# AT A GLANCE

**Trust in provincial political party leaders** – Doug Ford, the Ontario PC Party leader, is the leader most likely to be trusted to manage the post-pandemic economic recovery (36%) and make life more affordable for Ontarians (26%), while Andrea Horwath, the New Democratic Party leader, is most likely to be trusted to fix the flaws in Ontario's healthcare system brought to light during the pandemic (29%).

**Views on issues related to education** – Almost eight in ten Ontarians are concerned (43%) or somewhat concerned (35%) about learning-loss for children after prolonged school closures during the pandemic. Three in five Ontarians oppose (40%) or somewhat oppose (20%) an expansion of online learning in Ontario's school system. Almost three in five say it is more important for college and university education to focus on practical skills that would lead directly to specific jobs (57%), while about one in three say it is more important to expand the knowledge of students in general (38%). Five per cent are unsure.

**Views on issues related to the environment – Transportation** – Similar to views in 2019, over one in two Ontarians believe the carbon tax is an ineffective (40%; 36% in 2019) or somewhat ineffective (16%; 17% in 2019) way to encourage people to use less fuel. Ontarians are two times more likely to say it is ineffective (40%) than effective (18%). Almost two in three say investing in public transit should be highest priority (65%), while under one in three say investing in highways (28%). Older Ontarians are more likely to say investing in public transit should be the priority (aged 55 plus: 69%; 35-54: 65%; 18-34: 59%).

**Views on issues related to the environment – Housing** – Almost eight in ten Ontarians are uncomfortable (53%) or somewhat uncomfortable (25%) with the building of new homes on farms and green space to help lower the cost of housing. Residents of the GTA region are most likely to say they are uncomfortable with this (59%) than those from the rest of the province (47%).

