

Most Canadians lack confidence that housing in Canada will be more affordable in 5 years; NDP and Conservatives more trusted than Liberals on affordable housing.



The research gauged trust in federal parties on issues related to inflation, economic growth, affordable housing and help to the middle class, as well as confidence in housing affordability improving in Canada.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land-and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,058 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between October 1st to 4th, 2023 as part of an omnibus survey. The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by the Globe and Mail and was conducted by Nanos Research.

Key Findings



CANADIANS LACK CONFIDENCE THAT HOUSING AFFORDABILITY WILL IMPROVE IN NEXT FIVE YEARS

More than eight in ten Canadians say they are not confident (57%) or somewhat not confident (24%) that in five years housing in Canada will be more affordable than it is today, while under one in five are somewhat confident (14%) or confident (two per cent).



NDP AND CPC MORE TRUSTED THAN LPC ON AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Canadians trust the NDP (26%) or the Conservatives (25%) more on housing affordability than the Liberal Party (16%). This is consistent with findings from August and consistent across region, age and gender.



CANADIANS TRUST THE CPC MOST TO MANAGE ECONOMIC ISSUES

Overall, the Conservatives have a slight edge over the Liberal Party in terms of the party most trusted on economic issues, such as managing inflation (34%, followed by 27% for LPC and 20% for none of them) and supporting economic growth (36%, 31% for LPC).

