MAKING OUR HEALTHCARE SYSTEM STRONGER IS RANKED AS THE MOST IMPORTANT PRIORITY

When asked to rank the top two areas they would like to see made a priority for the upcoming federal budget, the option most often ranked first was making our healthcare system stronger (49%), followed by reducing the deficit (19%), fighting climate change (17%), investing in infrastructure (6%) and creating jobs (5%).

CPC SLIGHTLY UP AS MOST TRUSTED TO RESPONSIBLY MANAGE GOVERNMENT FINANCES; LPC SLIGHTLY DOWN

Trust in the Conservative Party to responsibly manage the Government of Canada finances has increased by five percentage points since 2021 (23% in April 2021, 28% in February 2023), while the trust in the Liberal party has decreased by six percentage points since 2021 (28% in April 2021, 22% in February 2023). A little under one in four (23%) say they trust no one, consistent with the previous wave.




CANADIANS ARE MORE LIKELY TO SAY BALANCING THE BUDGET IS MORE IMPORTANT THAN RUNNING A DEFICIT

Under six in ten Canadians (56%) say that balancing the budget to ease the tax burden on Canadians is more important to them as a general public policy objective than running a deficit to invest in programs for Canadians (35%). Canadians from the Prairies are more likely to say balancing the budget is more important (69%) than Canadians from Ontario (48%).



Public policy objectives for the budget

A majority of Canadians


now say that balancing the budget to ease the tax burden on Canadians (56%) is more important to them as a general public policy objective, which is a 10-point increase compared to the last wave in March 2021. Over one in three (35%) say running a deficit to invest in programs for Canadians is more important (down by 11 percentage points; 46% in March 2021, 25% in February 2023). Canadians from the prairies are more likely to say balancing the budget is more important (69%) than Canadians from Ontario (48%).


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Ranking priority areas for the upcoming federal budget

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and celllines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,012 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between February 26th and March 1st, 2023 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online.

The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialing with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by the Globe and Mail and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.

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