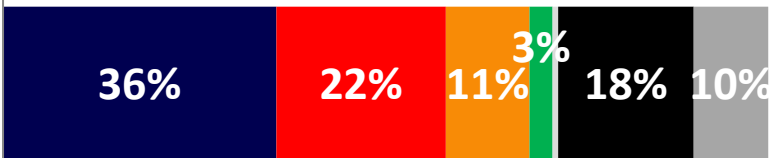

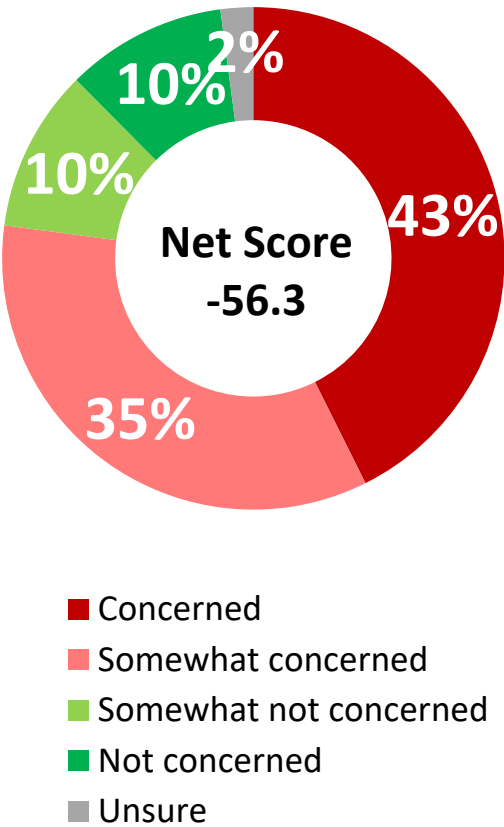

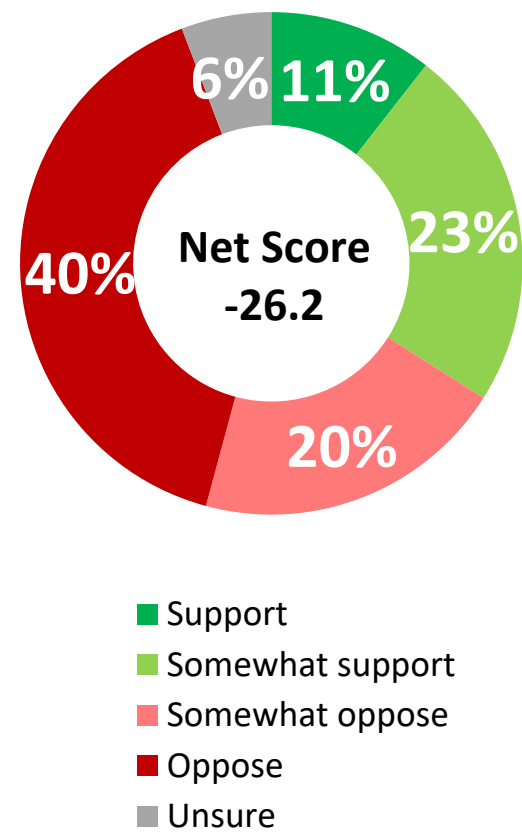

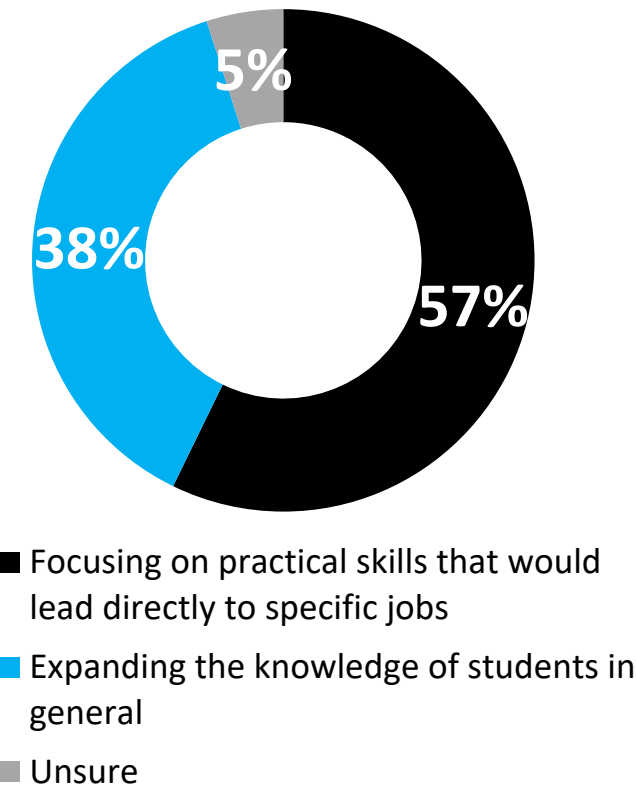

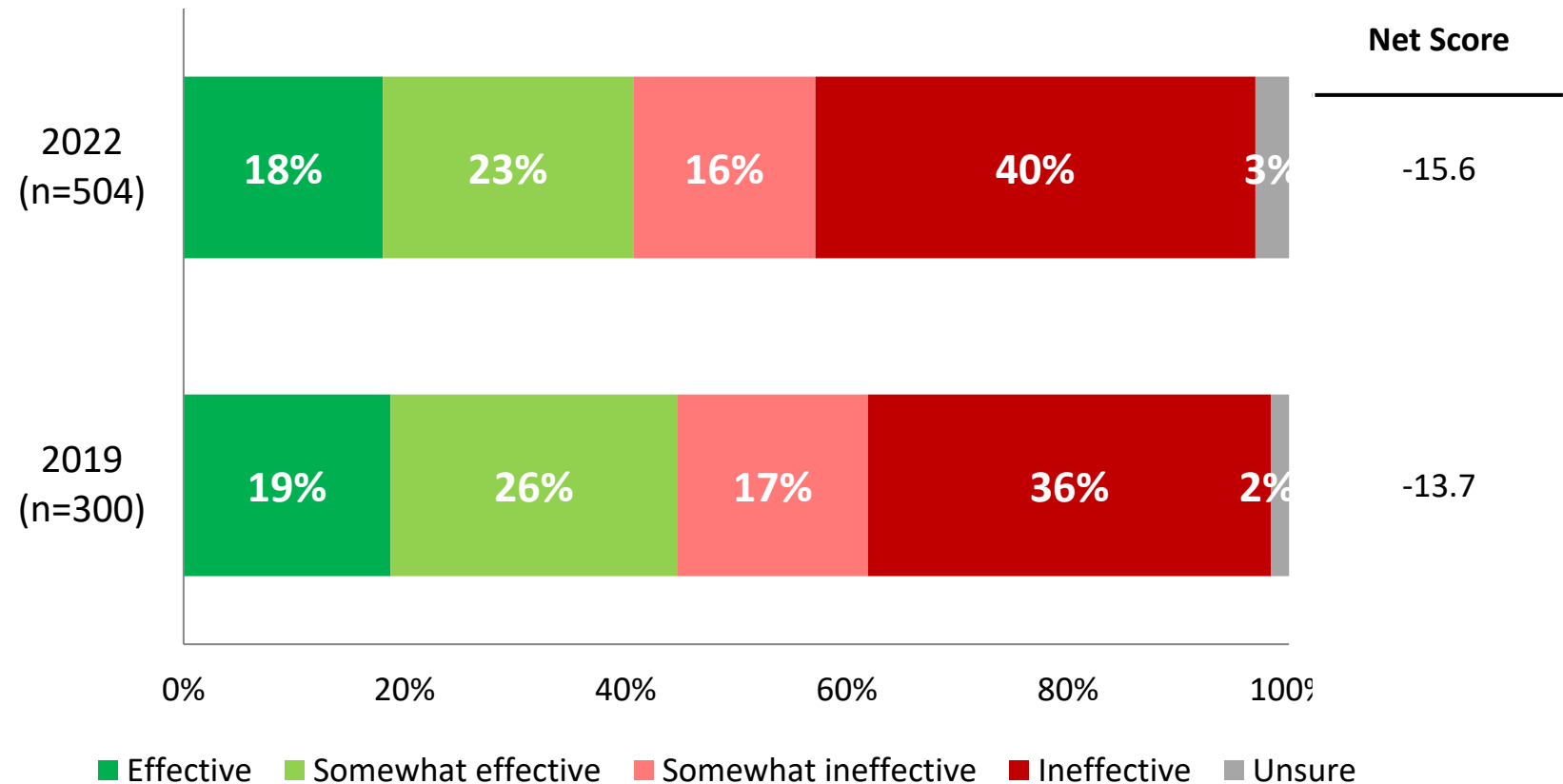

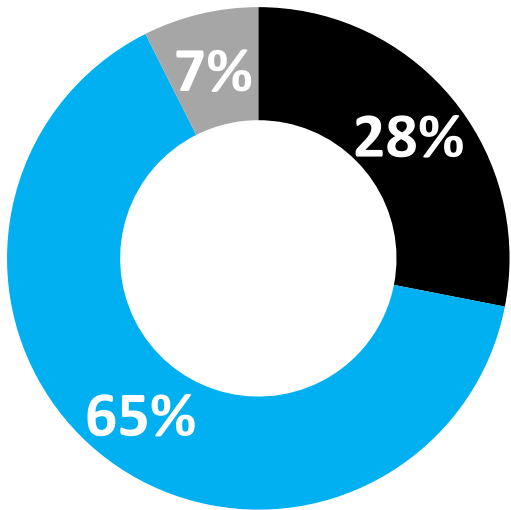

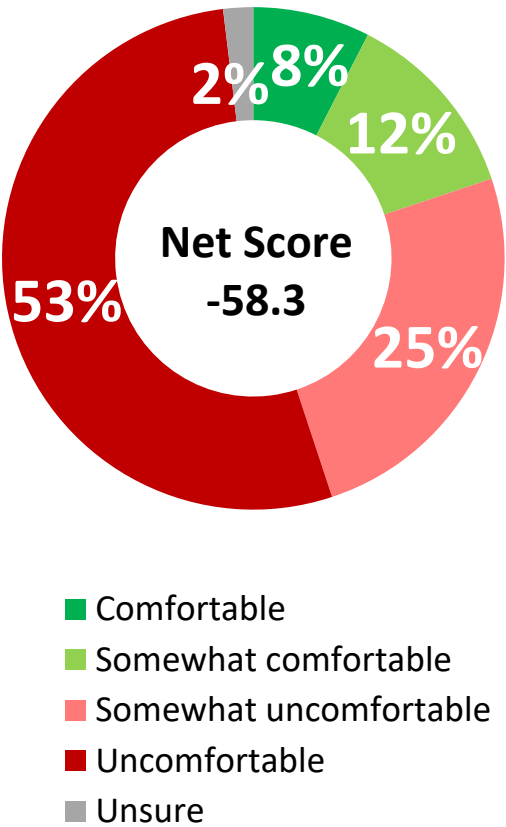

# METHODOLOGY

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 504 residents of Ontario, 18 years of age or older, between May 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2022 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and were administered the survey online. