Canadians say a new Liberal leader focused on economic issues will help raise chances to win next election - Poilievre marginally scores better than Trudeau on performance.

Nanos was retained by the Globe and Mail to conduct research among Canadians to gauge their views on the performance of the Liberal Party leader and the Conservative Party leader of Canada and the best ways for the Liberals to increase their chances of winning the next federal election.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,114 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between January 29<sup>th</sup> to 31<sup>st</sup>, 2024 as part of an omnibus survey.

The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 2.9$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by CTV News and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.

## **Key Findings**



Canadians say replacing Justin Trudeau with another leader is seen as best way to increase

Liberal's chances of winning election Asked which way would be best to increase the Liberal's chances of winning the next federal election, Canadians most frequently say having someone other than Justin Trudeau lead the party in the next election (<u>39%</u>). This was followed by focusing on more economic issues (<u>25%</u>). One in five believe nothing with increase their chances of winning (<u>20%</u>).


Views on the job Pierre Poilievre has done as Conservative leader more likely to be negative than positive Just over four in ten Canadians say Pierre Poilievre has done a poor job (41%) rather than a positive job (29%). Men rated Pierre Poilievre's job as Conservative leader higher than women (mean score or 5.2 vs. 3.5 out of 10, respectively).

Views on the performance of Justin Trudeau as the Liberal Party leader have gone down with Canadians since January 2022 now being more likely to say he has done a poor job (<u>46%</u>, up from <u>34%</u>) than an excellent job (<u>25%</u>, down from <u>35%</u>). One in four rate Justin Trudeau's job as Liberal Leader a rating of 0 out of 10 (<u>25%</u>).



### Performance of Justin Trudeau as Liberal Party leader - Tracking









Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and celllines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,114 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between January 29<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>, 2024 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialing with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 2.9$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.
