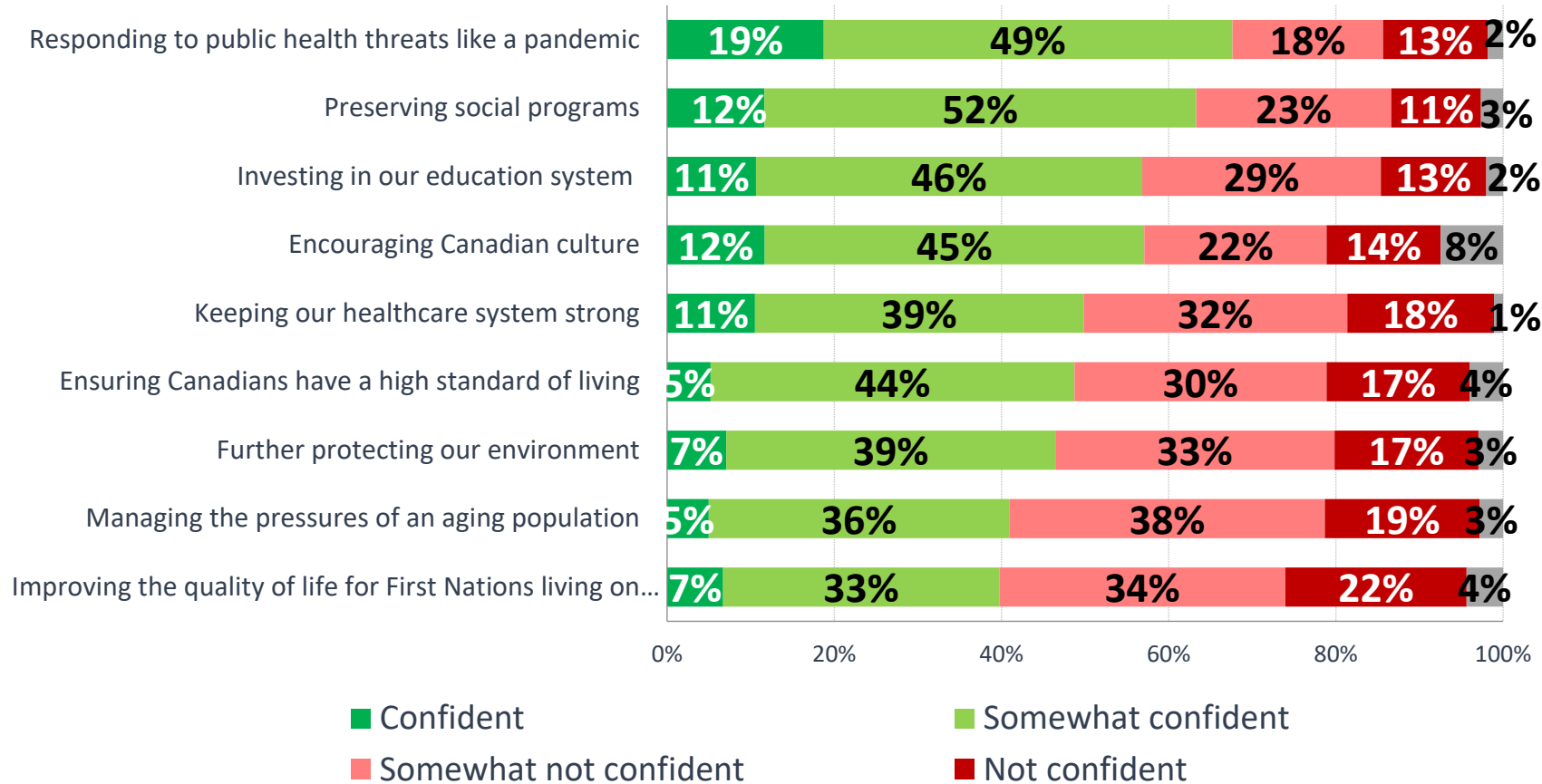

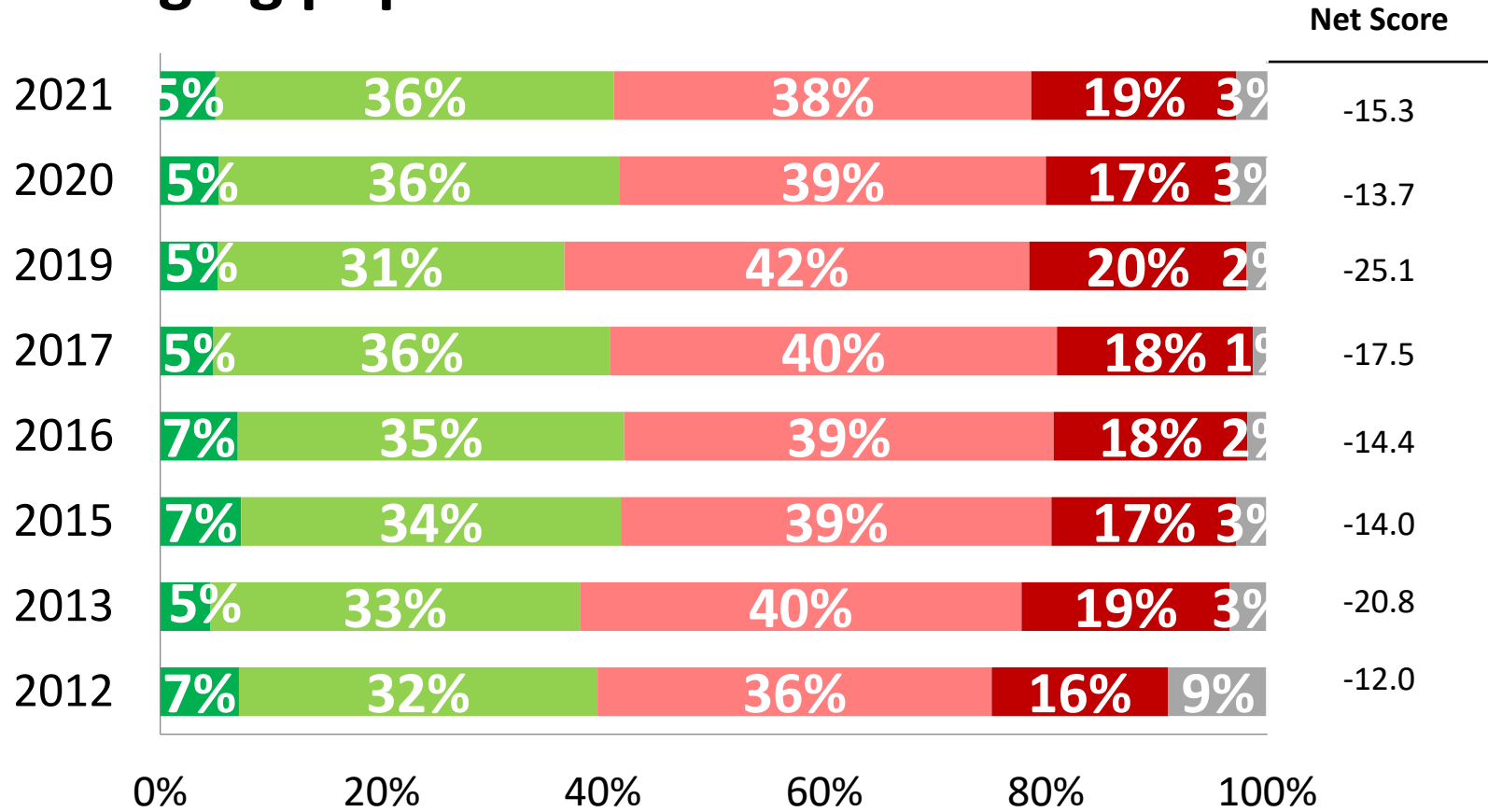


Confidence in managing pressures of an aging population

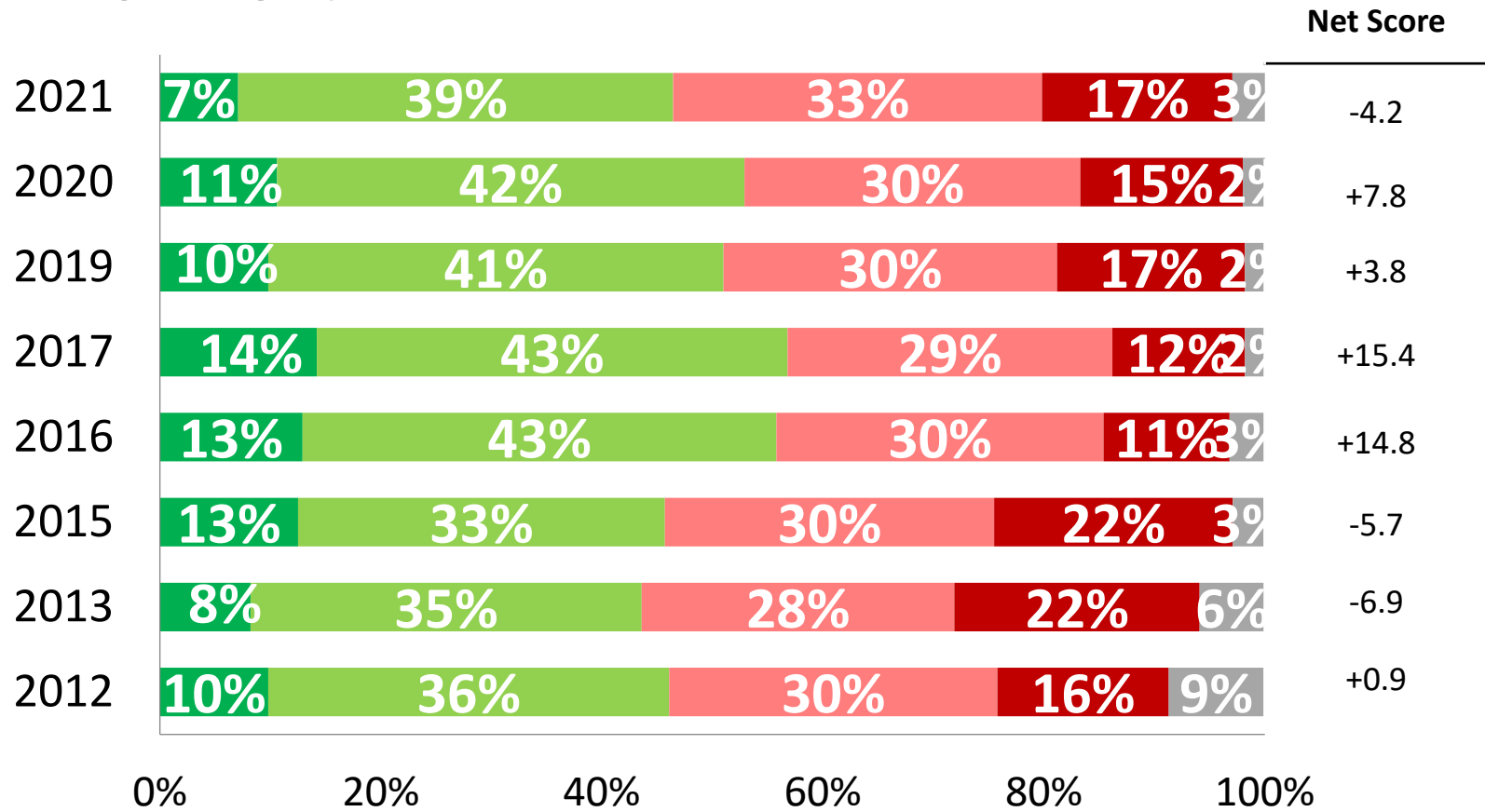

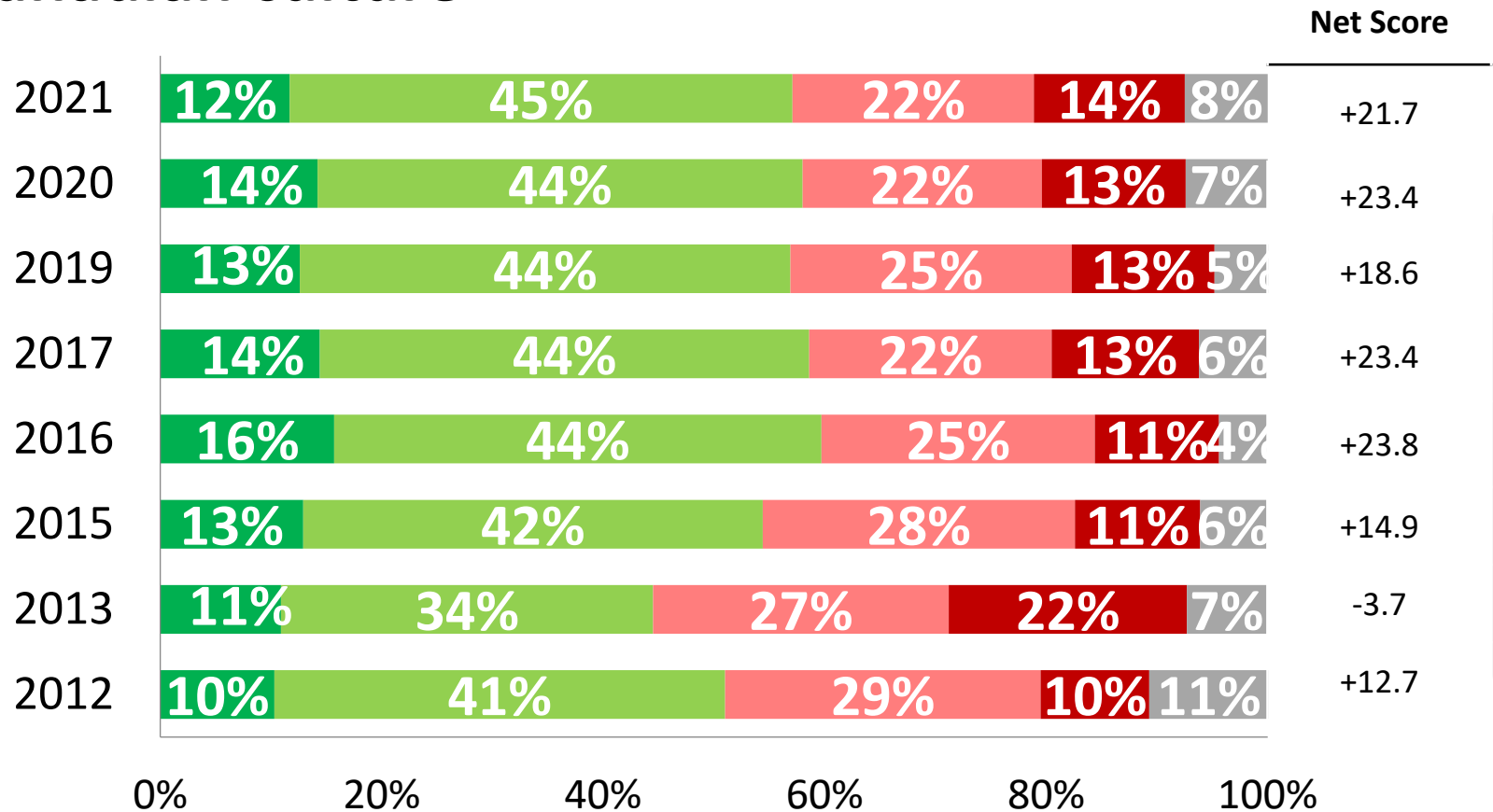

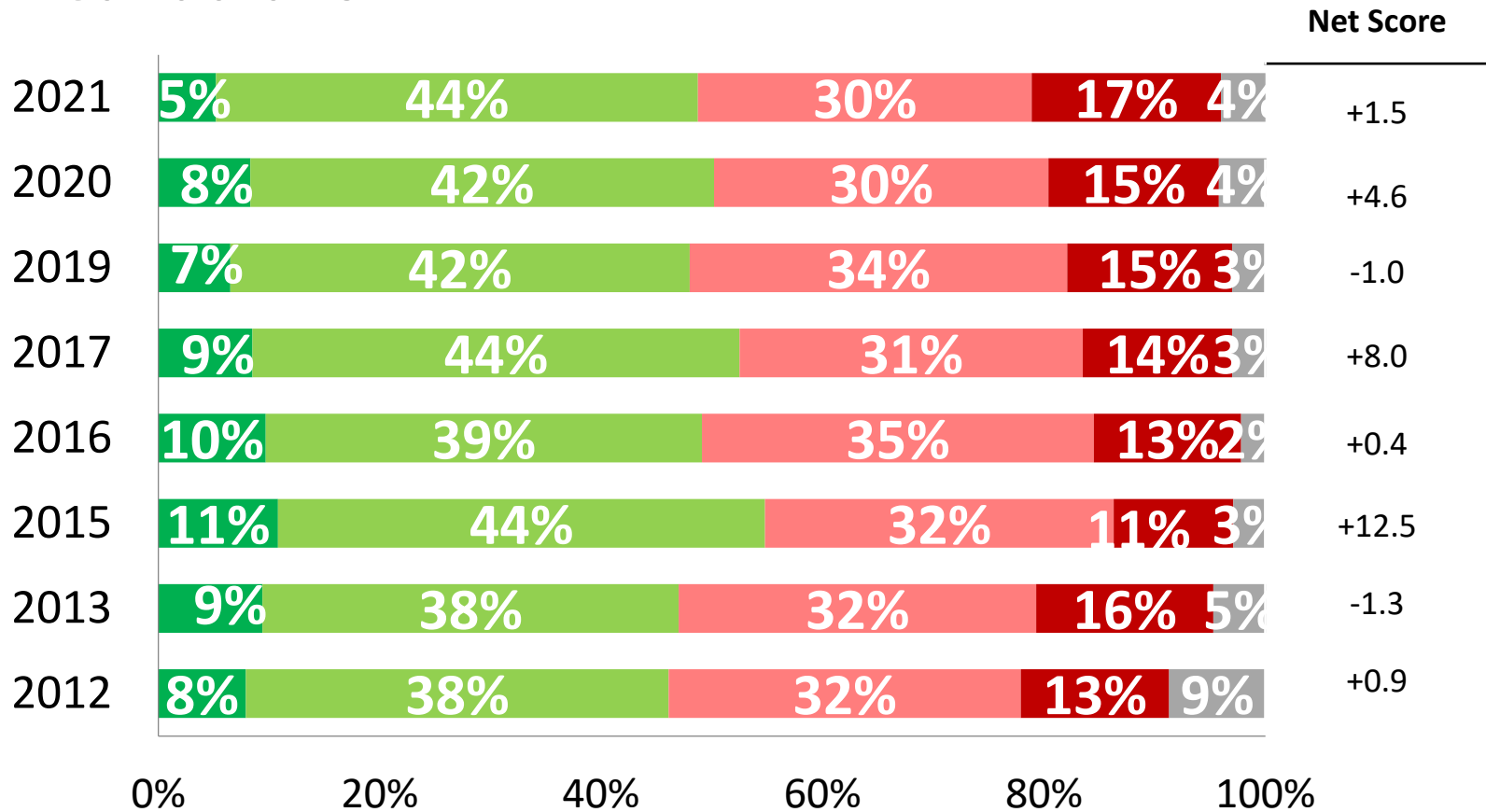