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Ontario.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialing with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for a random survey of 500 Ontario residents is  $\pm 4.4$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by the Globe and Mail.

**Margin of Error for Research**  
Factoring the margin of error for the national random sample administered by Nanos, Liberal support may be as high as 36.0% or as low as 28.8%. Likewise, support for the Conservatives may be as high as 34.8% or as low as 27.6%.

- Key Takeaways**
1. All of the Nanos estimates were within the reported margin of error for the election call.
  2. Both the Sat/Sun sample and the Sunday only election call samples showed a tight race which manifested itself in the final result.
  3. The total error for the six parties plus Others is 7.8 for an average error of about 1.1 percent.

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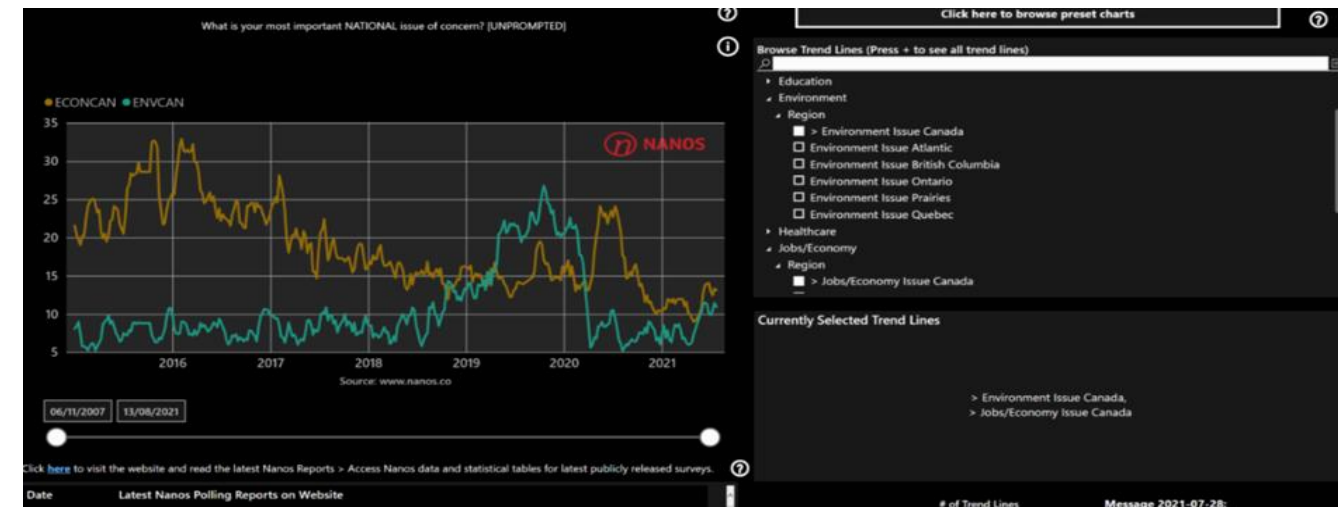
