LEVEL OF IMPORTANCE

Consistent with the waves from 2021, Canadians have the highest importance in terms of Canada's future to keeping our healthcare system strong (mean of 9.3), followed by investing in our education system (mean of 8.8), while giving the lowest level of importance to encouraging Canadian culture (mean of 7.3).

IMPORTANCE SCORE CHANGES

The importance scores for social issues have remained relatively steady since 2021 except responding to public health threats like a pandemic (mean of 8.3) which registered a noticeable drop from 2021 (mean of 9.0). Ensuring Canadians have a high standard of living scores an all-time high (mean of 8.4), as well as keeping our healthcare system strong which continues it's all-time high recorded since 2020 (mean of 9.3).

CONFIDENCE SCORE CHANGES

The confidence scores for social issues have in general lower compared to 2021 with the largest drop being registered by those who are confident (seven per cent) or somewhat confident (26%) in our ability as a nation to find solutions for keeping our healthcare system strong (2021: 11% confident, 39% somewhat confident), which is also an all-time low since tracking started in 2012.

LEVEL OF CONFIDENCE

Canadians have the highest confidence level in the government's ability to encourage Canadian Culture, with 11 per cent confident and 45 per cent somewhat confident, while giving the lowest confidence level to keeping our healthcare system strong (six per cent confident, 26% somewhat confident).


















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Importance of responding to public health threats


Confidence in high living standard for Canadians









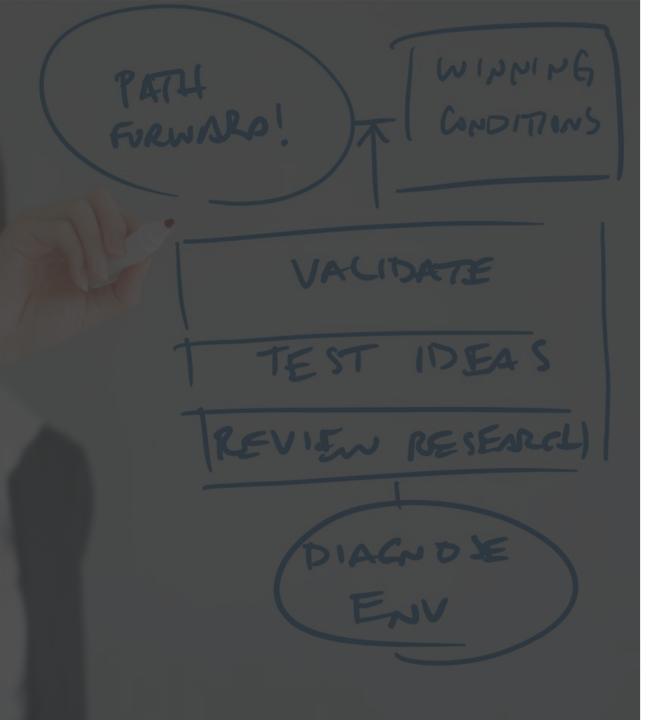