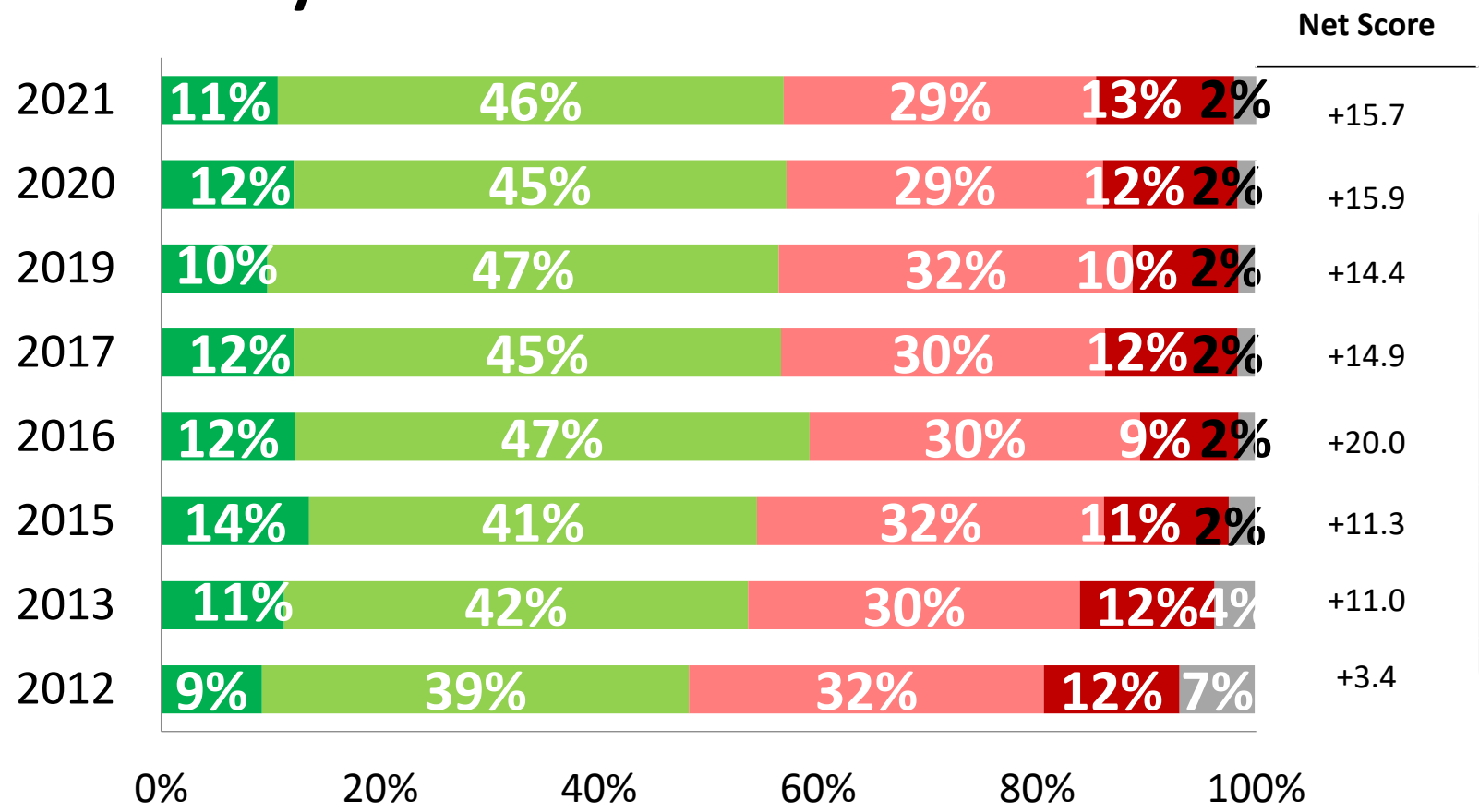

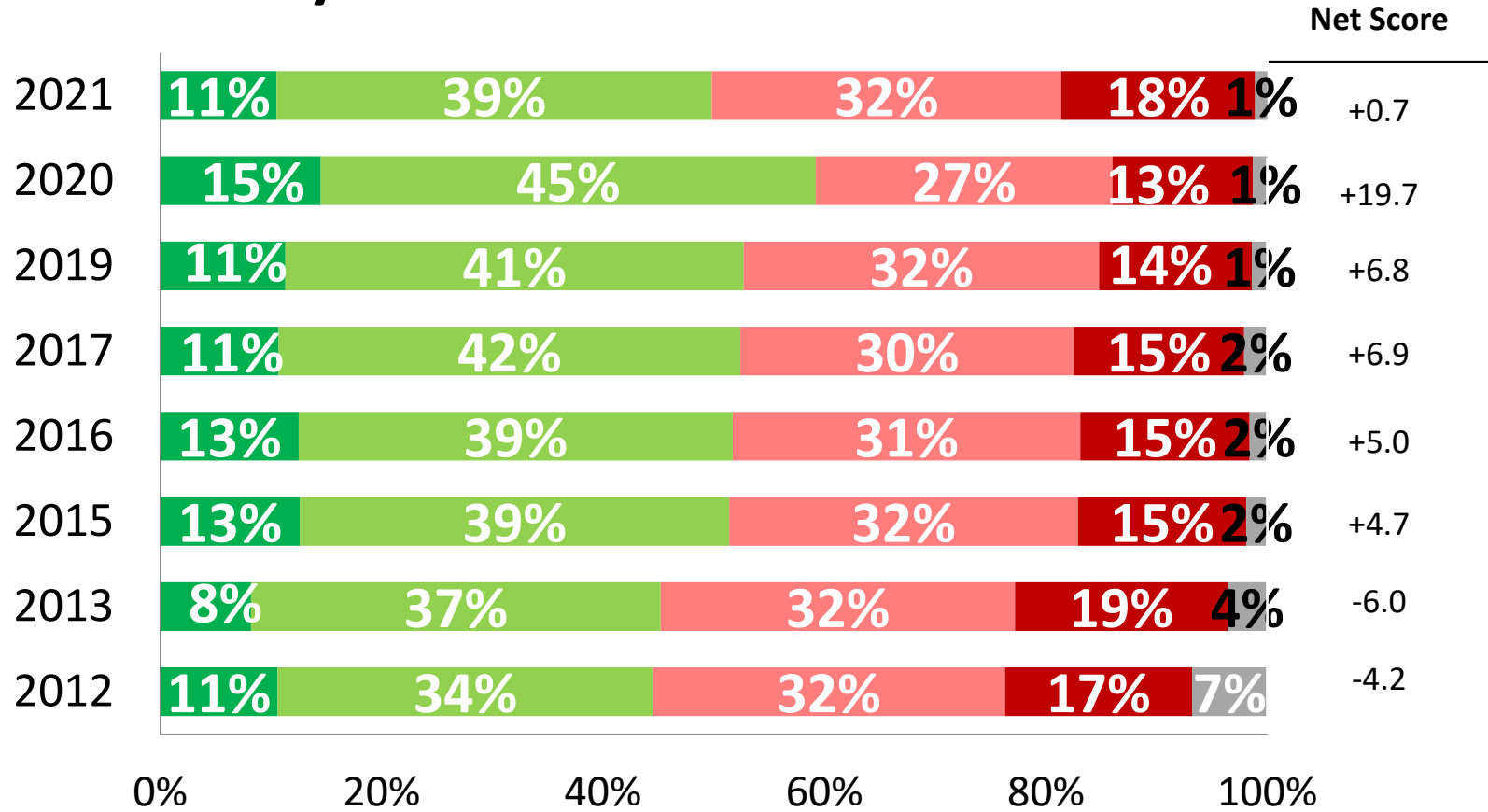

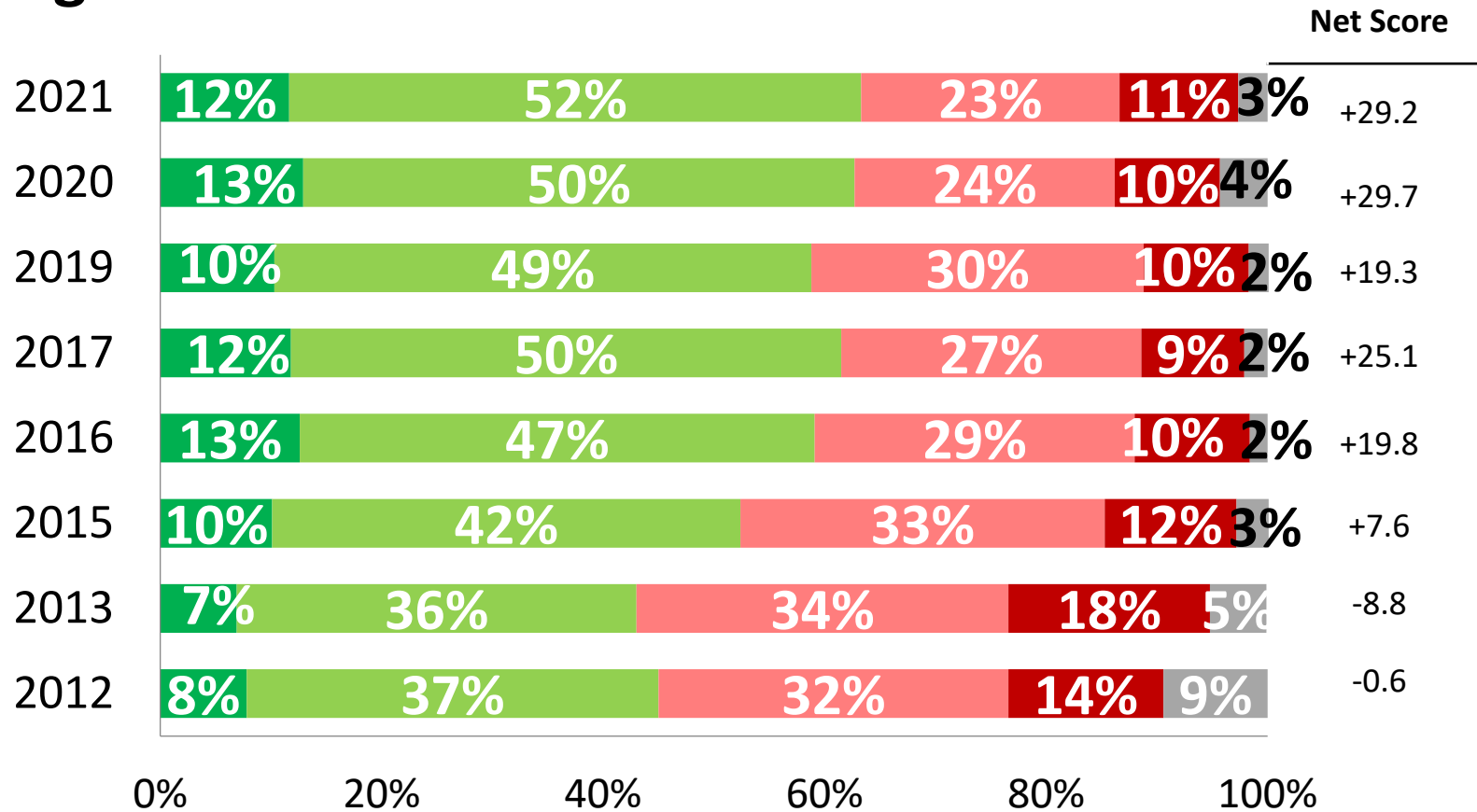

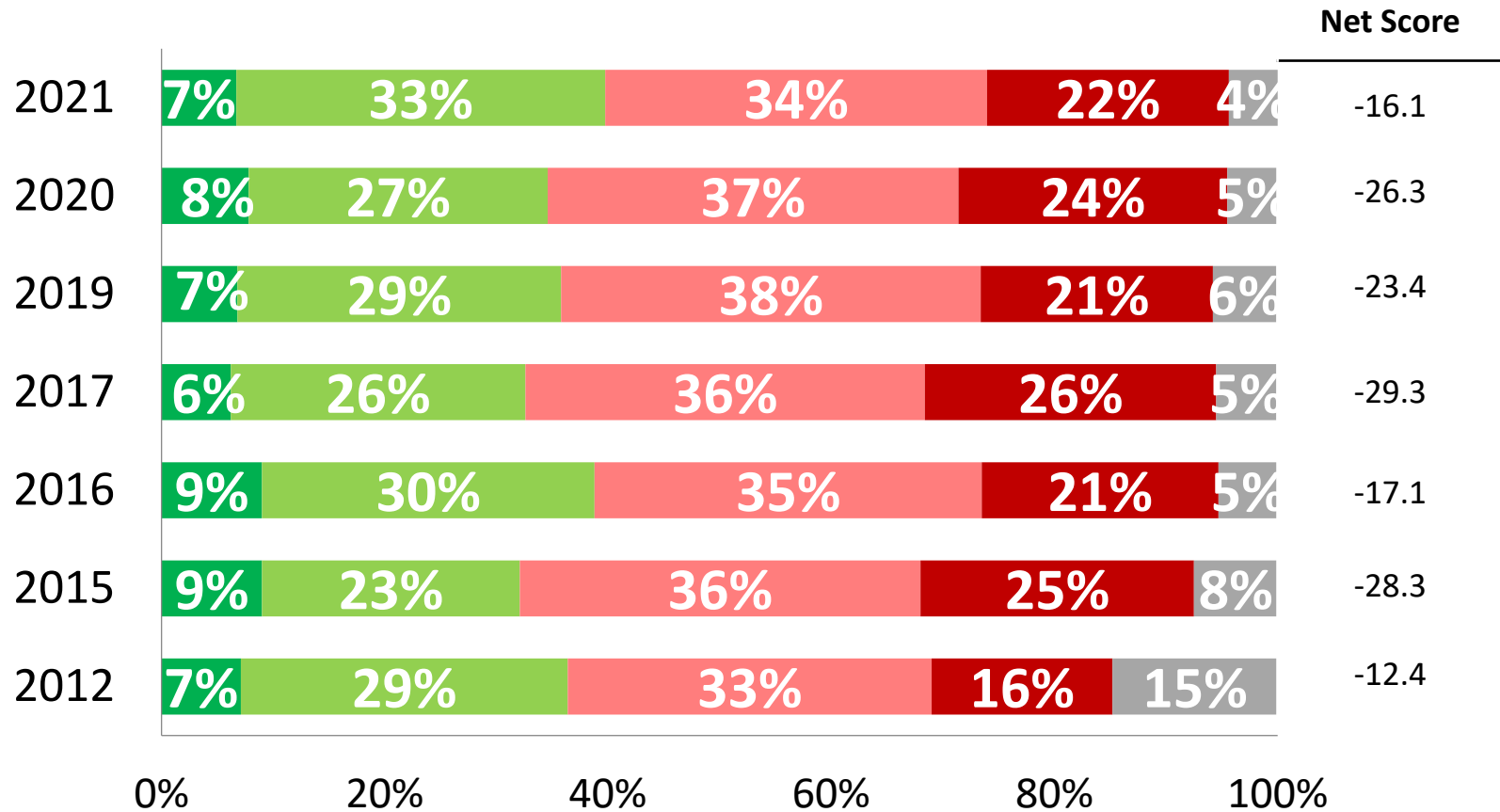

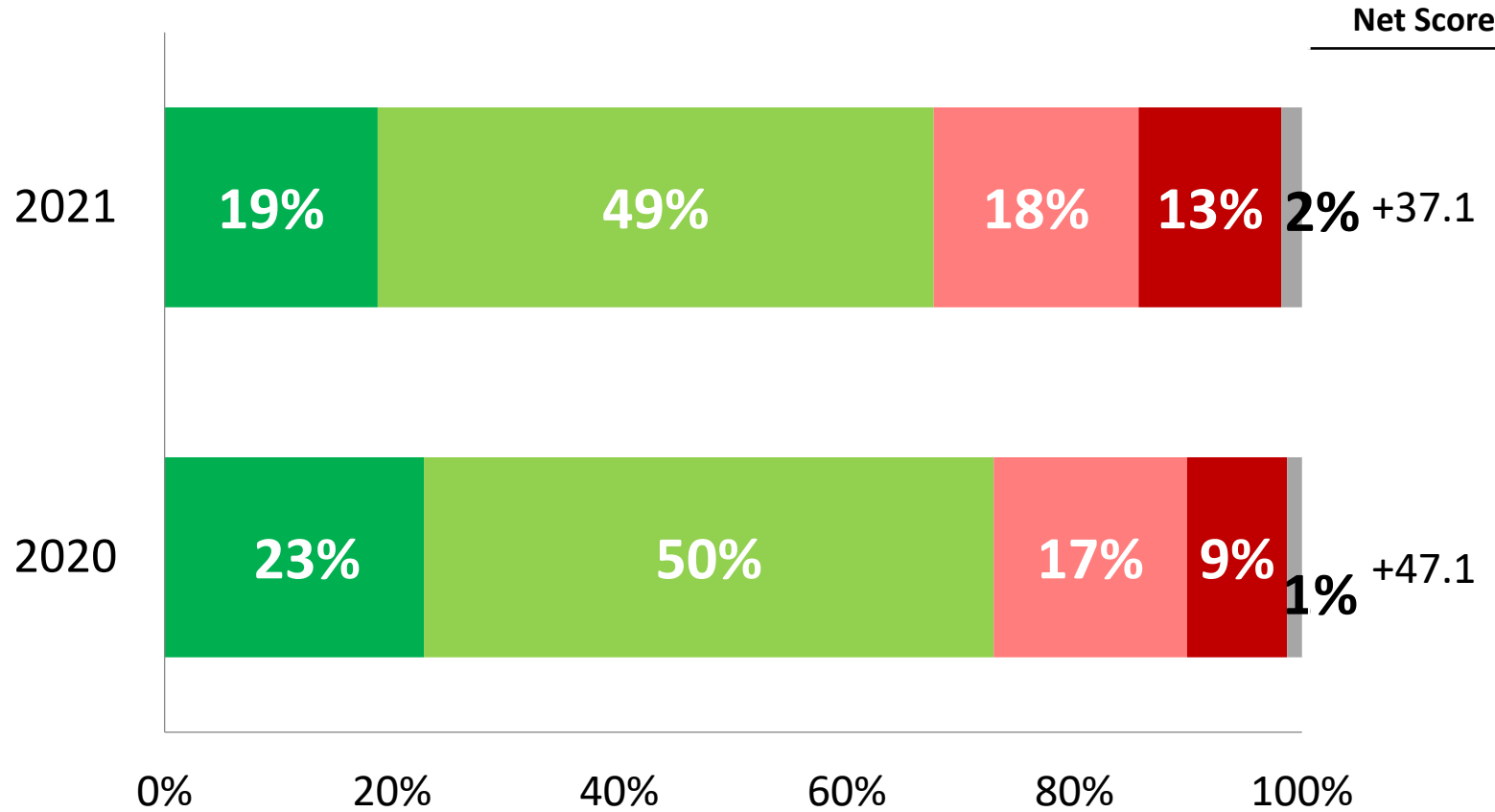


Confidence of responding to public health threats

