

The research gauged the opinions among Canadians on their preferred approach for the government to fund the NATO defense spending target and views on additional deficit spending for fostering economic growth.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,028 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between August 30<sup>th</sup> and September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2025 as part of an omnibus survey.

The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 3.1$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

The research was commissioned by Bloomberg News and was conducted by Nanos Research.

### CANADIANS ARE MORE LIKELY TO BE IN AGREEMENT THAN DISAGREEMENT THAT CARNEY'S ADDITIONAL DEFICIT SPENDING WILL GROW THE ECONOMY

Just over half of Canadians (53%) agree or somewhat agree that Carney's additional deficit spending will grow the economy. However, just under two in five Canadians say they disagree or somewhat disagree (37%), while one in ten say they are unsure (10%). Canadians aged 55 plus are more likely to agree/somewhat agree that Carney's additional deficit spending will grow the economy (61%), compared to Canadians aged 18 to 34 (41%).

CANADIANS MORE OFTEN SAY THAT THE GOVERNMENT SHOULD FUND THE ADDITIONAL SPENDING NEEDED TO REACH THE TWO PER CENT NATO DEFENSE SPENDING TARGET BY CUTTING SPENDING ON SOCIAL PROGRAMS AND RAISING TAXES

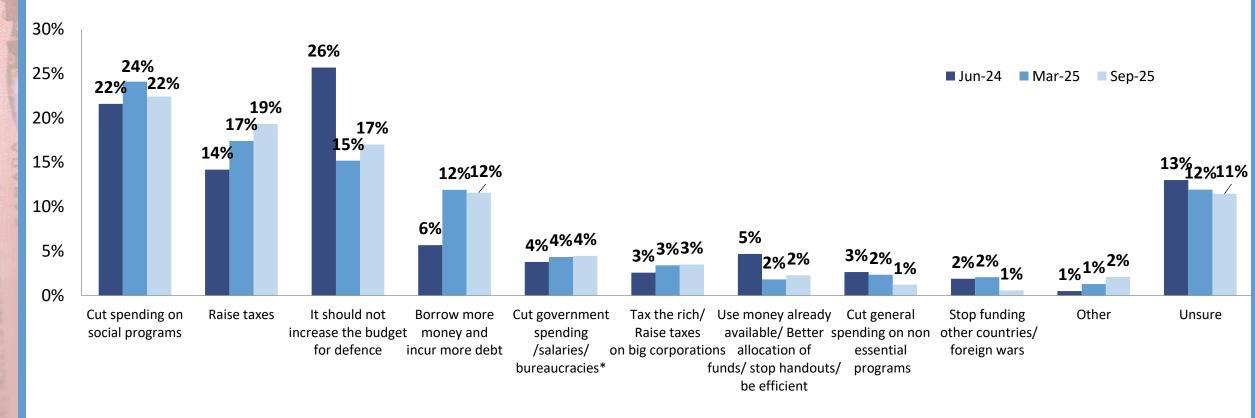
Canadians say that the government should fund the additional budget needed to reach the two per cent NATO defense spending target by cutting spending on social programs (22%), raising taxes (19%) and to borrow more money and incur more debt (12%). Seventeen per cent say that the government shouldn't increase the budget for defense and twelve per cent are unsure. Men are more likely to say that we should cut spending on social programs to reach the NATO defense spending target (31%) compared to women (14%). The top mentions as to how the government should fund the additional spending target are consistent with the previous March 2025 wave.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and celllines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,028 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between August 30<sup>th</sup> and September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2025 as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.

Individuals randomly called using random digit dialing with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is  $\pm 3.1$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by Bloomberg News and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.

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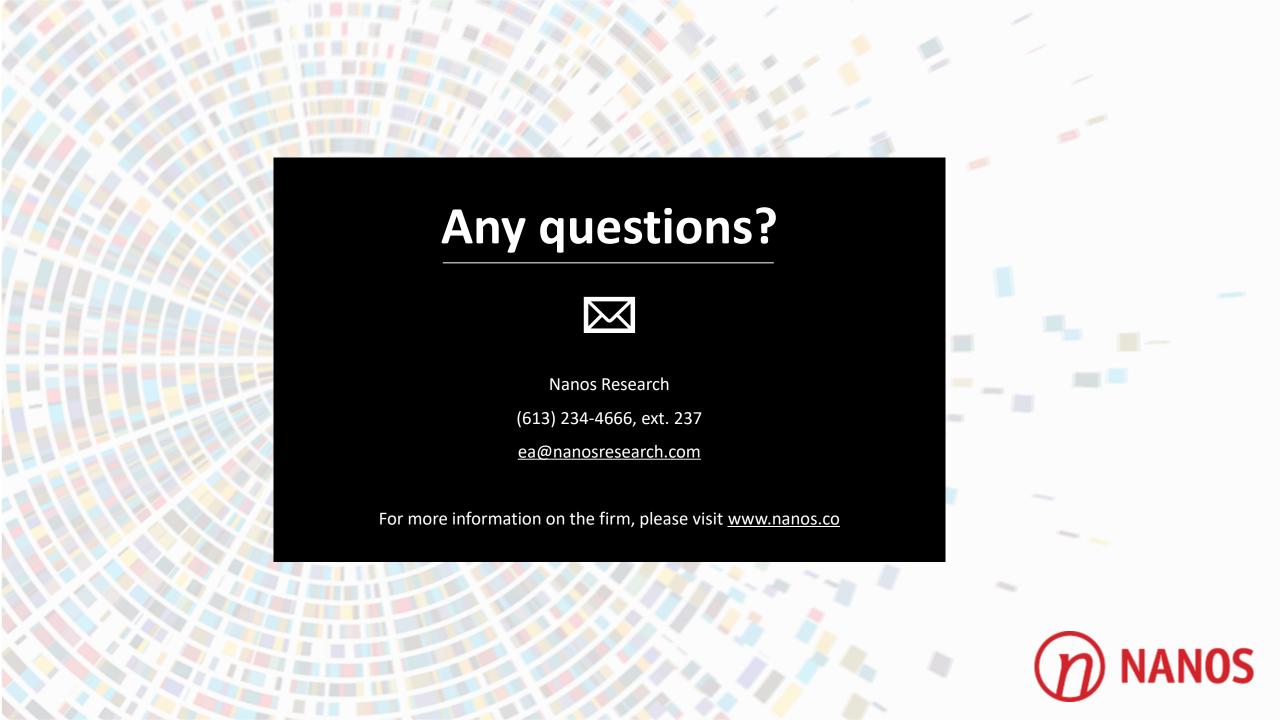
