Confidence is down on security issues; ensuring safe communities is the most important and continues to rise since 2016.



Key Findings

Importance of challenges in terms of Canada's future

Canadians give the highest importance to ensuring safe communities in terms of Canada's future (mean of 8.6 out of 10), followed by protecting our borders (mean of 7.9), and fighting terrorism (mean of 7.6). They give the lowest intensity of importance to asserting Canada's role in international affairs (mean of 7.2).



Canada Policy - Confidence vs. Importance Map 2020 vs 2021
















Importance of border protection








Confidence in Canada's role in international affairs




Confidence in fighting terrorism






