

Younger Ontarians exhibit most pessimism about the future of Ontario; Campaign performance of all leaders not strong, Schreiner scores marginally better than the rest.

Provincial survey released May 24, 2022

“ Ontarians are more likely to be pessimistic (15%) or somewhat pessimistic (30%) about the future of Ontario with younger Ontarians (18-34) expressing higher levels of pessimism (22% pessimistic, 30% somewhat pessimistic 30%) compared to older Ontarians (55 plus) (7% pessimistic, 27% somewhat pessimistic) – Ontarians give Mike Schreiner’s campaign performance a higher rating (mean of 5.7 out of 10) compared to other provincial political party leaders, followed by Doug Ford (mean of 5.1 out of 10), while Steven Del Duca and Andrea Horwath are given a lower rating (mean of 4.5 for each).”

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 497 residents of Ontario, 18 years of age or older, between May 21<sup>st</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2022. The margin of error for a random survey of 497 Ontario residents is ±4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

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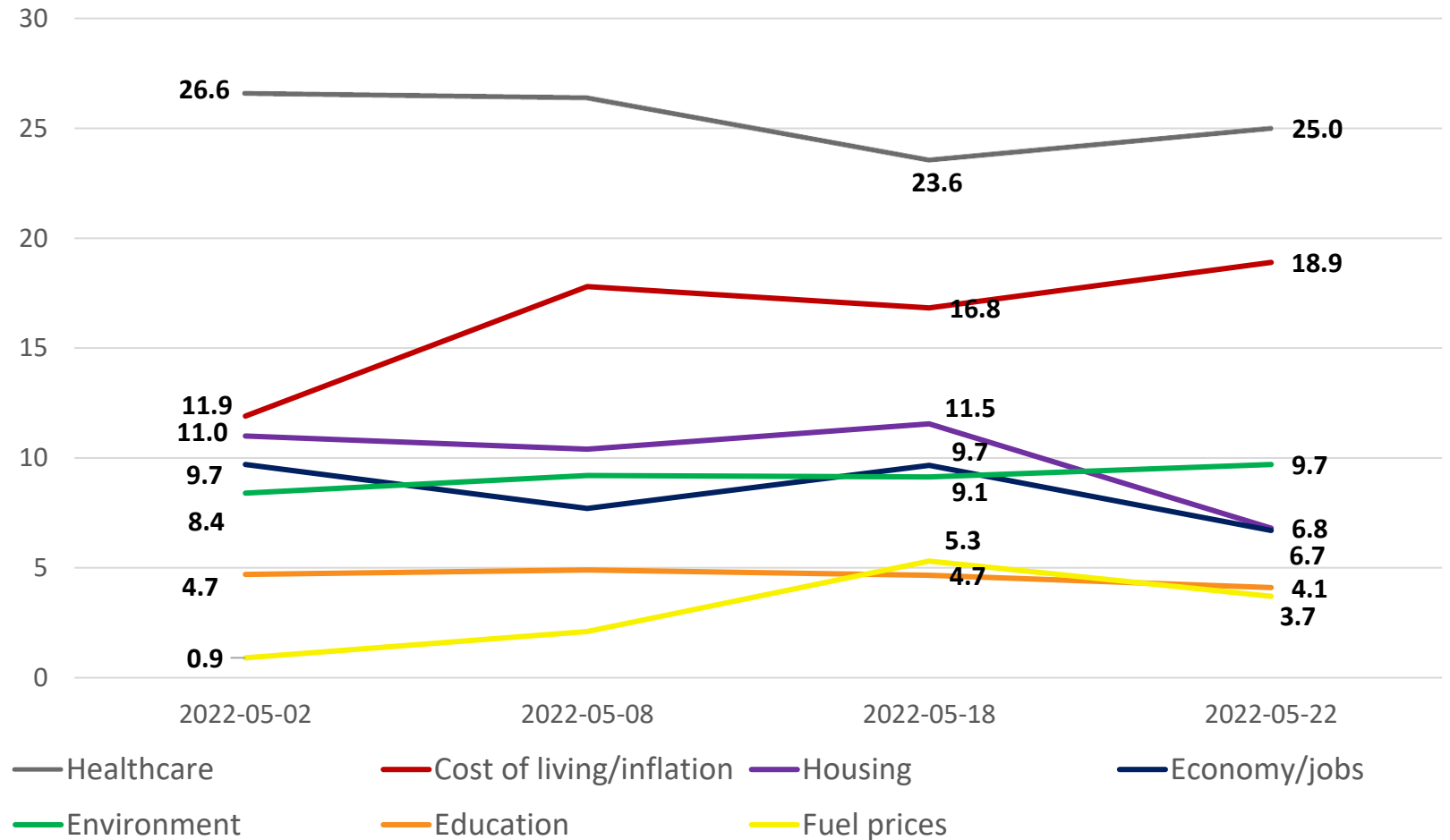