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,017 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between September 30th and October 3rd, 2021 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 1,017 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned and conducted by Nanos Research.

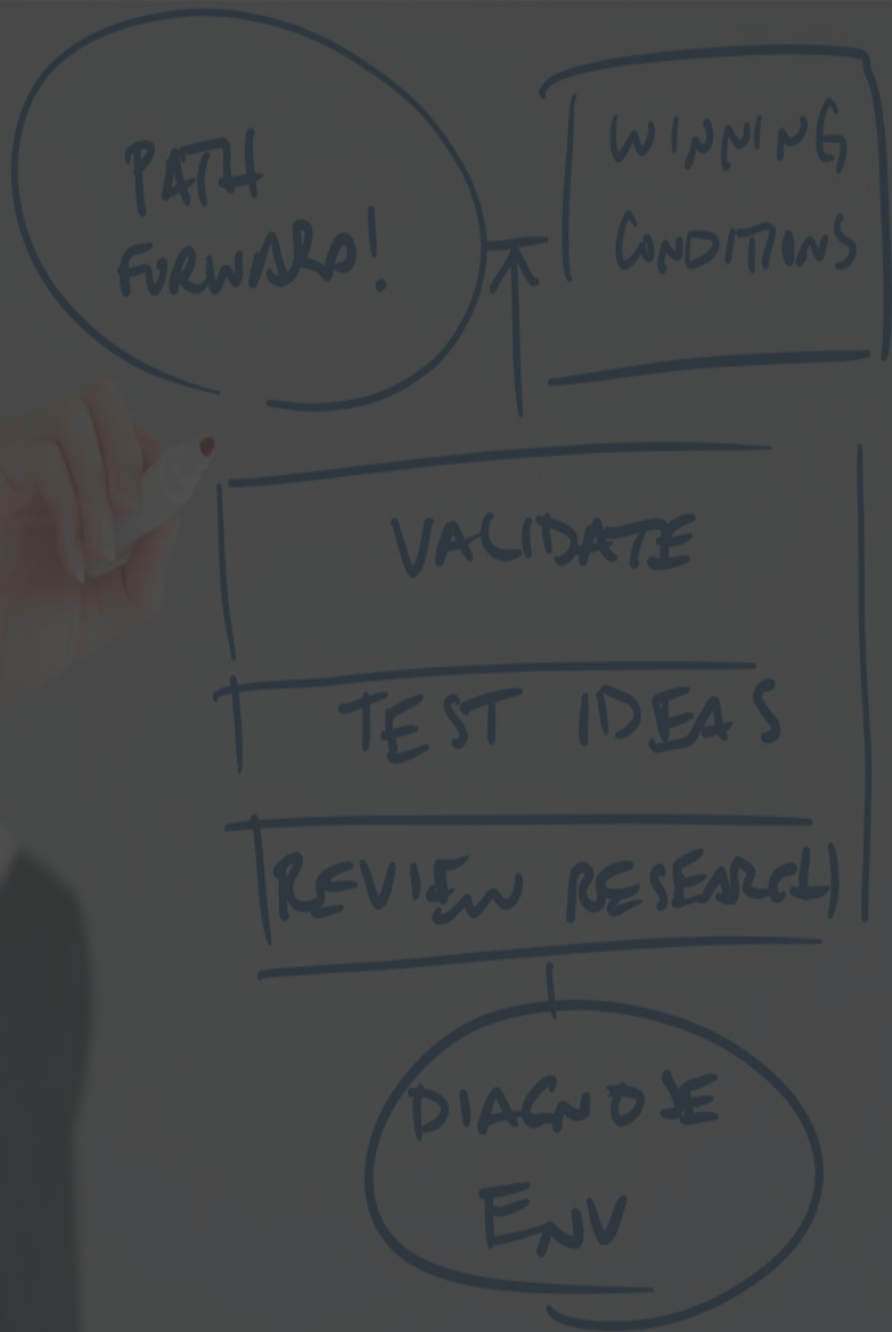


2020 - Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,003 Canadians between September 30th and October 4th, 2020 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,003 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

2019 - Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians between February 2nd and 5th, 2019, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

2017 - Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,000 Canadians between July 23rd to 26th, 2017, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. The margin of error for a random survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.



2016 - A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians conducted between July 28th and August 1st, 2016, as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

2015 - A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 1,000 Canadians conducted between May 24th and May 28th, 2015 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,000 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

2013 - A national RDD dual frame (land- and cell- lines) random telephone survey of 1,013 Canadians conducted between April 6th and 9th, 2013 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for a survey of 1,013 Canadians is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20
