



Liberals less trusted than Conservatives, New Democrats or no party at all on the issue of housing.

The research gauged the opinions among Canadians on housing including which federal party they trust the most on the issue of affordable housing and the two important issues that influence their vote.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1069 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between March 31st and April 1st, 2024 as part of an omnibus survey.

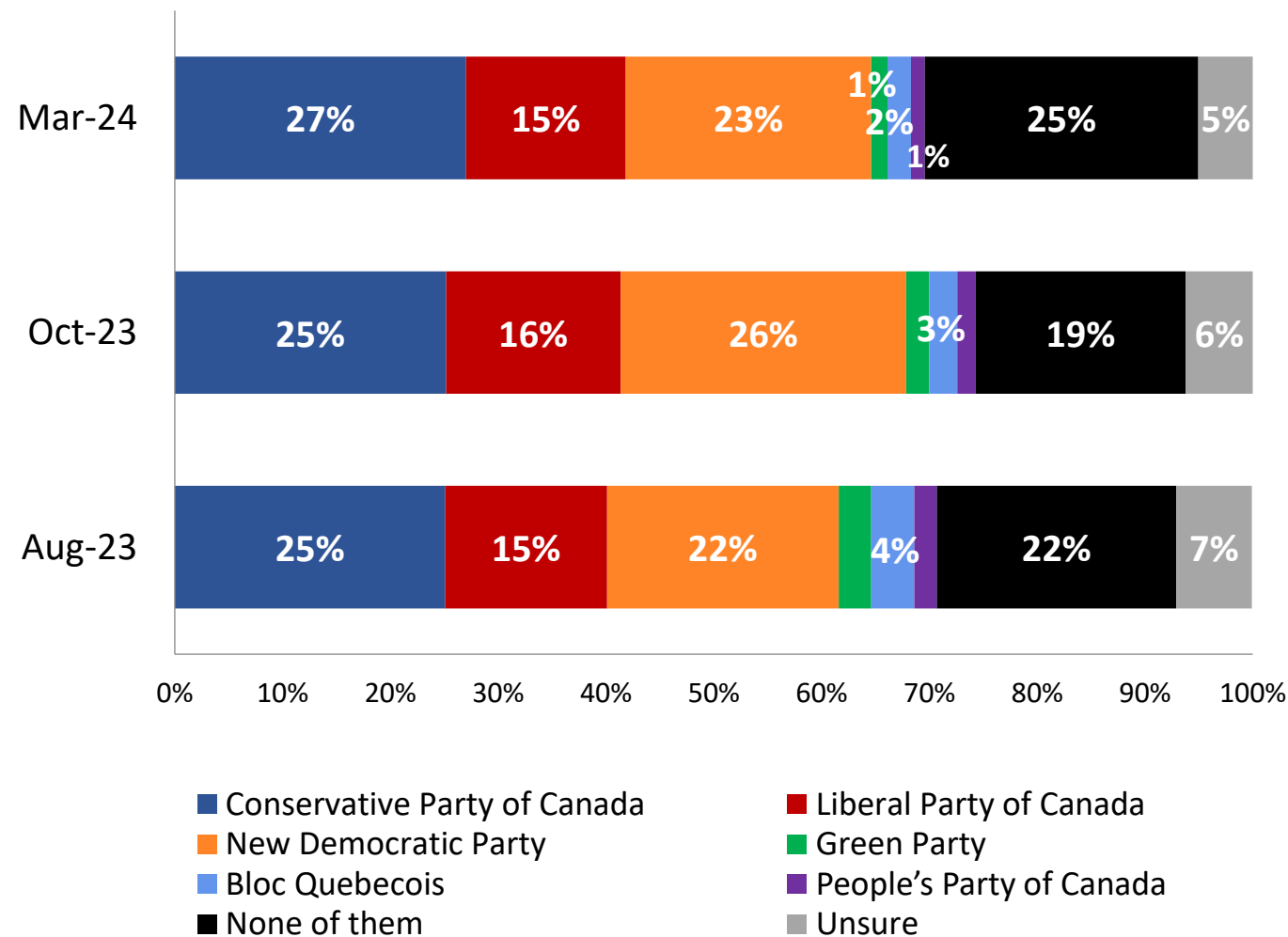
The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by Bloomberg News and was conducted by Nanos Research.

Around one in four Canadians trust either the Conservative Party of Canada, the New Democratic Party or no party at all the most on the issue of affordable housing.

Prairie residents are more likely to trust Conservatives most (41%) than residents of Quebec (17%). Men are also more likely to trust Conservatives on the issue (35%) than women (19%).

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,069 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between March 31st and April 1st, 2024 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialing with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by Bloomberg News and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.