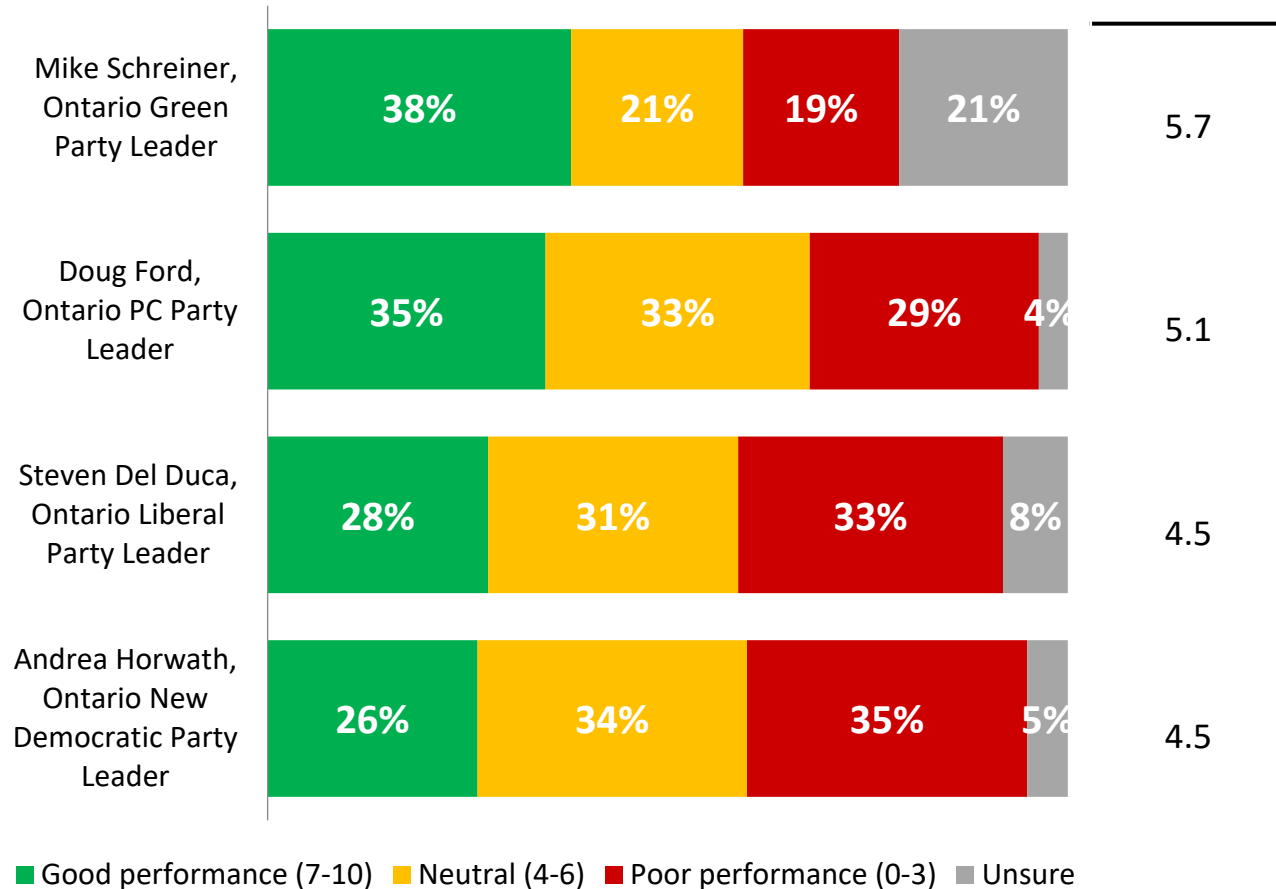


# Performance of Provincial Party Leaders

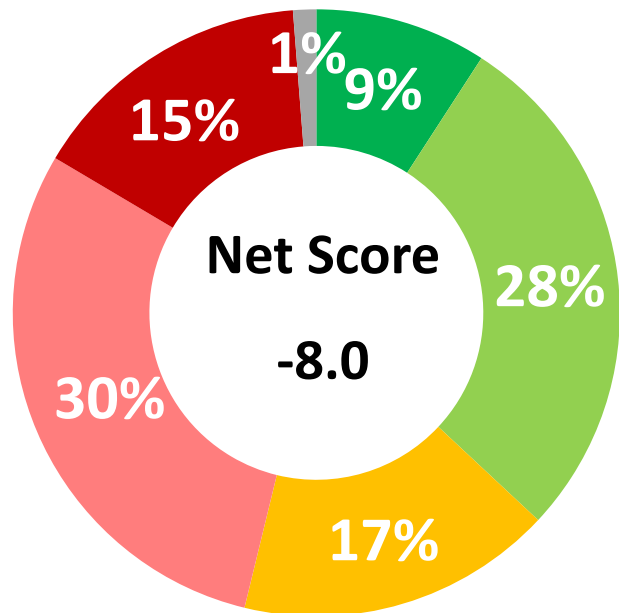


# Feeling about the future of Ontario

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 504 residents of Ontario, 18 years of age or older, between May 21<sup>st</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2022 as part of a tracking survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and were administered the survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Ontario.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 504 Ontario residents is ±4.4 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by CTV News and CP24.

Screening	Screening ensured potential respondents did not work in the market research industry, in the advertising industry, in the media or a political party prior to administering the survey to ensure the integrity of the data.
Excluded Demographics	Individuals younger than 18 years old; individuals without land or cell lines, and individuals without internet access could not participate.
Stratification	By age and gender using the latest Census information (2016) and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Ontario.
Estimated Response Rate	13 percent, consistent with industry norms.
Question Order	Question order in the preceding report has been changed from the original questionnaire, which included questions about political preferences between the issue of concern question and questions about the leaders' debate. Provincial ballot report containing the questions about political preferences was released as Part 1 of 2.
Question Content	This was module one and three of an omnibus survey. Module two was about political preferences.
Question Wording	The questions in the preceding report are written exactly as they were asked to individuals.

## Margin of Error for Research

Factoring the margin of error for the national random sample administered by Nanos, Liberal support may be as high as 36.0% or as low as 28.8%. Likewise, support for the Conservatives may be as high as 34.8% or as low as 27.6%.

## Key Takeaways

1. All of the Nanos estimates were within the reported margin of error for the election call.
2. Both the Sat/Sun sample and the Sunday only election call samples showed a tight race which manifested itself in the final result.
3. The total error for the six parties plus Others is 7.8 for an average error of about 1.1 percent.
