



This Report: Social & Environmental 4 out of 9 issues reach all time lowest confidence score

1 out of 5 issues reach all time lowest confidence score

4 out of 4 issues reach all time lowest confidence score

Confidence scores for four out of the nine social and environmental issues hit their lowest mean scores since tracking began, while mean importance scores remained stable in 2023.

Confidence mean score for trade policies encouraging investment was the lowest since tracking began, while two of five importance mean scores also hit all time lows - creating jobs and trade policies encouraging investment.

Confidence mean scores for all four security issues decreased in 2023 to their lowest score since tracking began, while the importance mean score for asserting Canada's role in international affairs was the lowest since tracking began.

The following nine policy issues are included under the social and environmental issues category:

- Responding to public health threats
- Encouraging Canadian culture
- Preserving social programs
- Investing in education
- Further protecting our environment
- Ensuring a high standard of living
- Improving quality of life on First Nation reserves

Key Findings

CONFIDENCE SCORE LOW IN 2023

In 2023, four of the nine social and environmental issues of concern received their lowest confidence scores in the ten years of tracking.

Investing in our education (2.4 out of 10 in 2022; 2.3 out of 10 in 2023) and ensuring Canadians have a high standard of living (2.3 out of 10 in 2022; 2.2 out of 10 in 2023) decreased in 2023 in their lowest scores since tracking began, while further protecting our environment (2.3 out of 10 points) and keeping out healthcare system strong (2.2 out of 10 points) remained consistent with the previous year of lowest tracked scores.



IMPORTANCE SCORES OFR SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES REMAIN STEADY

Importance mean scores for social and environmental issues remained steady in 2023. Consistent with the past four years of tracking, keeping our healthcare system strong remains at its highest rating (9.3 out of 10 points), followed by Investing in our education system (8.7 out of 10 points). The overall lowest level of importance rate of encouraging Canadian culture (6.8 out of 10 points) dropped to its lowest rate since 2016.




Canada Policy - Confidence vs. Importance Map 2022 vs 2023





























Importance of responding to public health threats












Canadians were most confident in the nation's ability to find solutions to public health threats like a pandemic, with two in three confident (17%) or somewhat confident (47%). More than one in two Canadians were confident (11%) or somewhat confident (43%) in the nation's ability to encourage Canadian culture, and 53% were confident (9%) or somewhat confident (44%) in preserving social programs.


Confidence level in nation's ability to find solutions










