Importance of challenges in terms of Canada's future

Canadians continue to give the highest importance to ensuring safe communities in terms of Canada's future (mean of 8.7 out of 10), followed by protecting our borders (mean of 8.0), and fighting terrorism (mean of 7.5) for policies related to security. They give a lower intensity of importance to asserting Canada's role in international affairs (mean of 6.9).










Canada's role in international affairs – Policy chart