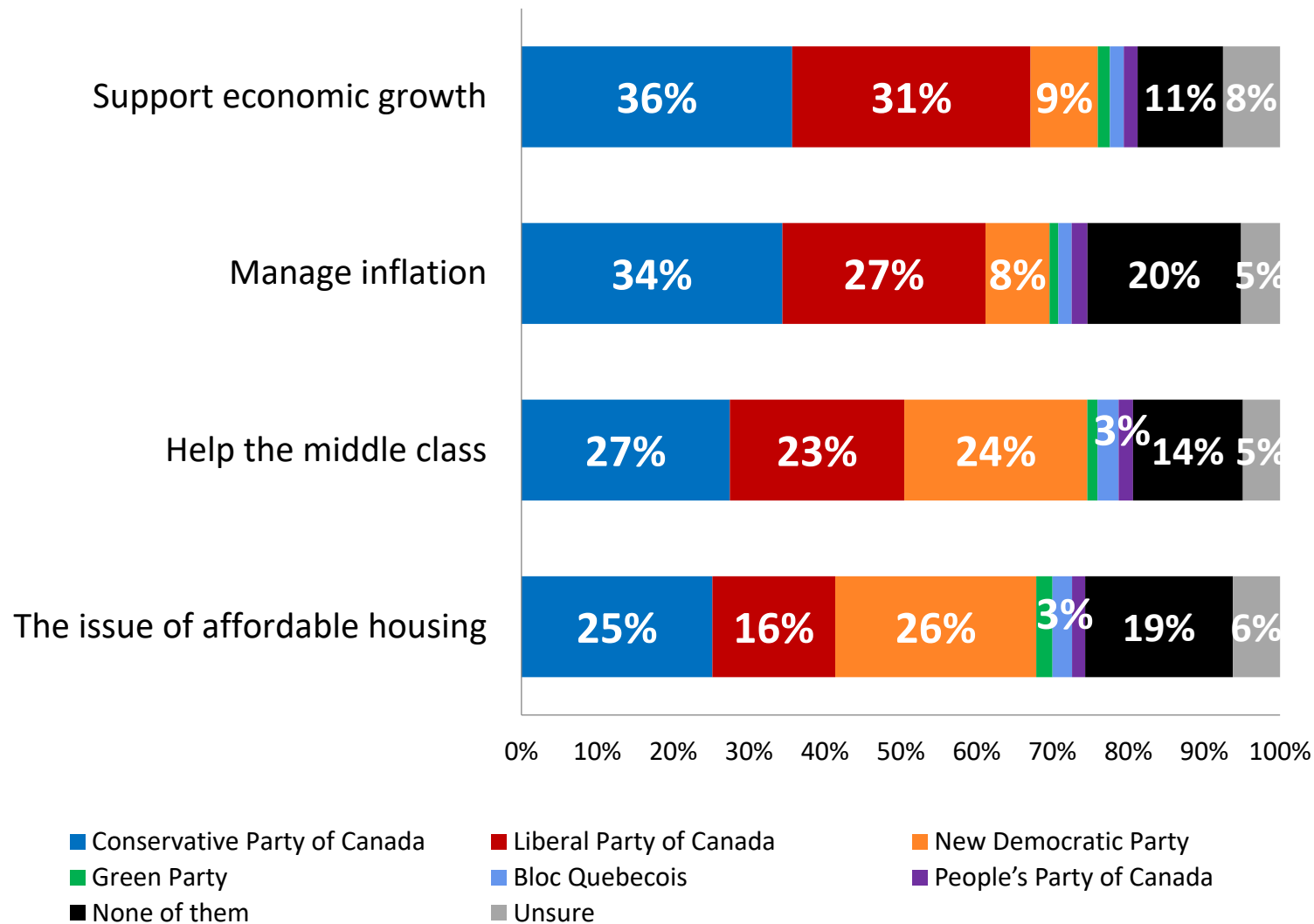


YOUNG CANADIANS TRUST CPC MOST ON ECONOMIC ISSUES, NDP ON HELPING MIDDLE CLASS

Conservatives have an advantage with Canadians 18 to 34 in terms of their trust regarding managing inflation (39%; 32% of those 55 plus) or supporting economic growth (40%; 33% of those 55 plus). Canadians 18 to 34 are more likely to say they trust NDP the most on helping the middle class (33%) than those 35 to 54 (22%) or 55 plus (20%).

Canadians have the highest level of trust in the CPC regarding economic issues, and most likely to trust the NDP or CPC on the issue of affordable housing. They are divided on their level of trust in federal parties to help the middle class.

