


Trust withers while Canadians push back on the U.S.

This survey gauged the views of Canadians on Canada's future trade relationship with China.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,009 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between January 31st and February 4th, 2026, as part of an omnibus survey.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.



Canadian Trust in US weak

- 1. Canadians now view the United States less as an ally and more as a liability.** In a stark reversal of decades of continental confidence, fully three-quarters of Canadians reject the idea that the U.S. is a trustworthy ally to one extent or another.
- 2. Trump's rhetoric has triggered a consumer-level backlash north of the border.** A remarkable three in four Canadians report boycotting American goods or services, while half say they have cancelled travel plans to the U.S. This illustrates how political tensions have spilled into the everyday decisions of Canadians.
- 3. Anxiety about U.S. intentions.** Nearly one in five Canadians believes an American-ordered invasion is actually likely, and only half dismiss the notion outright.
- 4. Canadians are leaning toward deeper trade ties with China.** In a moment of strained relations with the U.S., nearly 80% of Canadians support maintaining or increasing trade with China, with support for *decreasing* trade falling by half in a single year.

Over 2 in 3 Canadians

report feeling concerned that Canada's security is threatened by the United States and President Trump. Three quarters of Canadian women feel concerned that Canada's security is threatened by the US and President Trump, comparatively 58 percent of men feel concerned that Canada's security is under threat. Canadians aged 55 and older also feel more concerned (73%) that Canada's security is threatened than younger age groups (18 to 35, 63%; 35 to 54, 63%).


Three in four Canadians report avoiding purchasing US goods or services as their top response to comments made by the U.S. president, followed by cancelling travel plans to the U.S. (51%), conveying to American friends and family your displeasure with US President Donald Trump (44%) and showing more patriotism when the Canadian anthem is played (36%). Residents of Atlantic Canada (89%) and Canadians aged 55 and older (85%) were more likely to report avoiding U.S. goods or services than the Canadian average (76%).

Likelihood of President Trump ordering an invasion of Canada

1 in 2 Canadians

report that they believe it is not likely that U.S. President Trump orders an Invasion of Canada during his current term. Men are most likely to report that President Trump ordering an invasion of Canada during his current term is unlikely at 63% while only 37% of women believe it is unlikely that he orders an invasion of Canada during his current term. Of note, a significant one in five Canadians believe an invasion is likely to one extent or another.



3 in 4 Canadians

disagree (49%) or somewhat disagree (27%) that the U.S. is a trustworthy ally of Canada. Residents of Atlantic Canada (84%) and Quebec (82%) are most likely to report some level of disagreement that the U.S. is a trustworthy ally.



Opinions on Canada's future trade relationship with China - Tracking

Two in five Canadians increase trade with China (44%), increasing since the last wave of tracking 36% increase trade with China. Half as many Canadians are saying they would want to decrease trade with China since last wave (10% down from 21% in 2025). Residents of Quebec are most likely to report they want to increase trade with China at 51 percent while residents of the Prairies are least likely to report wanting to increase trade with China at 37 percent.

Nanos conducted an RDD dual frame (land- and cell-lines) hybrid telephone and online random survey of 1,009 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, between January 31st and February 4th, 2026, as part of an omnibus survey. Participants were randomly recruited by telephone using live agents and administered a survey online. The sample included both land- and cell-lines across Canada. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada.


Individuals randomly called using random digit dialling with a maximum of five call backs.

The margin of error for this survey is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

This study was commissioned by CTV News, and the research was conducted by Nanos Research.

Weighting of Data	The results were weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information (2021) and the sample is geographically stratified to ensure a distribution across all regions of Canada. See tables for full weighting disclosure
Screening	Screening ensured potential respondents did not work in the market research industry, in the advertising industry, in the media or a political party prior to administering the survey to ensure the integrity of the data.
Excluded Demographics	Individuals younger than 18 years old; individuals without land or cell lines, and individuals without internet access could not participate.
Stratification	By age and gender using the latest Census information (2021) and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Canada. Smaller areas such as Atlantic Canada were marginally oversampled to allow for a minimum regional sample.
Estimated Response Rate	11 percent, consistent with industry norms.
Question Order	Question order in the preceding report reflects the order in which they appeared in the original questionnaire.
Question Content	Topics on the omnibus ahead of the survey content included: views on political issues, views on economic issues, Canada's trade deal with China, Canada's sovereignty, NATO, US support for Alberta Separation and Canada-US relationship.
Question Wording	The questions in the preceding report are written exactly as they were asked to individuals.
