Housing and affordability are top issues for Niagara residents.

The research gauged the opinions among residents of St. Catharines, Niagara Falls and the Niagara region on housing and local issues in the region.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) random telephone survey of 700 residents of the Niagara region (n=143 in Niagara Falls, n=200 in St. Catharines and n=357 in the Niagara region), 18 years of age or older, between October 3rd and 21st, 2024.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.7 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by the Niagara Association of Realtors and was conducted by Nanos Research.

KEY FINDINGS

NIAGARA RESIDENTS SAY REGION IS A GOOD PLACE TO RAISE A FAMILY AND SAFE PLACE TO LIVE

Residents of St. Catharines/Niagara Falls/the Niagara region gave the highest ratings to their region as a place to raise a family (St. Catharines: mean of 7.1 out of 10, Niagara Falls: mean of 7.1 out of 10, rest of the Niagara Region: 7.6 out of 10) and as a safe place to live (St. Catharines: mean of 6.7, Niagara Falls: mean of 7.1; rest of the Niagara Region: 7.1 out of 10). They give their lowest ratings to their region being a place where one can afford to buy a home (St. Catharines: mean of 4.4 out of 10, Niagara Falls: mean of 4.7 out of 10, rest of the Niagara Region: 4.2 out of 10).

A MAJORITY OF ST. CATHARINES RESIDENTS WANT TO BALANCE NEW DEVELOPMENT DOWNTOWN AND PROTECTING THE HERITAGE IN THE CITY

When asked how the city should balance development and maintaining heritage downtown, St. Catharines residents were more likely to say it should balance both (57%), while 17% said to prioritize new development even if it impacts heritage and character and 23% said to prioritize protecting the character of downtown even if it limits new development.

MOST NIAGARA RESIDENTS SAY FIRST TIME HOME BUYERS OR YOUNG PEOPLE ARE LESS LIKELY TO AFFORD A HOME IN NIAGARA TODAY COMPARED TO FIVE YEARS AGO; ONE IN THREE CONSIDERING MOVING ELSEWHERE

When asked the likelihood of a first-time home buyer or young person in the Niagara region being able to afford a home in their community today compared to five years ago, around nine in ten say they are less likely (89%). Around two in three Niagara residents say they disagree or somewhat disagree (63%) that they are considering leaving the region for somewhere more affordable, while one in three agree (33%) or somewhat agree they're considering doing so.

A MAJORITY OF NIAGARA RESIDENTS SAY THERE SHOULD BE MORE COORDINATION OF LOCAL PLANNING

Just over six in ten residents say there should be more coordination of local planning and development rules between the local municipalities to reduce red tape and speed up the development of business and housing projects (62%), while just over one in four say that local municipalities should be able to set their own rules and processes for development even if it slows down development of business and housing projects (27%). Residents of St. Catharines (69%) are more likely to say there should be more coordination than those in the rest of the Niagara region (57%).

NIAGARA RESIDENTS MORE LIKELY TO OPPOSE THAN SUPPORT PERMITTING UP TO FOUR HOUSING UNITS ON A RESIDENTIAL LOT

A majority of residents oppose (44%) or somewhat oppose (13%) permitting the building of four housing units on residential lots, while about four in ten support (18%) or somewhat support (21%) this. This is consistent across St. Catharines, Niagara Falls and the rest of the Niagara region. Renters are more likely to say they support or somewhat support (50%) this than homeowners (33%).



















Current type of housing lived in – Top mentions










Preferred type of housing – Top mentions









Level of improvement of housing affordability compared to five years ago

Q – Would you say that housing affordability in your community has improved, somewhat improved, somewhat worsened, worsened or stayed about the same today compared to five years ago?










Likelihood of young people affording a home compared to five years ago

Q – Thinking of first-time home buyers or young people, would you say that they are more likely, as likely or less likely to afford a home in your community today compared to five years ago?







Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and celllines) random telephone survey of 700 residents of the Niagara region (n=143 in Niagara Falls, n=200 in St. Catharines and n=357 in the Niagara region), 18 years of age or older, between October 3rd and 21st, 2024. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey. The sample is geographically stratified to be representative of the Niagara region.

Individuals were randomly called using random digit dialing with a maximum of five call backs.

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