Trust in federal parties

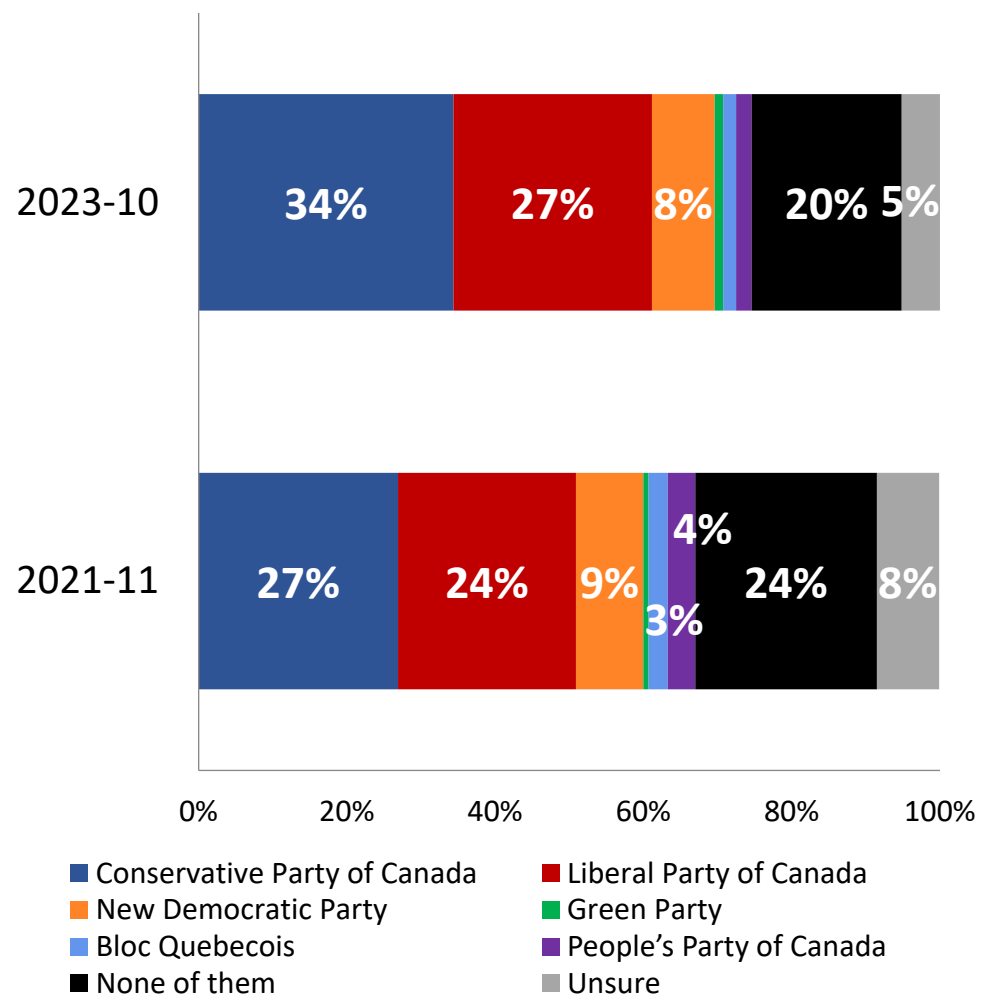

Trust in federal parties to manage inflation



1 in 3 Canadians

Say they would trust the CPC most to manage inflation, followed by the Liberal Party (27%) and none of them (20%). Trust in the CPC to manage inflation has increased by seven percentage points since 2021. Men are much more likely to say they trust CPC (43%) most than women (27%), Canadians 18 to 34 trust the CPC more (39%) than older Canadians (55 plus)(32%).

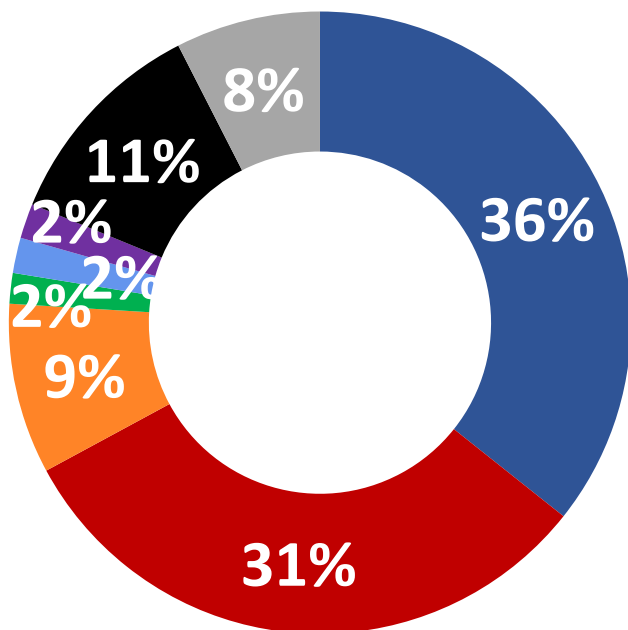

Canadians trust the CPC and LPC most

to support economic growth, with the CPC (36%) having a slight edge over the Liberals (31%). Once again, men are more likely to trust the CPC on this issue (45%; 27% of women) and women have more trust in the LPC (34%; 28% of men), while those 18-34 trust the CPC more (40%) than those 55 plus (33%).

