Canadians most likely to say the rising cost of living should be top priority for the House of Commons this fall; cabinet shuffle unlikely to have impact on Canadians' views of the Liberals.





Nanos was retained by the Globe and Mail to conduct research among Canadians to gauge their views on the recent cabinet shuffle by the Liberal government, as well as who is the most trusted leader to support economic growth in Canada.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1081 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between July 30<sup>th</sup> to August 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2023 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for this survey is ±3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by the Globe and Mail and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.

# Canadians want the House of Commons to focus on the rising cost of living

Nearly four in ten Canadians (39%) say the top issue they believe the House of Common should focus on this fall should be the rising cost of living. This was followed by healthcare (15%), the environment (12%) and the deficit/debt (10%).

# Recent cabinet shuffle most likely to not impact Canadians' impression of the Trudeau Liberal government

Asked what impact, if any, the recent cabinet shuffle has on their impression of the Trudeau Liberal government, Canadians are most likely to say it had no impact (53%). For those whose impressions were impacted, it was as likely to be a positive (four per cent) or somewhat positive (14%) impact than a negative (15%) or somewhat negative (six per cent) impact.



The proportion of those who trust Jagmeet Singh most has declined marginally from 14% in September 2022 to now seven per cent.











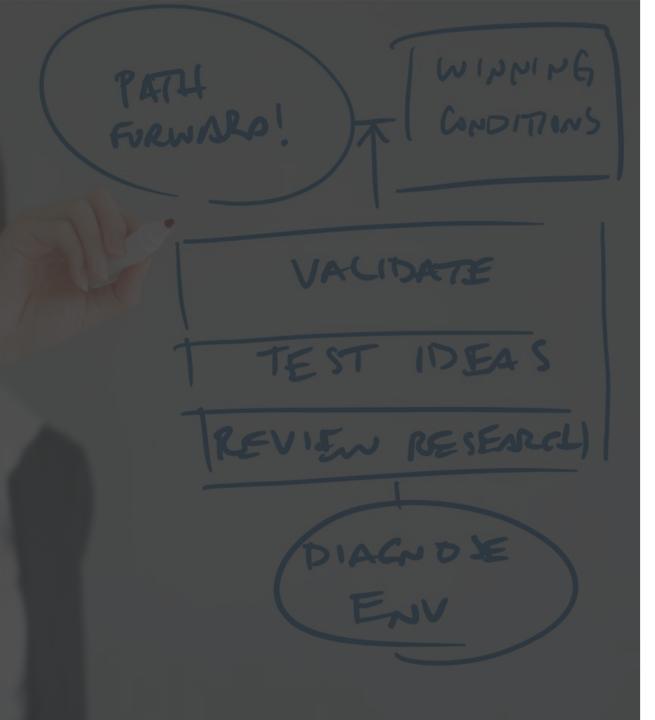