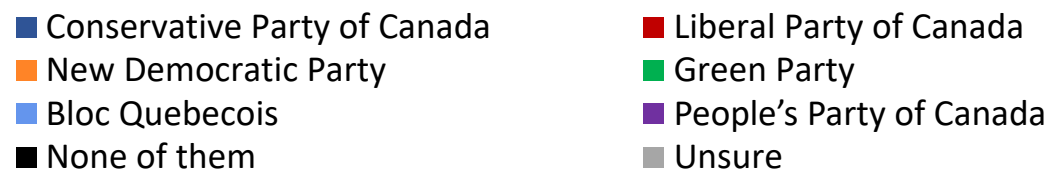
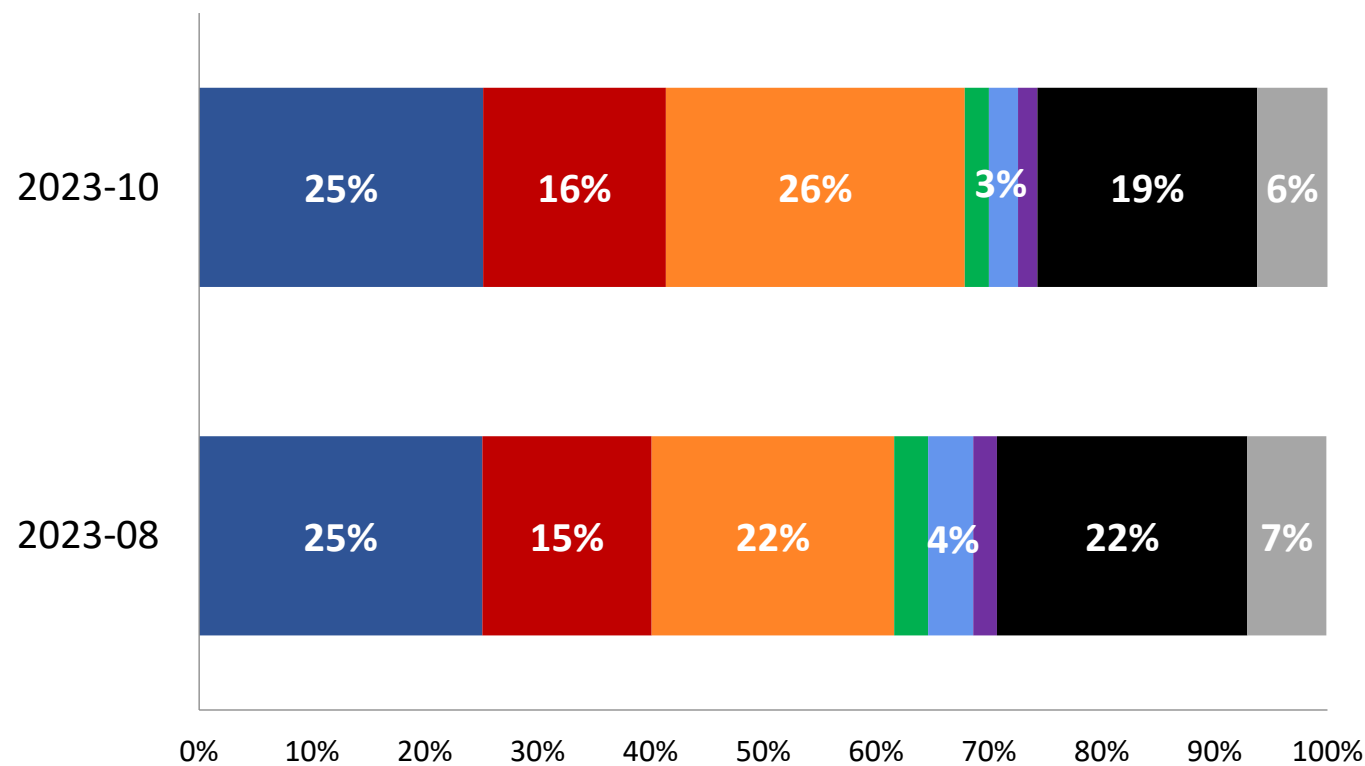

Canadians trust the NDP (26%) or the CPC (25%) most on this issue, overall consistent with the previous findings from August.

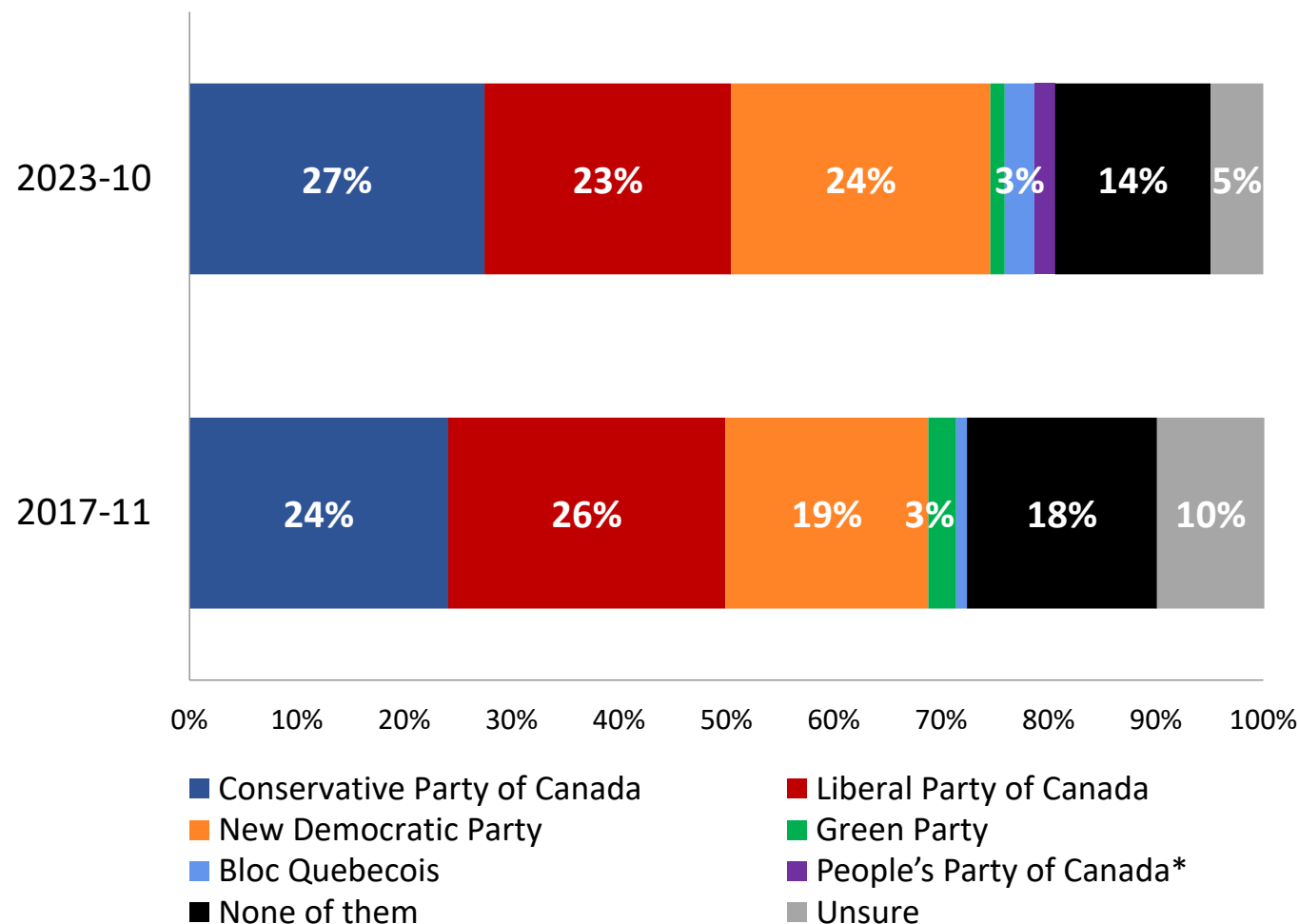
Consistent with findings from 2017, Canadians are divided in terms of which political party they trust the most to help the middle class, with about one in four each saying the CPC, LPC or NDP. Canadians 18 to 34 are more likely to say they trust NDP the most (33%) than those 35 to 54 (22%) or 55 plus (20%).

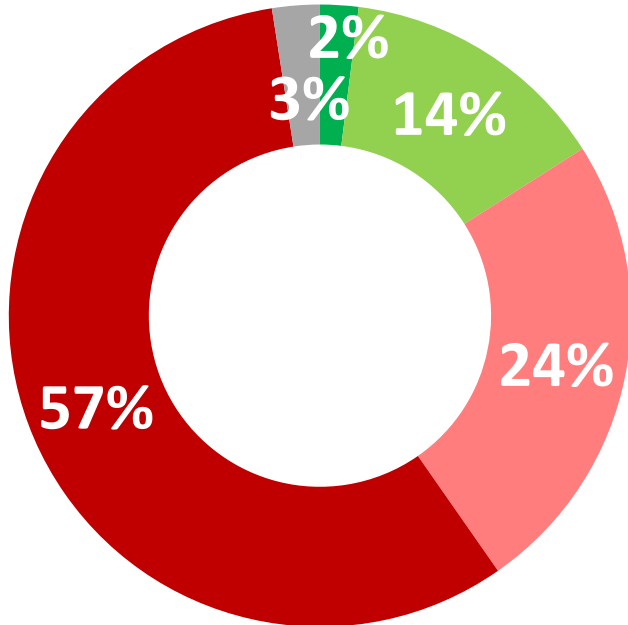

METHODOLOGY

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,058 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between October 1st and 4th, 2023 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by the Globe and Mail and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.
